Local Control Accountability Plan (LCAP) for 2017-2020

Proposal

Staff will provide an overview of Local Control Accountability Plan and District Goals for the 2017-2020 LCAP and Annual Review.

Background

The Local Control Accountability Plan (LCAP) is the touchstone by which we guide and execute our efforts to educate children. The LCAP is also a critical part of the Local Control Funding Formula (LCFF). It is comprised of goals that focus District practices and resources to ensure students are college and career ready upon graduation. The LCAP shows the alignment of LBUSD curriculum, instruction, assessment, and interventions with the eight state priorities. The areas are:

- 1. Basic Services Providing all students access to fully credentialed teachers, instructional materials that align with state standards, and safe facilities.
- 2. Implementation of California's academic standards including the Common Core State Standards in English language arts and math, Next Generation Science Standards, English language development, history social science, visual and performing arts, health education and physical education standards.
- 3. Parent involvement parent participation, so the local community is engaged in the decision-making process and the educational programs of students.
- 4. Student Achievement increasing student outcomes along multiple measures, including test scores, English proficiency and college and career preparedness.
- 5. Student Engagement supporting student engagement and participation, including whether students attend school or are chronically absent.
- 6. School Climate highlighting school connectedness through a variety of factors, such as suspension and expulsion rates, California Healthy Kids Survey data, and other locally identified means.
- 7. Course Access ensuring all students have access to classes that prepare them for college and careers
- 8. Other Student Outcomes measuring other important student outcomes related to required areas of study, including physical education and the arts.

To create the plan, school districts must engage parents, educators, employees and the community. LBUSD is focused on improving communication and involvement of all stakeholders, through stakeholder information meetings, School Messenger, the school and district websites, and stakeholder advisory groups. According to the 2018 LCAP Survey, 80% of parents are satisfied with the communication they receive and 75% of parents and staff say that the district encourages parent input. Our Annual LCAP Survey received 517 parent responses in 2018, up from 464 parent responses in 2017, 339 in 2016, and 193 in 2015. The parent participation has more than doubled since 2015. We also surveyed 989 students and 179 staff members. This data shows that LBUSD has dramatically improved our ability to receive feedback from parents and students.

Through feedback from School Site Councils, the LCAP Advisory Committee, school PTAs, district and site staff, and administration, LBUSD has determined five goals that align our efforts to the state priorities and focus our actions, services, and expenditures to ensure that we are meeting the needs of all LBUSD students. These five goals are:

- 1. Increase student academic achievement and social and emotional strength through collaboration, critical thinking, creativity, and communication
- 2. All students will gain the knowledge and skills to be college and career ready through a wide variety of academic and enrichment opportunities
- 3. Professional development focused on 21st Century teaching and learning
- 4. Safe, attractive, clean, well-equipped learning environments for all students that promote critical thinking, collaboration, creativity, and communication
- 5. All stakeholders will be engaged in the learning process by promoting a variety of opportunities for parents, students, staff and the community that strengthen communication and meaningful participation

After analyzing district data and compiling input from all stakeholder groups, several changes were made to the LCAP to better meet the needs of LBUSD students. These changes include:

- Goal 1: Hiring of a digital librarian and technology TOSAs, purchasing of additional intervention programs such as IXL, and adding ELD interventions after school at TMS/EMS.
- Goal 2: Adding AP Computer Science A course and creating a Computer Science CTE pathway at the LBHS.
- Goal 3: Adding professional development opportunities such as C3 Framework, Inquiry, Dyslexia, and Sketchnoting as after school optional offerings as well as more classes added to the Launchpad professional development system.
- Goal 5: Increasing the use of Hanover to provide additional surveys and research, as well as increasing collaboration with the community colleges regarding articulated courses and concurrent enrollment. Focus groups were also convened at TMS and LBHS to provide input into various aspects of the LCAP, including interventions, school climate, and school connectedness.

The plan also demonstrates how the District's budget will help achieve the goals, and assesses, each year, how well the strategies in the plan were able to improve outcomes. Although basic aid districts do not receive funding through the LCFF and have been the model of local control since they were established, they still must create an LCAP that describes program goals and funding sources. The Laguna Beach Unified School District LCAP describes the District's overall vision for students, annual goals, and specific actions the District will take to achieve the vision and goals. The District has obtained input from various stakeholder groups, including parents, educators, and employees, to create this plan. The LCAP Planning Team has collected, reviewed, and analyzed data and the revised 2017-2020 LCAP and Annual Review is hereby presented for public hearing on June 12, 2018

Proposal

The Board of Education will conduct a public hearing on the 2018-2019 All Funds Budget to obtain public input and discussion.

Background

The budget document resulted from a process that included a variety of sources to determine best estimates of annual income and expenditures. This budget was developed using prior year's allocations and presently known legally required or contractually required expenditures.

The preliminary budget is presented to allow the Board of Education and Laguna Beach Unified School District stakeholders to review the budget and ask clarifying questions prior to approval at the June 26, 2018 Board meeting.

The annual budget is a significant part of the overall planning process for the District. The District budget is more than an accounting tool; it is the educational program of the District expressed in dollars. The District's budget is a year-long plan that is constantly monitored and updated for the Board of Education as conditions change.

Budget Impact

After review of the preliminary budget, the approval of the final budget by the Board of Education will establish the expenditure limits within budgeted categories for the 2018-2019 All Funds Budget.

Recommended Action

Staff recommends the Board of Education hold a public hearing and receive public comment on the 2018-2019 All Funds Budget, and subsequently, the Board of Education should officially close the public hearing and direct administration to acknowledge public comments. Public Disclosure of Use of Proposition 30 Education Protection Act Funds for 2018-2019 for Direct Instruction Salaries and Benefits

Proposal

The Board of Education will conduct a public hearing on the use of Proposition 30 Education Protection Act funds for 2018-2019 direct instruction salaries and benefits to obtain public input and discussion.

Background

Proposition 30, approved by voters in November 2012, requires the State to pass through a minimum of \$200 per average daily attendance to each local educational agency. The school district is required to hold a public hearing and approve a resolution indicating how the funds are spent. Before the passage of Proposition 30, school districts were facing further significant reductions in school funding. The passage of Proposition 30 created the Education Protection Act, using the new State funds to substitute for the State shortfall in revenue. Proposition 30 funding was set to expire in 2018, however, on voters approved Proposition 55 in April 2016, which extended the funding through 2030.

Budget Impact

After review of the use of Proposition 30 Education Protection Act Funds for 2018-19, the approval of the final budget by the Board of Education will establish the use of Proposition 30 Education Protection Act funds for 2018-2019 direct instruction salaries and benefits.

Recommended Action

Staff recommends the Board of Education hold a public hearing and receive public comment on the 2018-2019 Use of Proposition 30 Education Protection Act funds for direct instruction salaries and benefits, and subsequently, the Board of Education should officially close the public hearing and direct administration to acknowledge public comments. Staff will agendize the 2018-2019 use of Proposition 30 Education Protection Act funds for direct instruction salaries and benefits at its next regularly scheduled Board meeting, June 26, 2018, for final review and approval by the Board of Education.

Proposal

Staff proposes the Board of Education ratify the 2018-19 revisions to the 2017-2020 Agreement negotiated by the designated representatives of the Laguna Beach Unified Faculty Association (LaBUFA) and the Laguna Beach Unified School District.

Background

The Association and the District reached a Tentative Agreement for 2018-19 reopeners to the 2017-2020 Agreement. The agreement allows for up to two reopeners for each party each year in addition to health and welfare and salary.

The Tentative Agreement attached includes changes in total compensation. The agreement includes a 2% salary increase and a 0.5% one time, off-schedule payment. In addition, if the 2018-19 adopted State Budget results in an increase in one-time unrestricted funds, the District shall allocate LaBUFA's proportional share of the additional funds up to 1% as a one-time, off schedule salary payment.

Budget Impact

Public Disclosure of Collective Bargaining Agreements in Accordance with AB 1200 (Chapter 1213/1991), Government Code 3547.5 and CCR, Title V, Section 15449 require that the costs associated with the agreement be publicly disclosed and approved by the Board of Education.

The cost of this agreement for 2018-19 is \$ 786,645.

Recommended Action

Staff recommends the Board of Education hold a public hearing and receive public comment on the proposed ratification of the 2018-19 revisions to the 2017-2020 Collective Bargaining Agreement negotiated by the designated representatives of the Laguna Beach Unified Faculty Association (LaBUFA) and the Laguna Beach Unified School District and its impact on the budget as presented.

TENTATIVE AGREEMENT 2018-2019 Between Laguna Beach Unified School District And

Laguna Beach Unified Faculty Association/CTA/NEA (LaBUFA)

The Laguna Beach Unified School District and the Laguna Beach Unified Faculty Association/CTA/NEA (LaBUFA) have reached a Tentative Agreement for 2018-2019 that provides for:

ARTICLE 7. Hours

7.1 Duty Day

- 7.1.1 Unit members shall be required to be at their schools or other work sites thirty (30) minutes prior to the beginning of the students' instructional day, except at the High School where the reporting time is fifteen (15) minutes.
- 7.1.2 On the last day of school completion of professional responsibilities shall be evidenced by the signature of the immediate supervisor on a District-developed end of-the-year checklist.
- 7.1.3 Staff meetings will be scheduled during the professional work day at each site.
- 7.1.4 Unit members shall work a professional work day, inclusive of all duties outlined in 7.6. Unit members may leave at the conclusion of the regular student day, except on modified days, as long as they do not have student, parent, or administrative appointments. Secondary teachers may leave at the conclusion of the student instructional day on days when final exams are held.
- 7.1.5 Student contact time is exclusive of all passing and recess periods, preparatory and conference periods, lunch periods and prior-to-school time. There will be a minimum of 30 consecutive minutes of duty free lunch.
- 7.1.6 Unit members will be paid at the certificated non-instructional rate for any required meetings or training that extends more than 15 minutes beyond the student instructional day, exclusive of professional responsibilities identified in 7.1.2, 7.6, and negotiated stipends.
- 7.1.7 Unit members will be paid at the certificated instructional rate for required additional instructional contact time with students that extends beyond the state-required student instructional minutes. This provision is exclusive of professional responsibilities identified in 7.1.2, 7.6, and negotiated stipends. Student instructional minutes shall remain at the 2015-16 minutes unless otherwise negotiated or changed by the state.

- 7.1.8 The duty day for nurses, <u>digital media and library specialist</u> and the athletic director shall be an eight (8) hour work day.
- 7.2 The principal and staff will cooperatively develop a plan to structure time at the individual schools, subject to the final approval of the principal.

7.3 Preparation Periods

- 7.3.1 Unit members employed full-time at middle school or high school and serving as a classroom teacher for more than four (4) periods shall be assigned one (1) period for preparation and planning.
- 7.3.2 Unit members employed at elementary schools shall receive a minimum of 190 minutes per week of student free preparation and planning breaks for all kindergarten through third (3rd) grade teachers, and 230 minutes per week for fourth (4th) and fifth (5th) grade teachers.
- 7.3.3 Teachers shall be responsible for assigned students and may not reassign such responsibility without the approval of the site principal.

7.4 Outdoor Education

- 7.4.1 Unit members shall be encouraged but not required to attend Outdoor Education with their participating classes. Unit members who do not attend Outdoor Education with their participating classes shall serve in the District for the regular workday in such assignment as the superintendent or designee may designate until their classes return.
- 7.4.2 Unit members may travel in their own vehicles at their own expense unless no adult supervision can be provided on the bus. The District will make all reasonable efforts to provide supervision, other than unit members on the bus.

7.5 Morning Breaks

7.5.1 All unit members assigned to K-5 sites shall participate in scheduling which shall result in morning breaks for all K-5 teachers.

7.6 Professional Responsibilities

- 7.6.1 Professional Responsibilities required of all unit members shall include attendance at Back-to-School Night, Open House (Elementary/Middle only), Graduation (High School only) and Parent/Teacher Conferences (K-5).
- 7.6.2 Professional Learning Communities (PLC) -

The purpose of Professional Learning Communities shall be to provide for teacher collaboration around the common vision of improving teaching and student learning. Fidelity to the model requires the development of a common curriculum and common assessments. Sharing of assessment data is for the purpose of improving core instruction and designing and implementing effective and efficient intervention strategies systems of support. To that end, it is important that PLCs occur in an atmosphere of professional trust among both teachers and administrators.

Accordingly, evaluations shall be conducted per provisions of the Agreement and the California Education Code. Unit member rights are neither expanded nor diminished as the result of participation in PLC and in common assessments.

During each school year, unit members shall meet in Professional Learning Communities a maximum of thirty (30) total meetings of approximately one (1) hour each. Attendance at PLC meetings shall be punctual and consistent. Following each PLC meeting, a written summary of the meeting shall be provided to the site administrator in a timely fashion, as mutually agreed to by site administration and the site's PLCs. Site administration shall establish an accessible storage area where meeting summaries of the site's PLCs shall be filed and made available for unit member access.

The vitality and fidelity of the PLC process will be maintained through an annual review with LaBUFA certificated leadership and administration with six (6) unit members and six (6) district administrators at each site by May 30 of each year.

7.6.3 Professional Responsibilities Inclusive of the School Day

- a) Attendance at staff meetings, department meetings, PLC meetings, and appointments shall be punctual and consistent.
- b) Expectations for student performance levels shall be clearly communicated to students prior to assignments and assessments.
- c) Effective communications with students, parents, and District personnel concerning individual student needs shall be continuously maintained. This includes timely responses to phone calls, emails, and written correspondence or requests as well as availability for individual student and/or parent conferences as appropriate. Electronic communications, including use of the District-adopted learning management system and/or student information system, shall be updated in a timely manner. Specific definitions of "timely" and "appropriate" shall be determined by the principal in consultation with the site staff and/or departments at the beginning of each school year.
- d) Evaluations of student work shall be reported to students in a timely manner, and when grade level appropriate, the online

grading system shall be used to regularly communicate student performance. Each unit member will utilize and regularly update the District-adopted learning management system. Specific definitions of "timely" and "regularly" shall be determined by the principal in consultation with the site staff and/or departments at the beginning of each school year.

- e) Unit members will continue to participate in research, planning, design implementation, and providing feedback for 4CLE (4Cs Learning Environments), including participation in training, visitations, and application of 4CLE principles in classroom instruction. This process will be scheduled by the site administrator on a voluntary basis with unit members until all volunteers have participated, at which time all other unit members will be assigned to the implementation schedule.
- f) Unit members will continue to design and implement lessons and units inherent in implementing the California State Standards, recognizing the change in standards requires adaptation of curriculum design and classroom instruction.
- g) Elementary unit members shall be responsible for student supervision, as scheduled equitably among unit members at the school site.
- h) Adjunct duties shall be distributed equitably among all site unit members, with first consideration given to volunteers. Unit members shall be given as much advance notice as possible in adjunct duty assignments.

Adjunct duties are defined as participation and/or coordination of State, district, site-specific, and instructional initiatives and committees without additional pay.

7.6.4 Mandated Training

Each unit member is required to participate in Mandated Reporting of Child Abuse Training annually within the first six weeks of the school year in accordance with AB 1432. The District will offer multiple training opportunities within the unit member's contracted work day. Should a unit member not attend a training, the unit member will be required to complete the online training module on a date and/or time that does not interfere with the student instructional day.

7.7 Substituting

7.7.1 Unit members at the intermediate or high school shall not normally be required to substitute during their preparation periods except in the event of sudden illness, accident, emergency, or when substitutes are not available. However, if a unit member does provide substitute service

during his/her conference/planning period, he/she will receive compensation calculated at the certificated instructional rate.

7.8 Minimum Days

7.8.1 The number of minimum days for each school year shall be identified on the school calendar.

7.9 Staff Development

- 7.9.1 Staff development shall be a combination of district-wide and site-based undertakings.
 - 7.9.1.1 District-wide staff development shall be planned by the Assistant Superintendent for Instructional Services administration with input from unit members. in consultation with the Curriculum Council.
 - 7.9.1.2 Site-based staff development shall be planned by the site principal in consultation with appropriate site staff representatives.
- 7.10 Adjunct duties shall be required only after volunteers are sought, if applicable, and such duties shall be distributed equitably among all site unit members. Unit members shall be given as much advance notice as possible in adjunct duty assignments.
- 7.11 7.10 Unit members shall not be required to perform supervision at socially oriented activities such as athletic events, dances, performance, or concerts. The assumption of such supervision shall be voluntary.

7.12 7.11 District Days

The District shall provide eligible unit members with two days of release time for collaborative planning aligned to LCAP goals and/or elementary report cards.

- 7.12.1 7.11.1 An eligible unit member is a teacher of record with a class roster or a teacher responsible for grade submission.
- 7.12.2 7.11.2 The two days shall be on site or at another district location with approval of the immediate supervisor, but eligible unit members shall not be required to perform student contact services.
- 7.12.3 7.11.3 Eligible unit members shall take district days as follows:
 - Eligible members in grades 6 through 12 shall schedule each district day as a department for collaborative planning as determined by department member(s). Individual unit members may opt out of district days.
 - Eligible members must use one of the two days before the end of the first semester.
 - Eligible members may not use a day adjacent to a holiday or vacation period for this purpose.

- The site administrator shall distribute a calendar posted to allow eligible members and departments to schedule their days prior to September 30 for first semester and February 15 for second semester.
- Eligible members who do not use their days will be compensated at the substitute rate of pay within 30 days of the end of the school year.

ARTICLE 11. EVALUATION

Teachers due for formal evaluation shall be evaluated using the pilot evaluation system developed and piloted during the 2017-2018 2018-2019 school year. The Joint Teacher-District Evaluation Committee shall meet during the 2017-2018 2018-2019 school year to review feedback regarding the program and recommend any changes to the bargaining unit and district by May 15, 2018 2019. Counselors and unit members in non-classroom teacher roles will continue to utilize the current process in 2018-2019. A committee will work to develop modifications to the counselor and non-classroom teacher evaluation process during the 2018-2019 school year and recommend modifications to the bargaining units by May 15, 2019. The amendments to this section are considered temporary language for the 2017-2018 2018-2019 school year only.

- 11.1 Evaluation of unit members shall be conducted according to the Education Code sections, which deal with certificated staff evaluation.
- 11.2 The evaluator shall work closely with the unit member in defining areas of responsibilities, establishing objectives, jointly monitoring progress, assessing performance, and conducting evaluation conferences.
- 11.3 Evaluation and assessment of the performance of each unit member shall be made on a continuing basis, at least once each school year for temporary and probationary unit members, and at least every other year for unit members with permanent status.
 - 11.3.1 A unit member with permanent status who has been employed at least 10 years with the district may be evaluated every three (3) years if the unit member is highly qualified, occupies a positions that is required to be filled by a highly qualified professional by the federal No Child Left Behind Act of 2001 (20 U.S.C. Sec. 6301, et seq.), as defined in 20 U.S.C. Sec. 7801, and whose previous evaluation rated the employee as meeting or exceeding standards, if the evaluator and unit member being evaluated agree. The unit member or the evaluator may withdraw consent at any time.
- 11.4 Evaluations shall be composed of interviews with the unit member as well as with personal observations by the immediate supervisor. Information which has not been observed or gained through these interviews shall not be included.

Each year, prior to October 15, teachers will develop personalized goal(s) for the upcoming school year. Teachers due for formal evaluations should complete the first three sections of the Formal Teacher Evaluation focused on goal-setting.

Prior to the reflective conversation meeting, the teacher may use the reflection resources in the appendix to assist in reflection and goal development.

For the teachers who aren't being formally evaluated, the annual goal setting form is to establish areas in which the teacher wishes to pursue professional growth and research in the classroom setting.

The teacher may revise his/her goal(s) at any point during the process. Should the evaluator identify areas of concern or specific areas of focus, the evaluator shall provide written notice to the teacher of the specific area(s) to be addressed in the evaluation process.

11.5.3 Reflective Conversation

Prior to November 1, principals will meet with teachers regarding the goal(s). The purpose of the meeting is to have a reflective conversation regarding the teacher's goals, identify ways in which the evaluator will support the teacher, and in the event they exist, to identify additional areas of concern or focus.

The teacher will submit a copy to the evaluator no later than two days prior to the reflective conversation meeting. The evaluator will complete his/her section of the goal-setting portion of the form to identify support offered to the teacher as well as identifying any additional areas of concern or focus.

While a teacher is not required to have a reflective conversation with the evaluator on a non-evaluation year, ongoing communication is ideal for continued growth. Ongoing reflective conversations with peers is expected.

11.5.4 Formal Observations

Formal Observations shall be at a mutually agreed-upon time, with every effort made by the evaluator to maintain the appointment. In the event of an unavoidable change, the evaluator would re-schedule with the evaluatee. Formal observations for permanent teachers shall be conducted by March 1.

Prior to the Formal Observation, the Observation Form will be completed by the teacher and submitted to the evaluator. The purpose of this step is to give the evaluator information regarding the focus of the observation, instructional strategies the teacher plans to employ during the lesson, context for the class or lesson, and the lesson's place in the larger unit of instruction. The Observation

Form shall be submitted no later than two school days prior to the scheduled Formal Observation.

The evaluator will conduct one formal observation of the teacher. The Formal Observation takes place for a lesson mutually agreed upon by the evaluator and teacher. The evaluator uses the teacher's Observation Form to record comments and suggested areas of growth based on the lesson observed.

A conference between the teacher and the evaluator will be scheduled within one week of the evaluator's formal observation of the teacher's classroom. During this conference the evaluator and teacher will discuss the evaluator's observation of the classroom lesson and the teacher's reflection on the lesson he/she delivered.

Any concerns on the part of the evaluator should be identified and addressed at this time and an additional observation can be scheduled through mutual agreement as appropriate.

11.5.4 Mid-Year Reflective Conversation

Each year, between January 1 and February 28, principals will meet with teachers due for a mid-year progress discussion regarding the teacher's goal(s). The purpose of the meeting is to have a reflective conversation regarding the goals, any revisions made, and/or identify additional or different ways in which the evaluator will support the teacher, and in the event they exist, to identify additional areas of concern or focus. The date of this meeting is recorded on the Formal Evaluation Form.

11.5.5 Self-Evaluation and Final Evaluation Meeting with the Evaluator

After the formal observation, subsequent post-observation conference, and midyear progress discussion are completed the evaluator and teacher will schedule a final evaluation conference. The formal evaluation should be scheduled between April 1 to May 15, unless the teacher has received a Performance Improvement Plan, in which case the formal evaluation should be held between May 1 and May 15. The teacher will complete the self-reflection portion of the Final Evaluation form. The evaluator will complete the remainder of the Final Evaluation form and review with the teacher. The evaluator is expected to focus on the teacher's focus area/goal(s), however, feedback and discussion may take place around any of the six CSTPs as proficiency in all of the standards is the goal of professional educator. For temporary or probationary teachers, the evaluator shall evaluate all six CSTPs, the district's standard 7, in addition to progress on the focus areas.

The evaluator will consider the teacher's proficiency with the CSTPs. A teacher may make growth in his/her focus area, but may struggle with a particular CSTP or district standard 7. The evaluator shall provide notice to the teacher of any identified concern as quickly as possible after the concern has been identified, as well as support and expectations to correct the concern. Should the teacher not demonstrate proficiency in all CSTPs by the final evaluation, the evaluator may refer the teacher to the Performance Improvement Plan process.

Should the teacher choose to formally respond to the evaluation, the teacher may submit a written response that will be included with the evaluation.

11.5.6 Performance Improvement Plan

The need for a Performance Improvement Plan is determined by the evaluator and shall be reviewed with the teacher no later than March 1. A teacher on a PIP shall receive the final evaluation conference between May 1 and May 15. The teacher will be formally evaluated using the standards-based evaluation process focused on the CSTPs and district standard 7. Progress toward the expectations set forth in the PIP shall be reviewed at each reflective conversation during the second evaluation year.

11.6 Formal Evaluation of Temporary and Probationary Teachers

Formal evaluations of temporary and probationary teachers shall be conducted every year and shall focus on all six California Standards for the Teaching Profession (CSTP) plus the District-Adopted Standard Seven: Professional Expectations.

11.6.1 Goal-Setting

Each year, prior to October 15, teachers will develop personalized goal(s) for the upcoming school year. Teachers due for formal evaluations should complete the first three sections of the Formal Teacher Evaluation focused on goal-setting.

Prior to the reflective conversation meeting, the teacher may use the reflection resources in the appendix to assist in reflection and goal development.

For the teachers who aren't being formally evaluated, the annual goal setting form is to establish areas in which the teacher wishes to pursue professional growth and research in the classroom setting.

The teacher may revise his/her goal(s) at any point during the process. Should the evaluator identify areas of concern or specific areas of focus, the evaluator shall provide written notice to the teacher of the specific area(s) to be addressed in the evaluation process.

11.6.2 Reflective Conversation

Prior to November 1, principals will meet with teachers regarding the goal(s). The purpose of the meeting is to have a reflective conversation regarding the teacher's goals, identify ways in which the evaluator will support the teacher, and in the event they exist, to identify additional areas of concern or focus.

The teacher will submit a copy to the evaluator no later than two days prior to the reflective conversation meeting. The evaluator will complete his/her section of the goal-setting portion of the form to identify support offered to the teacher as well as identifying any additional areas of concern or focus.

11.6.3 Formal Observations

Formal Observations shall be at a mutually agreed-upon time, with every effort made by the evaluator to maintain the appointment. In the event of an unavoidable change, the evaluator would re-schedule with the evaluatee. Two formal observations for temporary and probationary teachers shall be conducted between November 15 and February 15, the first of which shall be conducted before winter break.

Prior to the Formal Observation, the Observation Form will be completed by the teacher and submitted to the evaluator. The purpose of this step is to give the evaluator information regarding the focus of the observation, instructional strategies the teacher plans to employ during the lesson, context for the class or lesson, and the lesson's place in the larger unit of instruction. The Observation Form shall be submitted no later than two school days prior to the scheduled Formal Observation.

Formal observations take place for a lesson mutually agreed upon by the evaluator and teacher. The evaluator uses the teacher's Observation Form to record comments and suggested areas of growth based on the lesson observed.

A conference between the teacher and the evaluator will be scheduled within one week of the evaluator's formal observation of the teacher's classroom. During this conference the evaluator and teacher will discuss the evaluator's observation of the classroom lesson and the teacher's reflection on the lesson he/she delivered.

Any concerns on the part of the evaluator should be identified and addressed at this time and an additional observation can be scheduled through mutual agreement as appropriate.

11.6.4 Mid-Year Reflective Conversation

Each year, between December 15 and January 15, principals will meet with teachers due for a mid-year progress discussion regarding the teacher's goal(s). The purpose of the meeting is to have a reflective conversation regarding the goals, any revisions made, and/or identify additional or different ways in which the evaluator will support the teacher, and in the event they exist, to identify additional areas of concern or focus. The date of this meeting is recorded on the Formal Evaluation Form.

11.6.5 Self-Evaluation and Final Evaluation Meeting with the Evaluator

After the formal observation, subsequent post-observation conference, and midyear progress discussion are completed the evaluator and teacher will schedule a final evaluation conference. The formal evaluation should be scheduled between February 1 and February 28. The teacher will complete the self-reflection portion of the Final Evaluation form. The evaluator will complete the remainder of the Final Evaluation form and review with the teacher. The evaluator shall evaluate all six CSTPs, the district's standard 7, in addition to progress on the focus areas.

The evaluator will consider the teacher's proficiency with the CSTPs. A teacher may make growth in his/her focus area, but may struggle with a particular CSTP or district standard 7. The evaluator shall provide notice to the teacher of any

identified concern as quickly as possible after the concern has been identified, as well as support and expectations to correct the concern. Should the teacher not demonstrate proficiency in all CSTPs by the final evaluation, the evaluator may refer the teacher to the Performance Improvement Plan process.

Should the teacher choose to formally respond to the evaluation, the teacher may submit a written response that will be included with the evaluation.

11.6.6 Performance Improvement Plan

The need for a Performance Improvement Plan is determined by the evaluator by the final evaluation meeting. The PIP shall be reviewed with the teacher within two weeks after the final evaluation. The teacher will be formally evaluated the subsequent year using the evaluation process that is focused on the CSTPs and district standard 7. Progress toward the expectations set forth in the PIP shall be reviewed at each reflective conversation during the second evaluation year.

ARTICLE 12. LEAVES

12.6 Extended Illness Leave

12.6.1 If a unit member has utilized all accumulated sick leave and remains absent from duties on account of illness or accident for a period of five (5) school months or less, the amount deducted from his/her the unit member's monthly salary shall not exceed the sum which is actually paid a substitute unit member employed to fill the position—district's long term substitute rate of pay during the unit member's absence or, if no substitute was employed, the amount that would have been paid to a substitute had he/she the unit member been employed for up to 30 days. After the first 30 days of the leave, the amount deducted from the unit member's monthly salary shall not exceed the sum which is actually paid a substitute employed to fill the position during the unit member's absence. The District shall make every reasonable effort to secure the services of a substitute employee.

ARTICLE 18. SALARY SCHEDULE

- 18.3 The basis of the salary schedule is a point system. The value of \$202.20 shall be awarded for school year 2017 2018 2018-2019. (refer to Appendix A). On the Counselor Salary Schedule (refer to Appendix A), the value of \$213.14 shall be awarded for school year 2017 2018 2018-2019. On the Nurse and Digital Media and Library Specialist Salary Schedule (refer to Appendix A), the value of \$243.58 shall be awarded for school year 2017 2018 2018-2019. On the Athletic Director Salary Schedule (refer to Appendix A), the value of \$260.75 shall be awarded for school year 2017 2018 2018-2019. An additional \$1,000 will be added to a unit member's salary after completion of 16 years of service.
 - 18.3.1 An additional \$2,500 will be added to a unit member's salary upon completion of National Teacher Board Certification, National Counselor Board Certification, or Certification of Clinical Competence. When earned mid-year, the amount shall be pro-rated.

- 18.3.2 The District shall allocate one-half percent (0.5%) of base salary as a one-time, off schedule salary payment for all unit members employed by the District as of July 1, 2018.
- 18.3.3 In addition, if the 2018-19 adopted State Budget results in an increase in one-time unrestricted funds, the District shall allocate LaBUFA's proportional share of the additional funds up to 1% as a one-time, off schedule salary payment for all unit members employed by the District as of July 1, 2018.
- 18.8 Stipends shall be provided to individual unit members performing additional duties as specified in Appendix C. Beginning with the 2018-2019 school year, the following changes will be made to the athletic stipend schedule:

ARTICLE 19. FRINGE BENEFITS

19.1 For the 2017-2018 school year, the The District agrees to provide certificated employees and their dependents with existing insurance coverage for medical, dental, life and vision (life and vision for employees only) insurance up to the district cap as specified in 19.2. For the 2017-2018 school year, the District will provide insurance coverage, subject to the following limitations on the District's obligation to pay for benefits:

2017 2018 Health Benefits:

The total dollars budgeted for all District employee benefits in the 2017-18 school year, \$4,559,000. It is expressly understood that the cap of \$4,559,000 remains in force unless otherwise expressly agreed to.

The total dollars budgeted for all District employee benefits in 2017-18 shall be adjusted for net employee loss or gain in 2017-18.

In the case of employee loss, the amount(s) subtracted shall be equal to the actual District premiums paid on behalf of the former employee(s) in 2016-17. In the case of employee gain, the amount(s) added shall be equal to the actual District premiums paid on behalf of the new employee(s) in 2017-18. If the District and the Association are unable to reach a settlement on health benefits prior to October 1, 2018, then it may be necessary for the District to initiate employee payroll deductions to cover LaBUFA bargaining unit members' pro rata share of the increased premium costs. If the District initiates payroll deductions, it will notify the Association and LaBUFA unit members at least thirty (30) days in advance of starting deductions, and will make the appropriate deductions based on the Association's confirmation of the amount(s) to be deducted from the affected unit members' paychecks. No payroll deductions will occur before November 1, 2018.

19.1.1 The Health Insurance Task Force Committee, consisting of four (4) members each from LaBUFA, CSEA and Management will continue to meet and discuss benefit options, with a focus on limiting cost increases. A commitment has been made to ensure that the Task Force Committee completes its work in a timely fashion, and is able to present its recommendations to the District and Association Bargaining Teams for use in negotiations.

Public Disclosure and ratification of Collective Bargaining Agreement in Accordance with AB 1200 (Chapter 1213/1991), Government Code 3547.5 and CCR, Title V, Section 15449; and 2018-2021 Negotiated Agreement with the California School Employees Association (CSEA) and its Laguna Beach Chapter #131

Proposal

It is proposed that the Board of Education ratify the 2018-2021 Collective Bargaining Agreement negotiated by the designated representatives of the California School Employees Association (CSEA) and its Laguna Beach Chapter #131 and the Laguna Beach Unified School District.

Background

The Association and the District reached Tentative Agreement for the 2018-2021 agreement. Major provisions remain in place. The District and Association utilized Interest-Based Bargaining (IBB) as the process.

The Tentative Agreement attached includes changes in total compensation. The agreement includes a 2% salary increase and a 0.5% one time, off-schedule payment. In addition, if the 2018-19 adopted State Budget results in an increase in one-time unrestricted funds, the District shall allocate CSEA's proportional share of the additional funds up to 1% as a one-time, off schedule salary payment.

Budget Impact

Public Disclosure of Collective Bargaining Agreements in Accordance with AB 1200 (Chapter 1213/1991), Government Code 3547.5 and CCR, Title V, Section 15449 require that the costs associated with the agreement be publicly disclosed and approved by the Board of Education.

The revised cost for 2018-19 is \$130,500

Recommended Action

Staff recommends the Board of Education hold a public hearing and receive public comment on the proposed ratification of the 2018-2021 Collective Bargaining Agreement negotiated by the designated representatives of the California School Employees Association (CSEA) and its Laguna Beach Chapter #131 and the Laguna Beach Unified School District and its impact on the budget as presented.

Tentative Agreement Between the Laguna Beach Unified School District (LBUSD) And the

California School Employees Association (CSEA) and its Laguna Beach Chapter #131 2018-2019

ARTICLE 3. ASSOCIATION RIGHTS

- Pursuant to the appropriate State laws, the District agrees that all employees (probationary and permanent) in the represented unit (Appendix AB) shall have the right to freely organize, join, and support the Association for the purpose of representation on all matters of employer-employee relations. Likewise, it is understood that any employee has the right to refuse to join and participate in the activities of the Association.
- 3.2 The Association shall have the right to post notices of activities and matters of Association concern on Association bulletin boards, at least one of which shall be provided at each site in an area frequented by classified employees. The Association shall have the right to use the interdistrict mail service, email service, and mailboxes for communication to employees.
- 3.3 Representative(s) of the Association shall have the right to access to areas in which employees work so long as the representative(s) does not interfere with the work performance. In those cases where the representative(s) are not members of the respective staffs, the representative(s) shall obtain permission from the principal prior to gaining access to the work area and shall identify themselves.
- 3.4 Immediate supervisors shall not schedule time for Association access to employees during regular working hours but shall make it possible for representative(s) to talk to employees during work breaks, meal breaks, or before and after work hours.
- 3.5 The Association shall be permitted to use facilities upon application for and receipt of approval.
 - 3.5.1 The Association may use school equipment on school property, as long as it does not interfere with the regular operation of the school programs. Use of District duplicating equipment shall be charged to the Association at the prevailing rate.
- 3.6 Upon request by the Association, materials available to the public shall be provided promptly.
- 3.7 Distribution to include posting contract and job descriptions on the District's website. The District will prepare and deliver a copy of this Agreement to each new unit member.
- 3.8 The Association shall have the right to reasonable release time for the purpose of meeting and negotiating with the District restricted to the following:

- 3.8.1 For the purpose of a successor agreement, the Association shall select four six (6 4) representatives for the purpose of meeting and negotiating with the District and processing grievances. The Association's representatives shall receive a total allowance of twenty-eight forty-two (28 42) days of released time without loss of pay.
- 3.8.2 In the event that impasse is declared by both parties, eight (8) additional days shall be granted for the negotiating team.
- 3.8.3 If additional days beyond the eight during impasse are needed, the cost necessary to hire substitutes, if needed, shall be borne by the Association.
- 3.8.4 The District and Association may discharge negotiation procedures through authorized officers, consultants, representatives, or committees.
- 3.8.5 Those chosen by the Association as its representatives shall provide reasonable notice to the District prior to leaving their duties so that suitable replacements or other arrangements may be made to continue the work of the District.
- 3.9 The Association shall be granted sixty (60) days of leave per year to be utilized at the discretion of the Association. However, this leave shall not be utilized in preparation for or the participation in a work slowdown, work stoppage, and/or strike as governed by District leave procedures. The employee(s) affected by this leave shall not suffer loss of pay.
- 3.10 The District shall provide each new unit member with an informational packet prepared by CSEA and subject to approval by the District. GSEA will be allowed time during new employee orientation twice per year to inform new unit members about CSEA. Additionally, the District shall provide CSEA mandatory access to its three annual new employee orientations. "Access" to new employees shall be limited to two association representatives for 30 minutes. Association representatives may attend the District's new employee orientations. Release time spent in new employee orientations shall be deducted from the Association's annual allotment. Should the District, in its sole discretion, change the manner in which it conducts new employee orientations, the parties shall meet and renegotiate this Agreement to comply with the District's decision.

Should a new unit member be hired in between employee orientation sessions, a unit member appointed by the CSEA President may meet and confer with the new unit member during designated break periods and/or release time.

The District shall provide not less than 10 calendar days' notice in advance to the association of a new employee orientation, unless there is an urgent need critical to the employer's operations that was not reasonably foreseeable. If the association representative does not attend, the orientation will not be rescheduled.

ARTICLE 8. ABSENCES/LEAVES

A unit member shall report absences using the District-adopted absence reporting system as early as possible but no later than sixty (60) minutes prior to the start of the shift on the actual day of absence.

Unit members in certain departments may be required to report to the unit member's supervisor each day of the absence as directed by the supervisor. Unit members are required to request prior approval from the supervisor for Personal Necessity (with the exception of two days in accordance with 8.4.1.6), Vacation, and Floating Holiday.

8.1 SICK LEAVE

Every full-time unit member accrues eight (8) hours per calendar month for each month worked during the fiscal year, July 1 through June 30 for personal illness or injury (including physician appointments), or illness or injury of a family member in the immediate household, with full pay.

- 8.1.1 Sick leave not used in any one year shall be accumulated without limit.
- 8.1.2 A unit member serving regularly on a part-time basis is entitled to sick leave prorated in the same ratio as the regular work hours per day, days per week, weeks per month, or months per year that such part-time employees unit members bear to eight (8) hours per day, forty (40) hours per calendar week, four (4) calendar weeks per month, or twelve (12) calendar months during the school year.
- 8.1.3 If sick leave is utilized prior to accrual, and is followed by termination of employment, the amount advanced will be deducted from the final paycheck.
- 8.1.4 A unit member who is absent more than four (4) successive working days must furnish a doctor's certificate showing proof of illness to qualify for sick leave pay.
- 8.1.5 A unit member who has excessive absences shall be required to furnish a doctor's certificate showing proof of illness to qualify for sick leave pay for each day of absence.
- 8.1.6 The District shall accept any earned sick leave accumulated by the unit member from another school district, in accordance with Education Code.
- 8.1.7 Upon retirement, unused sick leave for eligible unit members shall be converted to retirement credit in compliance with the law.
- 8.1.8 The District shall provide each unit member with a statement of accrued sick leave and entitlement for the school year. Such statement shall be provided through the OCDE EIS system and as indicated on the unit member's monthly timesheets.

8.2 DIFFERENTIAL PAY

- 8.2.1 Before differential pay is utilized, all sick leave and vacation pay must be used. The differential pay period commences with the first day of absence.
- 8.2.2 When a unit member is absent from duties on account of illness or accident for a period of five (5) months or less, whether or not the absence arises out of or in the course of employment of the unit member, the amount deducted from the salary due the employee

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- <u>unit member</u> for any month in which the absence occurs shall be compensated equal to fifty percent (50%) of the <u>employee's unit member's</u> regular base salary.
- 8.2.3 For any use of extended illness or injury leave the District will require verification from a physician that the unit member was physically unable to perform his/her their customary duties.
- 8.2.4 When leave of absence utilizing differential pay overlaps into the next fiscal year, the unit member shall only be entitled to the balance of unused leave as indicated above.

8.3 LEAVE OF ABSENCE FOR INDUSTRIAL ACCIDENT OR ILLNESS

- 8.3.1 Unit members shall be entitled to industrial accident or industrial illness (which qualifies under the State Workers' Compensation Insurance) leave of absence of not to exceed sixty (60) days duration, per accident or illness during any one fiscal year.
- 8.3.2 An industrial accident or illness leave shall commence on the first day of absence and shall be reduced by one day for each day of authorized absence.
- 8.3.3 When a leave of absence for an industrial accident or illness overlaps into the next fiscal year, the unit member shall be entitled to the balance of unused leave due for that particular injury or illness, as may be required.
- 8.3.4 Allowable leave for industrial accident or illness shall not be accumulated from year-to-year. Allowable leaves for each injury or illness shall not exceed sixty (60) working days in any one fiscal year for any one accident. While on an industrial accident leave, the unit member shall be entitled to use only that portion of his their accumulated or available sick leave, vacation or other available leave, which when added to the Workers' Compensation award, provides for a full day's wage or salary.
- 8.3.5 The unit member shall report an industrial accident or illness, no matter how minor, to the immediate supervisor and if deemed necessary, file an "Employer's Report of Occupational Injury or Illness" form with the Human Resources office within thirty (30) days of the date of such accident or illness.
- 8.3.6 The District will require the unit member to submit to a physical examination by a physician selected by the District any time during the leave.
- 8.3.7 During such paid leave of absence, in the event the unit member receives temporary disability indemnity checks directly, the unit member shall endorse to the District the checks received, and the District shall issue to the unit member appropriate salary warrants for payment of salary and shall deduct normal retirement and other authorized contributions.
- 8.3.8 In the event of termination of the industrial accident or illness leave prior to a permanent unit member's recovery, the unit member shall be granted an additional leave of absence without pay, not to exceed six (6) months. The District may renew the leave of absence

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- without pay, for one additional six (6) month period or a lesser period. For this purpose, the unit member's absence shall be deemed to have commenced on the date of termination of the industrial accident or illness leave.
- 8.3.9 A unit member, upon ability to resume the duties of a position within the class to which the unit member was assigned, may do so at any time during the leave of absence granted and time lost shall not be considered a break in service. The unit member shall be restored to a position within the class to which the unit member was assigned with all rights and benefits of a permanent unit member.
- 8.3.10 If the unit member continues to receive temporary disability indemnity, the unit member may elect to take as much accumulated sick leave which, when added to the temporary disability indemnity will result in a payment of not more than the unit member's full salary.
- 8.3.11 When all available leaves of absence, paid or unpaid, have been exhausted and the unit member is not medically able to assume the duties of their position, and if the unit member is not placed in another position, the unit member shall be placed on a reemployment list for a period of 39 months.
- 8.3.12 At any time, during the prescribed 39 months, the unit member is able to assume the duties of the unit member's position, the unit member shall be re-employed in the first vacancy in the classification of the previous assignment. The re-employment will take preference over all other applicants except for those laid off for lack of work or funds under Article 9 of this Agreement in which case the unit member shall be ranked according to proper seniority.
- 8.3.13 A unit member who has been placed on a re-employment list, as provided herein, and who has been medically released for return to duty, but fails to accept an appropriate assignment, shall be dismissed.
- 8.3.14 An injured unit member and unit members subpoenaed by the court may attend the injured <u>unit member employee</u>'s hearing concerning an appeal of a State Compensation Insurance claim. These unit members shall attend without loss of pay.

8.4 PERSONAL NECESSITY LEAVE

- 8.4.1 A unit member may utilize eight (8) days of accumulated sick leave for personal necessity leave. Personal necessity leave will be approved for the following reasons and cannot be used for recreational, vocational, or concerted activities. Unit members are required to request prior approval from the supervisor for personal necessity leave, with the exception of two (2) days in accordance with 8.4.1.6., which may be taken without providing a specific reason.
 - 8.4.1.1 Death of a Member of the Immediate Family. Members of the unit member's immediate family, and spouse or domestic partner's immediate family, as used in this policy, means the mother, father, grandmother, grandfather, grandchild, son,

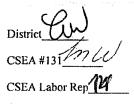
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- daughter, brother, or sister, or any relative living in the immediate household of the employee as defined in 8.5.2.
- 8.4.1.2 Accident. Should the unit member experience an accident to themselves, the unit member's property, or to the person or property of a member of the unit member's immediate family, and of such an emergency nature that the immediate presence of the unit member is required during the workday.
- 8.4.1.3 Appearance in Court as a Litigant, Party or Witness. Under subpoena or any other order made with jurisdiction.
- 8.4.1.4 Serious or Critical Illness of a Member of the Immediate Family. As defined in Section 45207 of the Education Code, this section refers to an illness calling for the services of a physician and of such an emergency nature that the immediate presence of the unit member is required during the workday.
- 8.4.1.5 Attendance at Birth. The attendance of a spouse or domestic partner at the time of the birth of a child when such events occur during the regular workday.
- 8.4.1.6 Other Serious and Compelling Matters. Personal necessity leave may be used for other serious and compelling matters that cannot be reasonably accomplished outside of normal working hours. The unit member must state the specific reason for which the leave was taken. However, two (2) of the days may be taken without giving a specific reason unless the District has a reasonable basis to question that it meets the criteria of this section.
- 8.4.2 The unit member shall specify the reason for the personal necessity leave in the "Notes to the administrator" section of the district-adopted absence management system.

8.5 BEREAVEMENT LEAVE

- 8.5.1 All unit members are entitled to a leave of absence, not to exceed three (3) days, or five (5) days if more than 200 miles of travel is required on account of the death of any member of the immediate family. This leave shall not be deducted from sick leave.
- 8.5.2 Members of the immediate family, as used in this policy, means the unit member's, unit member's spouse or domestic partner's:
 - spouse,
 - · children,
 - step-children,
 - · mother, father, parents,
 - siblings,
 - step-parents,
 - · parents in law, grandmother, grandfather, grandparents,
 - grandchildren,



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- or any person or relative living in the immediate household, of the unit member or of the spouse or the domestic partner of
- 8.5.3 The Superintendent or designee may waive the immediate family definition if warranted by extenuating circumstances.
- 8.5.4 Any additional days requested by the unit member beyond those provided in this policy must be handled through the provisions of section 8.4.
- 8.5.5 The unit member shall be required to use the days provided in this section prior to utilizing the benefits included in section 8.4.

8.6 PERSONAL LEAVE OF ABSENCE WITHOUT PAY

- 8.6.1 Unit members employed for three (3) consecutive years are eligible to request personal leave of absence without pay, which may be granted at the discretion of the Superintendent or designee.
- 8.6.2 Unit members who work less than 12 months may elect to take unpaid personal leave on scheduled work days during winter break, February (mid-winter) break, and/or spring break.
- 8.6.3 Benefits while on leave of absence without pay shall not be counted toward seniority, compensation, sick leave, vacation privileges, or retirement service credit as applicable by law.
- 8.6.4 Request for personal leave of absence without pay shall be made on the appropriate form and shall state specifically the reasons for the request, the date when it is desired to begin the leave, and the probable date of return. The requests shall be submitted as far in advance of the requested starting date as is reasonably possible to the unit member's supervisor for approval, and then submitted for approval by the Superintendent or designee.
- 8.6.5 A unit member on leave must give notification no less than thirty (30) days prior to the expiration of the leave that it is the intention of the employee to return to the unit member's classification. Failure to do so shall cause the unit member to be placed on the re-employment list for the classification for a period of 39 months.
- 8.6.6 The District may cancel any leave of absence upon evidence that the cause for granting it was misrepresented. Before any revocation is ordered, the employee shall be notified and have the right to request a hearing before the Superintendent or designee.
- 8.6.7 A unit member, while on leave of absence, may not accept other gainful employment with another employer without express written approval of the Superintendent or designee.

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8.7 JURY DUTY LEAVE

- 8.7.1 A unit member called to serve on a jury will be allowed a paid leave of absence while on jury duty. On those days, or portions of days, when the unit member is not actually serving on the jury, the unit member is expected to report to work. The unit member's full salary will be paid by the District; however, the unit member will be required to endorse duty checks to the District. The unit member will retain any amount paid for meals and travel expenses.
- 8.7.2 Any day during which the unit member whose regular assigned shift commences at or after 3:00 p.m. and who is required to serve all of the day on jury duty shall be relieved from work with pay.

8.8 MILITARY LEAVE

- 8.8.1 Unit members shall be entitled to the military leave provided by California law for classified employees of school districts if they meet the requirements imposed within the law, make the request for leave in a time which allows for the District to replace their services (except in national emergencies as declared by the President of the United States of America) and provide such other verification as required by the District to ensure that the leave is taken for the purpose for which it was intended by law.
- 8.8.2 A unit member granted Military Leave of Absence is entitled to return to the classification at the current rate of pay that was held when the unit member entered the service.
- 8.8.3 The unit member must provide written notification to the Superintendent or designee requesting Military Leave of Absence. The unit member shall return to employment within six months after separation from military service, in accordance with Education Code 44800. Failure to do so could affect the unit member's return to their former position.
- 8.8.4 Probationary unit members returning from Military Leave of Absence shall remain on probation until the total probationary time held prior to entry into the Service and total probationary time after returning to employment with the District reaches the nine (9) month period; the returning employee will then be evaluated to become a permanent unit member.
- 8.8.5 If experience gained while in the Military Service is beneficial to the District and meets the qualifications required of the classification held prior to the unit member's entry in to the Service, the returning employee may submit proof of Military experience to the Superintendent or designee and the supervisor for evaluation. The Superintendent or designee may elect to count the time in the Military Service as time toward the unit member's probationary requirement and the unit member may receive permanent status.

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8.9 QUARANTINE

- 8.9.1 If a member of the family of a unit member is quarantined because of a contagious disease, and the unit member is required to remain at home, the unit member may elect to have this time charged against paid sick leave.
- 8.9.2 In order to be paid for quarantine under the sick leave policy, a doctor's certificate must be furnished, stating the quarantine was a Health Department restriction placed on entry and departure of the entire household.

8.10 PREGNANCY, FAMILY, AND MEDICAL LEAVES

- 8.10.1 The District shall grant a leave of absence for medical reasons associated with pregnancy and birth to unit members on the same terms and conditions governing leaves of absence for all other illness or medical disabilities.
- 8.10.2 Unit members who must be absent from duty because of disability as a result of pregnancy or convalescence following childbirth or a miscarriage are eligible for pregnancy disability leave which shall be taken from accrued sick leave.
- 8.10.3 Accrued sick leave benefits will commence upon certification by a physician or other licensed health advisor that the unit member is disabled because of pregnancy or convalescence from childbirth or miscarriage. The District shall require a doctor's release to return to employment. If in the opinion of the supervisor, the unit member is unable to perform assigned duties, the District may require at District expense a verification of ability to perform duties.
- 8.10.4 The District shall not refuse to do any of the following because of a unit member's pregnancy: hire or employ; ban or discharge the unit member from employment; bar the unit member from training programs leading to employment, reassignment, or promotion; or discriminate against the unit member in compensation or in terms, conditions, or privileges of employment.
- 8.10.5 Beginning with the date of disability, the unit member shall be placed on long-term illness leave during which the unit member may use all sick leave benefits.
- 8.10.6 Such accumulated personal illness/injury benefits shall continue until the unit member's attending physician or other licensed health advisor certifies that the unit member is able to return to service following delivery or miscarriage.
- 8.10.7 Unit members may request a leave of absence following termination of the disability.
- 8.10.8 The District shall comply with all provisions of the Family Medical Leave Act (FMLA) and California Family Rights Act (CFRA). Unit members shall contact Human Resources at least thirty (30) days in advance if the need for medical or family leave is foreseeable. If the thirty (30) days advance notice is not possible, then notice shall be

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- provided as soon as practicable. Any medical or family leave request will be processed in accordance with the applicable provisions of state and federal law.
- 8.10.9 The district shall provide a reasonable amount of break time to accommodate a unit member each time the unit member has a need to express breast milk for an infant child. To the extent possible, such break time shall run concurrently with the break time already provided to the unit member. Any additional break time used by a unit member for this purpose shall be unpaid. The unit member shall be provided a private location, other than a restroom, which is in close proximity to the work area and meets the requirements of Labor Code 1031 and 29 USC 207, as applicable.

ARTICLE 9. HOURS AND OVERTIME

- 9.1 The workday for full-time unit members shall be eight (8) hours per day with the workweek being forty (40) hours per week consisting of not more than five (5) consecutive working days from Monday through Friday.
- 9.2 The initial workday and workweek for part-time unit members shall be established by the District. The workday so established shall be the basis for determining vacation, sick leave, and holiday pay for part-time unit members. Whenever a part-time unit member works more than thirty (30) minutes over the established workday, for twenty (20) consecutive workdays, a new workday is then established and the unit member shall be allowed vacation, sick leave, and holiday pay based on the new workday.
 - 9.2.1 Any reduction in assigned time shall be accomplished in accordance with the Education Code and the Educational Employment Relations Act (EERA).
 - 9.2.2 The district may assign up to one hour per day of additional time to a part-time position on a regular basis. The assignment shall be offered to the unit member in the appropriate class at the discretion of the immediate supervisor. In making the recommendation, the immediate supervisor will consider the following factors: experience, job-related interests and strengths, evaluations, and where other factors are equal, seniority in the school district.
 - 9.2.3 The District reserves the right to change the regular workday or workweek when it is deemed necessary to carry out the District's business; provided, however, that any change which involves modification of a Monday through Friday workweek or more than one hour in beginning or ending time will be negotiated with CSEA.

9.3 BREAKS

9.3.1 Unit members shall receive paid rest periods (breaks) in accordance with the schedule in 9.3.3. Rest periods are part of the regular workday and shall be compensated at the regular rate of pay for the unit member. These rest periods are not cumulative and may not be taken in any other way than described herein. The rest period shall be scheduled by the appropriate supervisor.

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9.5 SHIFT DIFFERENTIAL

- 9.5.1 If any unit member's assigned work shift commences between 2:00 p.m. and 5:00 p.m., the unit member shall be paid a shift differential premium of one percent above the base rate of pay for all hours worked.
- 9.5.2 Any unit member called to work by the immediate supervisor at a time when the unit member is not scheduled to work shall receive a minimum of three (3) hours pay at the appropriate rate of pay under this Agreement.
- 9.5.3 Any unit member shall have the right to reject any offer or request for overtime or call back, unless on standby time.
- All standby time shall be considered as regular hours worked and shall be compensated on a straight time or overtime basis as are other hours worked under this Agreement. Standby time is the time in which an employee unit member must remain available when required by the immediate supervisor.
 - 9.5.5 No unit member whose regular yearly assignment for service excludes all, or any part of, the period between the end of the academic year in June to the beginning of the next academic year in September, shall be required to perform services during such period. When necessary to assign unit members not regularly assigned to serve between the end of one academic year and the commencement of another who are willing to serve, such assignment shall be made on the basis of qualifications for employment at the reasonable discretion of the immediate supervisor. In making the assignment, the immediate supervisor will consider the job-related strength and evaluation of the employee unit member and where these factors are equal, seniority in the District.
 - 9.5.6 Unit members hired during the extended year shall receive the same compensation as provided during the regular school year when assigned a similar class.

9.6 AFTER-HOURS CALLS

9.6.1 After hours calls shall be directed to District management. Should the District require the services of a unit member after regular work hours, the manager will authorize the unit member(s) to perform the necessary work and pay the appropriate rate of pay.

9.7 9.6 INSERVICE TRAINING

- 9.6.1 9.7.1 The District agrees to provide employee training in concepts of safety in compliance with state and federal OSHA regulations.
- 9.6.2 9.7.2 Unit members attending any training sessions during or outside the regular workday, which has been recommended by their immediate supervisor and approved by the District, shall be compensated for necessary expenses incurred, i.e., registration fees, supplies, transportation, meals, and regular straight time or overtime salary.

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- Any unit member working more than five (5) hours shall have an unpaid, uninterrupted lunch for at least thirty (30) minutes at a time that is mutually agreeable between the unit member and the supervisor, in accordance with the schedule in 9.3.3.
- Paid rest periods and unpaid lunch periods shall be provided in the following increments:

9.4 **OVERTIME**

- All overtime work requires the prior approval of the supervisor. 9.4.1
- 9.4.2 All overtime worked in excess of eight (8) hours per day or forty (40) hours per week, shall be paid at the rate of one and one-half (1-1/2) times the regular hourly rate of the unit member.
- 9.4.3 Full-time unit members whose established workday and workweek is eight (8) hours per day, five (5) days per week shall be paid overtime for all work performed over eight (8) hours per day or forty (40) hours per week. Overtime at a rate equal to one and one-half (1½) times the regular rate of pay, will be paid for all work performed on the sixth and seventh day of that scheduled workweek designated and authorized to perform the work.
- 9.4.4 Part-time unit members shall be paid overtime for all work performed over eight (8) hours per day, or for all work performed on the sixth and seventh day.
- 9.4.5 For the purpose of computing the number of hours worked, time during which a unit member is excused from work because of holidays, sick leave, vacation, compensation time off, or other paid leave of absence shall be considered as time worked by the unit member.
- If a unit member must work on a holiday, they will receive regular pay for that day plus one and one-half (1-1/2) times the regular hourly rate for the number of hours worked that day.

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ARTICLE 12. PAY AND ALLOWANCES

- 12.1 Classification of each bargaining unit position shall be in accordance with the rates established for each range and step as provided for in Appendix A (Classification Chart) which is attached hereto and by reference incorporated as part of this Agreement.
- 12.2 The regular rate of pay for each position for each class as provided for in Appendix B (Salary Schedules) which is attached hereto and is by reference incorporated as part of this Agreement. The regular rate of pay shall include any shift differential and/or longevity increment requirement to be paid under this Agreement.
- 12.3 PAYCHECK FREQUENCY. The calendar month is the official pay period of the District. All unit members shall be paid twice per month payable on the tenth (10th) and on the twenty-fifth (25th) of the month. The check issued on the 10th of the month will reflect deductions for withholding, retirement, social security, and such other approved deductions as may have been requested. The check issued on the 25th of the month is an Earned Salary Advance. If the normal pay date falls on a Saturday, Sunday, or holiday, the paycheck shall be issued on the preceding workday.

12.4 PAYROLL ERRORS

- 12.4.1 Any payroll error resulting in insufficient payment for a unit member shall be corrected, and a supplemental check issued, not later than three (3) working days after the employee unit member provides notice to the Business Department. Overpayments will be deducted in the same time frame as the overpayment occurred (i.e., if employee unit member is overpaid for one month the deduction will be made to the next check; however, if an employee unit member through District error is overpaid for a year, the deductions will likewise be taken over a one-year period). It is understood by the Association that in the event that a unit member should terminate their employment with the District prior to paying back the entire overpayment, the District has the right to fully withhold all wages earned during the last period of employment. Furthermore, the District may take legal action to recover further repayment to fulfill the total overpayment.
- Any payroll adjustments due a unit member as a result of working out of class, recomputation of hours, or other reasons other than procedural errors shall be made and the unit member compensated on the following pay period.
- MILEAGE. A unit member employee required to use their vehicle on District approved business shall be reimbursed at the rate established by the Internal Revenue Service (IRS) for all miles driven on behalf of the District. The mileage computation shall include mileage necessary to return to the unit member's regular job site after the completion of District business. This amount, following submission of the claim by the unit member, shall be payable in a separate warrant drawn against District funds.

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12.6 MEALS AND/OR LODGING. A unit member who, as a result of work assignment, must be lodged away from home overnight shall be reimbursed by the District for the reasonable and necessary expenses. Where possible, the District shall provide advance funds to the unit member for lodging and meals. If advance funds are not available or do not cover the cost of required expenditures, the District shall reimburse the unit member within a reasonable time after the unit member has submitted an expense claim.

12.7 ANNIVERSARY DATE FOR THE PURPOSE OF STEP INCREASE

- 12.7.1 For the purpose of this Article, unit members who are hired on or prior to the 15th day of the month shall be entitled to an anniversary date effective the first day of the ninth month following the hire date. Unit members hired on the 16th day of the month, or any day thereafter, shall be entitled to an anniversary date on the first day of the tenth month following date of hire.
- 12.7.2 Each succeeding step will be attained one year from this established anniversary date, until the maximum step in the classification has been achieved.
- 12.7.3 Any unit member who receives a promotion to a class allocated to a higher salary range, shall be placed on the step of the salary range which is next above the rate the unit member received in the previous class. At this time, the unit member will begin a new probationary period of nine months from the date of change, and the anniversary date will be changed to coincide with the completion of the nine-month probationary period in this new position (see Article 12.7.1 above), provided the new position requires additional skills. Increments in anniversary salary increases will proceed as stated in Article 12.7.2 above.
- 12.7.4 When a unit member is restored to their previous salary step after a personal leave of absence without pay for a period not longer than ninety (90) calendar days, the unit member shall receive credit for step advancement for service prior to the leave. The anniversary date shall be adjusted accordingly so the unit member shall be granted a step advancement after having completed the one year of total service. Credit toward a step advance within a range shall accrue when the State Education Code sections relating to military leave requires credit for step advancement during the period of the leave of absence.

12.8 SALARY SCHEDULE ADJUSTMENTS

- 12.8.1 The District will increase the CSEA Salary Schedule by 2% for 2018-2019. During the term of this agreement, should any recognized Laguna Beach Unified School District bargaining unit reach a signed agreement that results in a higher total compensation than provided to the members of the Chapter 131 CSEA unit members, the district agrees to adjust the total compensation provided to CSEA unit members to an equivalent amount.
- 12.8.2 The District shall allocate one-half percent (0.5%) of base salary as a one-time, off schedule salary payment for all unit members employed by the District as of July 1, 2018.

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- 12.8.3 In addition, if the 2018-19 adopted State Budget results in an increase in one-time unrestricted funds, the District shall allocate CSEA's proportional share of the additional funds up to 1% as a one-time, off schedule salary payment for all unit members employed by the District as of July 1, 2018.
- 12.9 LONGEVITY PAY. Long Service Recognition will be granted upon completion of years of service in the District as follows:
 - 10 years 6.50% of base salary
 - 15 years additional 2.50% of base salary
 - 20 years additional 2.50% of base salary
 - 25 years additional 2.50% of base salary

Unit members who received 4% longevity at 5 years of service prior to July 1, 2016 will continue i fi bi bay mbiy ka ka afaw yaka bi biyakay pegapaga maa to receive it.

12.10 PROFESSIONAL DEVELOPMENT

12.10.1 The District will provide a professional development program to include a variety of topics with three proficiency levels. Each level includes a training component that is required. All professional development training must be conducted on the employee's unit member's own time.

In addition to the training component, the employee unit member will be required to demonstrate proficiency. Some tasks may require an assessment. Others may require the employee to submit evidence of proficiency in the context of his or her position, such as a screenshot, observation, or a producing a product. After completing the required training and demonstrating evidence of proficiency of a particular level, the employee unit member will earn a "micro-credential" in that subject and be paid the following one-time stipends:

Level 1 Stipend - \$50

Level 2 Stipend - \$100

Level 3 Stipend - \$250

12.10.2 CONTINUING EDUCATION

Unit members shall request approval to utilize community college, university or continuing education units (CEUs) toward a licensure and/or certification as a Level 3 professional development opportunity, up to one per semester. Units must be applicable to the unit member's job classification. Requests shall be submitted to the unit member's supervisor using the district form no later than 14 days prior to the commencement of the course, which will then be submitted to the Human Resources office for final approval. Once completed, the unit member is required to submit evidence of a passing grade (C or better) to the Human Resources office before the stipend is issued.

12.11 EXTRA DUTY PAY

12.11.1 Extra Duty PayThe following extra duty structure is established for Instructional Assistant, Special Education. The need and duration of the assignment is determined by the supervisor.

5% in addition to base salary—Instructional Assistant, Special Education Extra Duty pay, Type A is to be paid to the assistant who assists students who are orthopedically impaired and/or have a serious health condition requiring a Health Care Plan or toileting assistance.

1.5% in addition to base salary—Instructional Assistant, Special Education Extra Duty Stipend, Type B is to be paid to the aide who assists, provides minimal to moderate toileting assistance and/or specialized care to students with a Health Care Plan.

At the beginning of the school year, the Special Education Office will provide a Personnel Action Report (PAR) form to the Human Resources Office listing the Instructional Assistant, Special Education positions who are to receive the Type A or Type B extra duty and dates the pay is to be issued.

12.11.2 Unit members who perform their regular duties beyond their assigned work hours are paid at the regular or overtime rate of pay as appropriate. Unit members who are required to attend training and/or assigned to perform duties, including required participation on committees, outside of their regular assignment shall receive the short-term classified rate of pay. This section excludes negotiations.

ARTICLE 13. ORGANIZATIONAL SECURITY

- 13.1 The District and the Association recognize the right of employees to form, join and participate in lawful activities of employee organizations and the equal alternative right of employees to refuse to form, join, and participate in employee organizations. Either party shall not exert pressure on or discriminate against an employee regarding such matters.
- 13.2 Membership in the Association is not compulsory. Except as provided elsewhere in this Agreement, all members of the bargaining unit, or in the case of new bargaining unit members hired during this Agreement, shall on or before the thirtieth (30th) day following either the beginning date of employment or the collective bargaining agreement, whichever is later:
 - 13.2.1 Become a member of the Association.
 - 13.2.2 All bargaining unit members who are not members of the Association shall pay to the Association during the term of the Agreement a service fee in the amount equal to the Association's monthly dues for representing such employees. The service fee payment described herein may be made, at the employee's option, either through payroll deduction, or by payment directly to the Association. If a unit member feels that the service fee includes payment for activities not necessary for representation, the unit

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- member may apply directly to CSEA Executive Director, P.O. Box 640, San Jose, CA, 95106, for a rebate.
- 13.2.3 Upon ratification of this Agreement, all employees covered by this Agreement who are members of the Association shall be required to remain members of the Association for the duration of this Agreement. All employees hired prior to July 1, 1985, who are not members of the Association, shall be exempt from section 13.2.2, stated above.
- 13.2.4 The District agrees to provide the Association notice of a new employee's hire date, elassification and work location within thirty (30) days of employment. The District shall provide the Association the following information within 10 working days of the employee's hire date, assuming the information is retained by the District: name, job title, department, work location, work, home, and personal cellular telephone numbers; personal email addresses on file with the employer; and home address.

This information shall be provided for all bargaining unit members on or before every September 30, January 30 and June 30.

Employees may submit a written request, pursuant to Government Code section 6254.3(c), prohibiting the disclosure of their home address, home telephone number, personal cellular telephone number, and personal email address. The District shall not encourage employees to opt out.

Any alleged violation, misinterpretation, or misapplication of the terms of this agreement shall be subject to the grievance procedures of the Collective Bargaining Agreement Article 5.

- 13.3 The interpretation, application, administration and enforcement of this Article shall be in accordance with the requirements of the Government Code section 3540 et seq., as amended, and construed by the Public Employment Relations Board, Federal and State Courts and to the extent that it does not conflict with any federal or state laws.
- 13.4 MEMBERSHIP AND SERVICE FEES. The District shall deduct in accordance with the Association's established dues of all employees who are members of the Association of the date of the execution of this Agreement, and who have submitted dues authorization forms to the District. The Association will provide the District any changes to proposed fee schedule 45 days prior to the effective date.
- 13.5 The District shall deduct in accordance with the Association Service Fee Schedule for employees who have submitted a service authorization form as a contribution toward the administration of this Agreement and the representation of such employees. This service fee shall be in the same amount and payable at the same time as the Association's regular dues, exclusive of initiation fees.

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13.6 **RELIGIOUS OBJECTIONS.** Any employee covered by this Agreement who is a member of a religious body whose traditional tenets or teachings include objections to joining or financially supporting employee organizations, shall not be required to join, maintain membership in or financially support any employee organization as a condition of employment except that once such employee has submitted evidence to the Association which proves that he/she they sincerely holds such beliefs will be required, in lieu of a service fee, to pay sums equal to such service fee either to a non-religious, non-labor organization, charitable fund exempt from taxation under Section 501 (c)(3) of Title 26 of the Internal Revenue Code, chosen by such employee from the following list of three:

13.6.1	Thurston Foundation
13.6.2	Children's Hospital of Orange County
13.6.3	Laguna Beach Educational Foundation

- an employee belongs to a religious body described herein shall, within thirty (30) days of the date of this Agreement, or their employment, present proof to the Association that they are a member of such religious body and shall execute a written authorization for the payroll deduction in an amount equal to the service fee payable to one of the three (3) organizations listed in Section 13.6 of this Agreement, or in the alternative, such employee shall provide proof to the District that such payments have been made on an annual basis as a condition of continued exemption from the requirement of financial support of the exclusive representative. If such employee who holds conscientious objections pursuant to this section requests from the employee organization to use the grievance procedure or arbitration procedure on the employee's behalf, the employee organization is authorized to charge the employee for the reasonable cost of using such procedure.
- In the event that an employee revokes a dues or service fee authorization or fails to make arrangements with the Association for the direct payment of service fees, the District shall deduct service fees until such time as the Association notifies the District that arrangements have been made for the payment of such fees. When the Association notifies the District of non-payment by the unit member, the District may, at its option, schedule a meeting to include an Association representative and the unit member within ten (10) days of notice prior to deducting the service fee. After the meeting, the District agrees to deduct the fee upon written request from the Association.
- 13.9 The Association shall hold the employer harmless on account of any monies deducted and remitted to the Association pursuant to this section.

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13.10 As a condition of the effectiveness of this Article, the Association agrees to indemnify and save the District, Board of Education, each individual school board member, and all administrators in the District, harmless against any and all claims, demands, costs, lawsuits, and judgments or other forms of liability and all court or administrative agency costs that may arise out of or by reason or action taken by the District for the purpose of complying with this Article.

ARTICLE 16. VACATIONS

16.1 Full-time classified employees <u>unit members</u> assigned on a twelve-month basis are entitled to eight (8) hours of vacation or one day with pay for each month of service.

Unit members shall accumulate and be credited with vacation according to the following schedule:

- 16.2 Vacation will be allocated on July 1 of each fiscal year and will be pro-rated upon initial employment. Upon separation from employment, unearned vacation will be deducted from final pay. The District reserves the right to pay out any unused vacation on June 30 of each fiscal year.
- 16.3 All full-time employees <u>unit members</u> assigned on a twelve-month basis may carryover a maximum of ten (10) days of unused vacation from one fiscal year to the following fiscal year.
- 16.4 The maximum vacation taken at one time in one year shall be three (3) weeks (120 hours) unless otherwise agreed to in advance by the District. Unit members may access vacation balances through the OCDE Employee Information System.
- 16.5 Permanent employees unit members working less than 12 months who choose to take personal leave without pay on scheduled work days during the winter, February (mid-winter) and/or spring breaks shall be paid out the amount equal to the personal leave taken from their accrued vacation available as of the last day of June of the current fiscal year on their July 10th paycheck.

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- 16.6 An employee unit member may be granted vacation during the school year, even though not earned at the time the vacation is taken, upon approval of the immediate supervisor.
- 16.7 If an employee a unit member is terminated and had taken vacation which was not yet earned at the time of termination, the District shall deduct from the employee's unit member's severance check the full amount of salary which was paid for such unearned days of vacation taken.
- 16.8 Upon separation from service, (termination, resignation, reduction of hours, and layoff) the employee unit member shall be entitled to be paid a lump-sum compensation for all earned and unused vacation. Employees Unit members who have not completed six months of employment in regular status shall not be entitled to such compensation.
- 16.9 Employees <u>Unit members</u> affected by a layoff (reduction in work year/hours) may be permitted to carryover unused vacation time to the next fiscal year subject to prior approval of the Superintendent.
- 16.10 Vacations shall be scheduled at the mutual convenience of the employee unit member and the District. If an employee a unit member is dissatisfied with the scheduled time, he or she the unit member may appeal to the next level of management to resolve the issue.
- 16.11 If there is any conflict between <u>employees unit members</u> who are working on the same or similar operations as to when vacations shall be taken, the <u>employee</u> <u>unit member</u> with the highest seniority shall be given his/her preference.
- 16.12 Unless a special permission is obtained, vacations should not be scheduled during the two weeks immediately preceding the opening of the school term, and the two weeks immediately preceding the closing of school.
- 16.13 If an employee's <u>unit member's</u> approved vacation must be postponed or interrupted due to illness, bereavement, or injury he/she may reschedule the vacation, or with District approval, carryover the unused vacation to the following school year, provided the employee <u>unit member</u> supplies adequate notice and relevant supporting information regarding the basis for such interruption or termination.
- 16.14 A granted holiday will not be charged as a day of vacation.
- 16.15 Employees <u>Unit members</u> on a paid leave of absence shall not be considered to have a break in service for purposes of earning vacation. Any period of unpaid absence, including reduction of hours and layoff shall be considered a break in service for purposes of earning vacation.

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16.16 An employee A unit member who terminates his/her employment with the District and who subsequently returns to employment with the District shall be reinstated with years of service for the purposes of earning benefits under this provision.

ARTICLE 17. EVALUATION PROCEDURES

- 17.1 The evaluation of classified employees unit members is the responsibility of the immediate supervisor.
- 17.2 Every employee unit member will be evaluated in writing on a standard evaluation form provided by the Human Resources Department. The form shall be developed by the District in consultation with the Association. Probationary employees unit members will be evaluated prior to the end of the fourth and eighth month. All other employees unit members will have a formal evaluation no less than biannually biennially before May 15. It is clearly understood that individual supervisors may evaluate an employee a unit member at any time. The probationary period is the nine-month period of service immediately following appointment to a regular position. If service is deemed unsatisfactory, the evaluation report shall include recommendations for improvement and provisions for assisting the employee unit member in implementing the recommendations made.
- 17.3 Evaluations should be based upon the direct observation or knowledge of an employee's <u>a unit</u> member's work performance by their immediate supervisor.
- 17.4 The <u>employee unit member</u> shall have the right to submit a formal written statement regarding items on the evaluation. This statement shall be attached to the evaluation in the <u>employee's unit</u> member's file.
- 17.5 The personnel file of each employee unit member shall be maintained at the District's Central Administration Office. No evaluation of any employee unit member shall be placed in the District Personnel File without an opportunity for discussion between the employee unit member and the immediate supervisor. Information of a derogatory nature, except materials that include ratings, reports, or records which were obtained prior to the employment of the employeeunit member, shall not be entered or filed unless and until the employee unit member is given notice and an opportunity to review and comment.
- 17.6 Materials kept by the employer which concern the performance of the employee unit member shall be available for examination by the employee unit member after the provision of reasonable notice. Employees Unit members will be given a written copy of all information,

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- including information that may be used for disciplinary purposes, before such information is placed in their personnel file.
- 17.7 The evaluation process is subject to the grievance procedures of Article 5 of this Agreement.
- 17.8 Every employee unit member shall have the right to inspect such materials upon request, provided that the request for review is made at a time when he/she is not actually required to render service to the District.
- 17.9 An employee A unit member shall have the right to enter his/her their own comment on, and have the comments attached to, any such derogatory statement. Such review shall take place during normal business hours, and the employee unit member shall be released from duty for this purpose without loss of pay.

ARTICLE 21. STATE DISABILITY INSURANCE

21.1 The District agrees to make available to members of the Bargaining Unit State Disability
Insurance as prescribed in the Insurance Code and the Government Code. The monthly
premiums shall be paid by the members of the bargaining unit in accordance with the schedule as
required by the State. This provision is exempt from the Grievance Procedure in Article 5 of this
Agreement.

ARTICLE 21 22. NO DISCRIMINATION

22.1 21.1 No member of the bargaining unit shall be discriminated against because of membership in an employee association or for political or religious opinions or affiliations, race, color, national origin or ancestry, sex, gender, marital status, physical handicaps, age, or sexual orientation.

ARTICLE 22 23. HEALTH BENEFITS

23.1 22.1 Employee Unit Member and Dependent Insurance Programs

- 23.1.122.1.1 The District agrees to provide elassified employees unit members and their dependents; domestic partners registered with the State and their dependents, with medical, dental, life and vision insurance programs as specified in 2322.2.
- 23.1.222.1.2 The District agrees to pay medical, dental and vision premiums for unit members as follows, up to the district cap as specified in 2322.1.3:

22.1.2.1 Pursuant to the 2017-2018 agreement, unit members who work 5.75
hours per day, five (5) days per week, having completed at least five (5)
years of service to the district based on date of hire prior to June 30, 2012
are eligible for medical, dental and vision benefits for the unit member
only and 50% of the premium for dependents. This section shall not
apply to unit members hired after June 30, 2012.

23.1.322.1.3 The total dollars budgeted for all District employee benefits in the 2017-2018 school year is \$4,559,000. The cap remains in force unless otherwise expressly agreed to.

If the health and welfare cost containment strategies of any other employee group(s) in LBUSD are not successful, the benefited classified employee pool will be held harmless, and shall not affect future negotiated total compensation for classified employees in LBUSD.

The District will contribute the following maximum amounts for eligible unit members as specified in 22.1.2:

Eligible unit members shall be responsible for any costs incurred over the individual district contribution, which is specified in Appendix D.

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- 23.22.2 Benefit <u>Plan Designs</u> <u>Modifications</u> effective October 1, 20187. See Appendix D for complete and specific information concerning all medical, dental, and vision care benefits.
- 23.322.3 Eligibility. Present employees unit members may only request to elect to take health, life, vision, and dental insurance coverage prior to October 1 of each year to become effective October 1 of that year. New employees unit members desiring to enroll MUST join any time during the first thirty (30) days of their employment. Health, life, vision and dental insurance coverage for employees unit members and/or their dependents is not automatic, employees unit members must fill out the appropriate enrollment forms in order to be covered.
- 23.422.4 Health & Welfare Insurance Committee. The parties agree to maintain a District Employee Health & Welfare Insurance Committee, the membership of which shall be composed of at least four representatives from the Association. This Committee shall periodically research and review proposed and existing programs to insure ensure that quality and cost effectiveness criteria are maintained. The Committee shall meet periodically with insurance providers to determine that benefits are being accorded as required by the various benefits programs. Each of the four (4) CSEA representatives to the Committee shall be paid a stipend of \$1000 the short-term hourly rate of pay for meetings that extend beyond the unit member's regular work day.

23.522.5 Early Retirement Health Benefit Program

- 23.5.122.5.1 Any full-time employee unit member eligible to retire under the PERS regulations who has worked a minimum of five (5) consecutive years in District employment and who has initiated the steps to withdraw retirement funds from PERS has the option to continue his/her medical coverage under the District medical plan at District expense. The retiree must currently be covered under one of the District's medical plans for at least 12 months prior to retirement. Disability retirement does not qualify as early retirement. Modifications to the insurance program for active unit members, which reduce coverage and increase unit member costs, are also applicable to the former unit members then retired.
- 23.5.222.5.2 The retiree may insure his/her spouse or registered domestic partner at retiree expense until such time as the spouse or domestic partner reaches the age of Medicare eligibility. The premium shall be the amount that the District pays for one year of coverage.
- 23.5.322.5.3 Any retiree who waives the right to participate in the early retirement health benefit program shall receive ten thousand (\$10,000) dollars annually until he or she the

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<u>retiree</u> meets one of the conditions in 23.5.5.6 below. If the retirement health benefit is waived for any eligible year, the retiree may not apply for benefit reinstatement.

- 23.5.422.5.4 It shall be the retiree's responsibility to pay the over-the-cap fee and dependent premium to the Business Office by the 10th of each school month. Default of two consecutive monthly payments shall result in the immediate termination of coverage; the District shall not assume the responsibility of reminding the retiree of premiums due.
- 23.5.522.5.5 Coverage for retiree or spouse or domestic partner being carried at the retiree's expense or any other option under the early retiree health benefit program shall terminate upon the first occurrence of any of the following conditions:
 - a. The retiree attains the mandatory Medicare enrollment age.
 - b. The retiree becomes eligible for MediCal or Medicare benefits under Social Security.
 - c. The retiree becomes eligible for medical insurance under any other LBUSD unit member benefit plan.
 - d. When the retiree reaches mandatory Medicare enrollment age or any other conditions listed in b or c above, the spouse or domestic partner may continue on one of the District's medical plans, at his/her the spouse's or domestic partner's own expense.

ARTICLE 23 24. MANAGEMENT RIGHTS AND EMPLOYER POWERS

It is understood and agreed that the employer retains all powers and authority to direct and control District operations to the full extent of the law. Included, but not limited to those duties and powers, are the rights in accordance with applicable laws and Employer regulations to direct the work of employees unit members; to determine the means and services to be provided; establish the educational philosophy, goals, and objectives of the employer, school and/or other activity; to insure the rights of students, classified employees, teachers, managers and Board of Education members; to determine the number and kinds of personnel required; to determine the job descriptions after consultation with the exclusive representative; to maintain the efficiency of the school District operation; to determine the curriculum; to build, move or modify the facilities; to develop a budget; to develop and implement budget procedures with staff input; to determine the methods of raising revenue. In addition, the Employer retains the right to hire, assign, evaluate, terminate, and discipline employees unit members. Further the Employer reserves the right to do all that is necessary to exercise the foregoing powers, rights, authority, duties and responsibilities, including but not limited to, the adoption of policies, rules, regulations, and practices in furtherance thereof, and the use of judgment and discretion in connection therewith, and shall be limited only by the specific and express terms of this Agreement, in conformance with the laws of the State of California.

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ARTICLE 24 25. CONFORMITY TO LAW-SAVINGS PROVISION

- 25.124.1 If any provisions of this Agreement are held to be contrary to law by a court of competent jurisdiction, such provisions will not be deemed valid and subsisting except to the extent permitted by law, but all other provisions will continue in full force.
- 25.224.2 Federal law within the scope of representation is cause for reopening of negotiations on only the article(s) affected. Should a provision or application be deemed invalid under the law by a court of competent jurisdiction, the parties shall meet no later than thirty (30) days after such court decision to re-negotiate the specific provision rendered invalid.

ARTICLE 25 26. PROHIBITION OF STRIKES AND LOCKOUTS

- Apart from and in addition to existing legal restrictions upon work stoppages, the Association hereby agrees that neither it nor its members, or agents, or representatives, or the employeesunit members, of persons acting in concert with any of them, shall incite, encourage, or participate in any strike, walkout, slowdown, sympathy strike, or other work stoppage of any nature whatsoever during the life of this Agreement, for disputes concerning matters not mentioned in this Agreement, disputes contending that the District has committed unfair employment practices, under EERA, disputes with other labor organizations, persons or employers, or jurisdictional disputes. In the event of any strike, walkout, slowdown, sympathy strike or work stoppage or threat thereof, the Association and its officers will do everything reasonable within their power to end or avert the same. The District will not lock out the employees unit members covered by the Agreement during the life of this Agreement.
- 26.2 25.2 Any employee unit member authorizing, engaging in, encouraging, sanctioning, recognizing or assisting any strike, slowdown, picketing, sympathy strike, work stoppage or other concerted interference in violation of this Article, or refusing to perform duly assigned services in violation of this Article, shall be subject to discipline up to and including termination.

ARTICLE 26 27. SUPPORT OF AGREEMENT

- 27.1-26.1 The District and the Association agree that it is to their mutual benefit to encourage the resolution of differences through the meet and negotiation process. Therefore, it is agreed that the District and Association will support this Agreement for its term and will not seek change or improvement in any matter subject to meet and negotiation process, except by mutual agreement of the District and the Association.
- 27.2 26.2 The parties agree that in the event of scribe's error(s) of omission or commission in the preparation of the current collective bargaining agreement (2015-2018 2018-2021), that the language of the Tentative Agreement(s) shall prevail in the event of a conflict(s).

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ARTICLE 27 28. TERM

28.1 27.1 The duration of the agreement shall be three years from July 1, 2018 2015, through June 30, 2021 2018, with re-openers of up to two articles, in addition to health and welfare and salary, for each party in year two and year three of the Agreement.

Best Best & Krieger's standard hourly rate for legal counsel related to special education issues is \$260 per hour.

Recommended Action

Staff recommends the Board of Education approve an increase to the agreement with Best Best & Krieger for legal services and advice related to special education issues for the 2017-2018 school year, with a not-to-exceed amount of \$20,000.

INDEPENDENT ATTORNEY AGREEMENT

This AGREEMENT is hereby entered into between the Laguna Beach Unified School District, hereinafter referred to as "DISTRICT," and <u>Best Best & Krieger LLP</u>; Address: 18101 Von Karman Ave., Suite 1000, Irvine, CA 92612; Phone: (949) 263-2600; hereinafter referred to as "ATTORNEY."

WHEREAS, DISTRICT is authorized by Section 53060 of the California Government Code to contract with and employ any persons for the furnishing of special services and advice in financial, economic, accounting, engineering, legal or administrative matters, if such persons are specially trained and experienced and competent to perform the special services required; and

It is understood that retainer of the ATTORNEY by District for the specialized services provided herein does not extend to matters of general representation for the District, and that the existing retainer agreement between the parties, as amended, shall continue in full force and effect except for the special services provided by this Agreement.
- 2. <u>Term.</u> ATTORNEY shall commence providing services under this AGREEMENT on <u>May 1, 2018</u> and will diligently perform as required through <u>June 30, 2018</u>.
- 3. <u>Compensation</u>. Services of the Firm pursuant to this Agreement shall be provided to District at the rate of Two Hundred Sixty Dollars (\$260.00) per hour. Paralegal rate at \$150.00 per hour. The scope of this Agreement shall not exceed \$20,000 without prior authorization from the DISTRICT. District shall pay ATTORNEY according to the following terms and conditions: <u>Upon monthly receipt of invoices indicating hours completed</u>.
- 4. <u>Expenses</u>. DISTRICT shall be liable to ATTORNEY for all costs and expenses incurred in the course of rendering such services.

- 5. <u>Independent Contractor.</u> ATTORNEY, in the performance of this AGREEMENT, shall be and act as an independent contractor. ATTORNEY understands and agrees that he/she and all of his/her employees shall not be considered officers, employees or agents of the DISTRICT, and are not entitled to benefits of any kind or nature normally provided employees of the DISTRICT and/or to which DISTRICT's employees are normally entitled, including, but not limited to, State Unemployment Compensation or Worker's Compensation. CONTRACTOR shall furnish, at his/her own expense, all labor, materials, equipment, supplies and other items necessary to complete the services to be provided pursuant to this AGREEMENT, except as follows: <u>None</u>. CONTRACTOR's services will be performed, findings obtained, reports and recommendations prepared in accordance with generally and currently accepted principles and practices of his/her profession.
- 7. Originality of Services. CONTRACTOR agrees that all technologies, formulae, procedures, processes, methods, writings, ideas, dialogue, compositions, recordings, teleplays, and video productions prepared for, written for, submitted to the DISTRICT and/or used in connection with this AGREEMENT, shall be wholly original to CONTRACTOR and shall not be copied in whole or in part from any other source, except that submitted to CONTRACTOR by DISTRICT as a basis for such services.
- 8. <u>Copyright/Trademark/Patent</u>. CONTRACTOR understands and agrees that all matters produced under this AGREEMENT shall become the property of DISTRICT and cannot be used without DISTRICT's express written permission. DISTRICT shall have all right, title and interest in said matters, including the right to secure and maintain the copyright, trademark and/or patent of said matter in the name of the DISTRICT. CONTRACTOR consents to use of CONTRACTOR's name in conjunction with the sale, use, performance and distribution of the matters, for any purpose and in any medium.
- 9. <u>Termination</u>. DISTRICT may, at any time, with or without reason, terminate this AGREEMENT and compensate CONTRACTOR only for services satisfactorily rendered to the date of termination. Written notice by DISTRICT shall be sufficient to stop further performance of services by CONTRACTOR. Notice shall be deemed given when received by the CONTRACTOR or no later than three days after the day of mailing, whichever is sooner.

DISTRICT may terminate this AGREEMENT upon giving of written notice of intention to terminate for cause. Cause shall include: (a) material violation of this AGREEMENT by the CONTRACTOR; or (b) any act by CONTRACTOR exposing the DISTRICT to liability to others for personal injury or property damage; or CONTRACTOR is adjudged a bankrupt, CONTRACTOR makes a general assignment for the benefit of creditors or a receiver is appointed on account of CONTRACTOR's insolvency. Written notice by DISTRICT shall contain the reasons for such intention to terminate and unless within five (5) days after service of such notice the condition or violation shall cease, or satisfactory arrangements for the correction thereof be made, this AGREEMENT shall upon the expiration of the five (5) days cease and terminate. In the event of such termination, the DISTRICT may secure the required services from another contractor. If the cost to the DISTRICT exceeds the cost of providing the service pursuant to this AGREEMENT, the excess cost shall be charged to and collected from the CONTRACTOR. The foregoing provisions are in addition to and not a limitation of any other rights or remedies available to DISTRICT. Written notice by DISTRICT shall be deemed given when received by the other party, or no later than three days after the day of mailing, whichever is sooner.

- 10. <u>Hold Harmless</u>. CONTRACTOR agrees to and does hereby indemnify, hold harmless and defend the DISTRICT and its governing board, officers, employees and agents from every claim or demand made and every liability, loss, damage or expense, of any nature whatsoever, which may be incurred by reason of:
 - (a) Liability for damages for: (1) death or bodily injury to person; (2) injury to, loss or theft of property; or (3) any other loss, damage or expense arising out of (1) or (2) above, sustained by the CONTRACTOR or any person, firm or corporation employed by the CONTRACTOR, either directly or by independent contract, upon or in connection with the services called for in this AGREEMENT, however caused, except for liability for damages referred to above which result from the sole negligence or willful misconduct of the DISTRICT or its officers, employees or agents.
 - (b) Any injury to or death of any persons, including the DISTRICT or its officers, employees and agents, or damage to or loss of any property caused by any act, neglect, default, or omission of the CONTRACTOR, or any person, firm or corporation employed by the CONTRACTOR, either directly or by independent contract, arising out of, or in any way connected with, the services covered by this AGREEMENT, whether said injury or damage occurs either on or off DISTRICT's property, except for liability for

- damages which result from the sole negligence or willful misconduct of the DISTRICT or its officers, employees or agents.
- (c) Any liability for damages which may arise from the furnishing or use of any copyrighted or uncopyrighted matter or patented or unpatented invention under this AGREEMENT.
- (d) Any acts or omissions by CONTRACTOR or any person or corporation employed by CONTRACTOR relating to services to be rendered under this Agreement.
- 11. <u>Insurance</u>. CONTRACTOR agrees to carry a comprehensive general and automobile liability insurance with limits of One Million Dollars (\$1,000,000) per occurrence combined single limit for bodily injury and property damage in a form mutually acceptable to both parties to protect CONTRACTOR and DISTRICT against liability or claims of liability which may arise out of this AGREEMENT In addition, CONTRACTOR agrees to provide an endorsement to this policy stating, "Such insurance as is afforded by this policy shall be primary, and any insurance carried by DISTRICT shall be excess and noncontributory." CONTRACTOR agrees to carry malpractice and/or professional liability in an amount satisfactory to DISTRICT. Prior to the execution of this Agreement, CONTRACTOR shall provide DISTRICT with certificates of insurance evidencing all coverages and endorsements required hereunder including a thirty (30) day written notice of cancellation or reduction in coverage. CONTRACTOR agrees that not less than 30 days prior to the expiration of any coverage, CONTRACTOR will provide evidence of renewal to DISTRICT. CONTRACTOR agrees to name DISTRICT and its officers, agents and employees as additional insureds under said policies. CONTRACTOR shall provide proof of current Worker's Compensation insurance for CONTRACTOR'S employees.
- 12. <u>Assignment</u>. The obligations of the CONTRACTOR pursuant to this AGREEMENT shall not be assigned by the CONTRACTOR without the prior written consent of District.
- 13. <u>Compliance With Applicable Laws</u>. The services completed herein must meet the approval of the DISTRICT and shall be subject to the DISTRICT's general right of inspection to secure the satisfactory completion thereof. CONTRACTOR agrees to comply with all federal, state and local laws, rules, regulations and ordinances that are now or may in the future become applicable to CONTRACTOR, CONTRACTOR's business, equipment and personnel engaged in operations covered by this AGREEMENT or accruing out of the performance of such operations.

- 14. <u>Permits/Licenses</u>. CONTRACTOR and all CONTRACTOR's employees or agents shall secure and maintain in force such permits and licenses as are required by law in connection with the furnishing of services pursuant to this AGREEMENT.
- 15. <u>Employment With Public Agency</u>. CONTRACTOR, if an employee of another public agency, agrees that CONTRACTOR will not receive salary or remuneration, other than vacation pay, as an employee of another public agency for the actual time in which services are actually being performed pursuant to this AGREEMENT.
- 16. <u>Entire Agreement/Amendment</u>. This AGREEMENT and any exhibits attached hereto constitute the entire agreement among the parties to it and supersedes any prior or contemporaneous understanding or agreement with respect to the services contemplated, and may be amended only by a written amendment executed by both parties to the AGREEMENT.
- 17. <u>Affirmative Action Employment</u>. CONTRACTOR agrees that it will not engage in unlawful discrimination in employment of persons because of race, color, religious creed, national origin, ancestry, physical handicap, medical condition, marital status, or sex of such persons.

The failure of DISTRICT or CONTRACTOR to seek redress for violation of, or to insist upon, the strict performance of any term or condition of this AGREEMENT, shall not be deemed a waiver by that party of such term or condition, or prevent a subsequent similar act from again constituting a violation of such term or condition.
- 19. <u>Notice</u>. All notices or demands to be given under this AGREEMENT by either party to the other, shall be in writing and given either by: (a) personal service or (b) by U.S. Mail, mailed either by registered or certified mail, return receipt requested, with postage prepaid. Service shall be considered given when received if personally served or if mailed on the third day after deposit in any U.S. Post Office. The address to which notices or demands may be given by either party may be changed by written notice given in accordance with the notice provisions of this section. Proposal

Staff proposes the Board of Education award a contract for the purchase and installation of furniture and accessories from Culver-Newlin, Inc. based on Hawthorne School District Renewal of Piggyback Purchasing Bid #13-14-1.

Background

On May 9, 2018, the Hawthorne School District's Board of Trustees approved the renewal of Bid No. 13-14-1 with Culver-Newlin, Inc. for the purchase and installation of furniture and accessories. The bid was co-sponsored with Rowland Unified School District, and has been widely used by school districts, and other agencies within the State of California by virtue of its "piggyback" clause. Culver-Newlin will increase their pricing by 5% as allowed per contract terms. Pursuant to Education Code Section 17596, the contract may be renewed for one-year periods, not to exceed four additional renewal years. The term for this fourth renewal is from July 1, 2018, through June 30, 2019. Bids were opened and publicly read aloud at 2:00 p.m. on April 18, 2018.

Budget Impact

There is no financial impact to allowing this purchasing option. Separate Board actions will indicate program improvements and timelines.

Recommended Action

WITNESSETH, that the District and the Contractor in consideration of the mutual covenants contained herein agree as follows:

1.01 The Work. Proposal

Staff proposes the Board of Education authorize the renewal of the License to Use Agreement with Orin Neufeld to operate a youth recreation facility at 2003 Laguna Canyon Road.

Background

The terms of this License to Use Agreement allow for annual renewal if both parties are in mutual agreement.

Budget Impact

Approval of the proposed use agreement would result in a gross income to the District of \$16,000 for one full year.

Agreement Components

Premises: LICENSOR agrees to allow LICENSEE to use the premises situated in the City of Laguna Beach, County of Orange, State of California, hereinafter referred to as Premises, and more particularly described as 2003 Laguna Canyon Road. LICENSOR agrees that LICENSEE shall have exclusive use of the rear portion of the PREMISES and joint use of office, restrooms, sidewalks and parking lots.

Term: The term of this Agreement shall commence on July 1, 2018, and terminate on June 30, 2019, subject to earlier termination as set forth herein. This AGREEMENT may be renewed for subsequent one (1) year terms upon mutual written agreement of the PARTIES. Neither Mr. Neufeld nor his supporters will contest termination of this USE AGREEMENT if the Board of Education deems it has determined a better use for the property.

License Fees: LICENSEE shall pay LICENSOR a license to use fee in the sum of sixteen hundred dollars (\$1,600) per month (\$16,000 total). LICENSEE shall pay LICENSOR this fee amount on the 1st of every month throughout the duration of the term. All of said fees shall be paid to: Laguna Beach Unified School District, 550 Blumont Street, Laguna Beach, California 92651, or at such other place as LICENSOR may designate in writing. In the event of any renewal of this AGREEMENT, the amount of the annual fees may be adjusted to reflect a cost of living adjustment each subsequent January 1st. The adjustment shall be calculated upon the basis of the United States Department of Labor, Bureau of Labor Statistics, Consumer Price Index Sub-Group – "All Items" for the Los Angeles, Anaheim, Riverside Western area published for the month of May of each year. LICENSEE shall not pay any license fees for the months of July and August 2018 due to decreased activity for youth sports.

- 2.0 <u>TERM.</u> The term of this AGREEMENT shall commence on July 1, 2018, and terminate on June 30, 2019, subject to termination as set forth in this AGREEMENT. Neither Mr.

 Neufeld nor his supporters will contest termination of this AGREEMENT if the Board of Education deems it has determined a better use for the property.
- 3.0 LICENSE FEES.
- A. LICENSEE shall pay LICENSOR a license to use fee in the sum of **Sixteen Hundred Dollars (\$1600) per month.** LICENSEE shall pay LICENSOR this fee amount on the first day of every month throughout the duration of the AGREEMENT term. All of said fees shall

be paid to: Laguna Beach Unified School District, 550 Blumont Street, Laguna Beach, California 92651, or at such other place as LICENSOR may designate in writing.

- B. In the event of any renewal of this AGREEMENT, the amount of the annual fees may be adjusted to reflect a cost of living adjustment each subsequent January 1st. The adjustment shall be calculated upon the basis of the United States Department of Labor, Bureau of Labor Statistics, Consumer Price Index Sub-Group "All Items" for the Los Angeles, Anaheim, Riverside Western area published for the month of May of each year.
- C. LICENSEE shall not pay any license fees for the months of July and August,2018 due to decreased activity for youth sports.
- 4.0 <u>CUSTODIAL SERVICES.</u> No custodial services will be provided by LICENSOR.
- 5.0 <u>USE.</u> The Premises shall be used for the LICENSEE'S **Youth Recreation Facility** as described in the City of Laguna Beach's Conditional Use Permit and for no other purposes without the prior written consent of LICENSOR. LICENSEE shall not commit, or permit to be committed, any waste or nuisance upon the Premises. LICENSEE shall not use the Premises, or any part thereof, for any purpose other than the purpose for which said premises are to be used. LICENSEE shall, at LICENSOR'S sole cost and expense, observe and use the Premises in compliance with all municipal, county, state and federal regulations, ordinances and statutes now in force, or which may hereafter be in force.
- 6.0 <u>EQUIPMENT</u>. LICENSEE may install and operate equipment that is normal for the purposes for which the LICENSEE is using the Premises. LICENSEE shall remove such equipment from the Premises upon or prior to the termination of the AGREEMENT and repair any damage to the Premises caused by such removal.
- 7.0 <u>COMPLIANCE</u>. LICENSOR warrants to LICENSEE that the Premises to be occupied by LICENSEE does not violate any covenants or restrictions of record, and is in compliance with all applicable statutes, codes, regulations and ordinances.
- 8.0 <u>MAINTENANCE & GROUNDS.</u> LICENSEE shall, at LICENSOR'S sole cost and expense, maintain the landscaping and the entire Premises including but not limited to any of LICENSEE'S equipment installed on the Premises.

9.0 ALTERATIONS. LICENSEE shall pay all costs of any alterations or additions to the Premises. LICENSEE shall not make, or permit to be made, any additions or alterations of the Premises, or any part thereof, without the written consent of LICENSOR. LICENSOR may retain the right to specific additions if such written agreement with LICENSOR is gained prior to installation. LICENSEE shall indemnify LICENSOR against, and hold LICENSOR harmless from, any and all mechanics' liens or claims of liens and all attorney's fees, costs and expenses which may accrue, arise out of, or be incurred by reason of or on account of any such lien or claims of lien. LICENSOR shall at all times have the right to post and to keep posted on the Premises such notices provided for under or by virtue of the laws of the State of California for the protection of the Premises from mechanics liens or liens of a similar nature.

10.0 INDEMNIFICATION/INSURANCE.

A. To the extent authorized by law, and except for the acts or omissions of LICENSOR, its employees, agents and officers, LICENSEE hereby agrees to hold harmless, indemnify and defend LICENSOR, and its Governing Board, officers, agents and employees from any liability or any claims of liability for bodily injury, personal injury, sickness, disease or death of any person or persons, or damage to property, real, personal, tangible or intangible, arising out of the use of the Premises for LICENSEE'S operations during the term of this AGREEMENT. In this respect, LICENSEE agrees to carry a comprehensive general liability insurance policy including premises operations, products completed operations, blanket contractual and personal injury with limits of One million dollars (\$1,000,000) per occurrence, combined single limit in a form mutually acceptable to both parties to protect LICENSEE and LICENSOR against liability or claims of liability arising out of the use of the Premises for LICENSEE'S operations during the term of this AGREEMENT. LICENSEE agrees to secure a specific endorsement to its liability policy stating, "Such insurance as is afforded for LICENSOR and its Governing Board, officers, agents, and employees shall be primary, and any insurance carried by LICENSOR, its Governing Board, officers, agents and employees shall be excess and noncontributory." In addition, LICENSEE agrees to name the Laguna Beach Unified School District, and its Governing Board, officers, agents, and employees as additional insureds under the policy and shall furnish LICENSOR with a certificate of insurance evidencing all coverages and

endorsements required herein including a thirty (30) day written notice of cancellation or reduction in coverage.

- B. To the extent authorized by law, and except for the acts or omissions of members, employees, agents, and officers of LICENSEE, LICENSOR hereby agrees to hold harmless, indemnify and defend LICENSEE and their officers, agents and employees, from any liability or any claims of liability for bodily injury, personal injury, sickness, disease or death of any person or persons, or damage to property, real, personal, tangible or intangible, arising out of the use of the Premises for operations other than those of LICENSEE during the term of this AGREEMENT. In this respect, LICENSOR agrees to carry a comprehensive general liability insurance policy including premisesoperations, productscompleted operations, blanket contractual and personal injury with limits of One million dollars (\$1,000,000) per occurrence, combined single limit in a form mutually acceptable to both parties to protect LICENSOR and LICENSEE against liability or claims of liability arising out of the use of the Premises for operations other than those of LICENSEE during the term of this AGREEMENT. LICENSOR shall furnish LICENSEE with a certificate of insurance evidencing all coverages and endorsements required hereunder including a thirty (30) day written notice of cancellation or reduction in coverage.
- 11.0 <u>DESTRUCTION.</u> In the event of partial destruction of the Premises during the Term, LICENSOR shall forthwith repair the same, provided such repairs can be made within ninety (90) days of the destruction, but such partial destruction shall not affect this AGREEMENT, except that LICENSEE shall be entitled to a daily pro rata reduction of fees while such repairs are being made, based upon the extent to which the destruction or the making of such repairs interferes with the business carried on by LICENSEE upon the Premises, but in no event to be more than the amount of the monthly rental. In the event that LICENSOR is unable to make such repairs within sixty (60) days of destruction, this AGREEMENT may be terminated by notice in writing by either PARTY. A total destruction of the Premises shall automatically terminate this AGREEMENT.

- 12.0 <u>RIGHT OF ENTRY.</u> LICENSEE shall permit LICENSOR and its officers, employees or agents to enter upon the Premises during business hours for the purpose of inspecting the same, except in the case of emergency in which case no notice shall be required. LICENSOR may enter upon the Premises during business hours upon the giving of twentyfour (24) hours' prior notice or at such time as is agreeable between the Parties for making any alterations, repairs, improvements or additions to any portion the Premises as LICENSOR may see fit to make.
- 13.0 <u>ASSIGNMENT AND SUBUSE</u>. LICENSEE shall not assign this AGREEMENT, or any interest therein, and shall not sub-use or sublet the Premises, or any part thereof, or any right or privilege appurtenant thereto, without the prior written consent of LICENSOR. A consent to one assignment or subletting shall not be construed as a consent to any subsequent assignment or subletting unless such written consent has been given and obtained. Any assignment or sub-use of this AGREEMENT, or of any interest therein, either by voluntary or involuntary act of LICENSEE, or by operation of law, or otherwise, may be deemed a breach of this AGREEMENT by LICENSEE at LICENSOR'S election, and any such purported assignment or sub-using without such consent, may be deemed by LICENSOR to be null and void. LICENSOR'S consent to any such assignment or sub-using shall not relieve LICENSEE from any obligations under this AGREEMENT.
- 14.0 <u>SIGNS</u>. No sign, advertisement or notice shall be inscribed, painted, or affixed to or on any part of the Premises without LICENSOR'S prior written consent as to size, location, style, design, and type.
- 15.0 <u>HOLDING OVER.</u> Holding over after the expiration of the AGREEMENT term, or any oral extension thereof with the consent of LICENSOR, shall be a tenancy from month to month at a monthly rate of 110% of the last month's fees. All other conditions and agreements of this AGREEMENT shall be applicable to such holding over.
- 16.0 QUIET POSSESSION. So long as LICENSEE performs its obligations under this AGREEMENT, LICENSEE shall have quiet and peaceful possession of the Premises for the term of the AGREEMENT.

- 17.0 OPTION TO RENEW. Failing Board of Education determination of another use of the Premises, LICENSEE shall have the option to renew this AGREEMENT for a further period of one (1) year, after the expiration of the the previous term, under the same terms and conditions except that the fee rate may be adjusted based on a cost of living increase. The adjustment shall be calculated upon the basis of the United States Department of Labor, Bureau of Labor Statistics, Consumer Price Index Sub-Group - "All Items" for the Los Angeles, Anaheim, Riverside Western area published for the month of May of each year. In no instance shall the increase exceed six percent (6%) any one year unless the entire AGREEMENT is renegotiated. 18.0 TERMINATION. LICENSEE or LICENSOR may terminate this AGREEMENT at any time for any reason by giving written notice to the other party ninety (90) days in advance of the desired date of termination. Upon termination, LICENSEE shall surrender the Premises to LICENSOR in the same condition as when received, ordinary wear and tear excepted. LICENSEE shall repair any damage to the Premises occasioned by removal of its trade fixtures, furnishings and equipment, prior to the expiration or sooner termination of the AGREEMENT. 19.0 DEFAULT BY LICENSOR. If LICENSOR defaults in the performance of any agreement or condition required by this AGREEMENT to be performed by LICENSOR, and such default continues for a period of thirty (30) days after written notice has been given by LICENSEE specifying the default, unless default, by necessity, will require more than thirty (30) days to cure and LICENSOR has commenced actions necessary to cure that default within said thirty (30) day period and is diligently pursuing the same to completion, then LICENSEE may declare a breach of this AGREEMENT by written notice to LICENSORE and exercise any one or more of the rights available to a licensee under the laws of the State of California, including without limitation, the right to terminate this AGREEMENT immediately and without further notice to LICENSOR, and to seek such equitable or other relief as may be available to LICENSEE by law.
- 20.0 <u>DEFAULT BY LICENSEE</u>. If (i) LICENSEE defaults in the payment of fees or the payment of any monetary amount required by this AGREEMENT (collectively, a "Monetary Default") and such Monetary Default continues for period of thirty (30) days after written notice has been given by LICENSORE to LICENSEE specifying the Monetary Default; or (ii)

LICENSEE defaults in the performance of any other condition required by this AGREEMENT to be performed by LICENSEE (collectively, a "NonMonetary Default"), and such NonMonetary default continues for a period of thirty (30) days after written notice has been given by LICENSORE to LICENSEE specifying the NonMonetary Default, unless the NonMonetary Default, by necessity, will require more than thirty (30) days to cure and LICENSEE has commenced actions necessary to cure that NonMonetary Default within said thirty (30) day period and is diligently pursuing the same to completion, then, in the event of any of the above events, LICENSOR may declare a breach of this AGREEMENT by written notice to LICENSEE and exercise any one or more of the rights available to LICENSOR under the laws of the State of California, including without limitation, the right:

- (a) to terminate this AGREEMENT immediately and without further notice to LICENSEE, and recover (i) the unpaid fees which have been earned at the time of termination; and (ii) any other reasonable monetary amount necessary to compensate LICENSOR for all the detriment suffered by LICENSOR which was proximately caused by LICENSEE'S default under this AGREEMENT, including all costs of litigation and attorney's fees incurred by LICENSOR.
- (b) to seek such equitable or other relief as may be available to LICENSOR by law.

 21.0 TOBACCO USE POLICY. In the interest of public health, LICENSOR requires a tobacco-free environment on the Premises and LICENSEE agrees to comply with said policy.

 22.0 NOTICES. All notices or demands to be given under this AGREEMENT by either party to the other shall be in writing and given either by: i) Personal service, or ii) U.S. Mail, mailed either by registered or certified mail, return receipt requested, with postage prepaid. Service shall be considered given when received if personally served or, if mailed, on the third (3rd) day after deposit in any U.S. Post Office. The address to which notices or demands may be given by either party may be changed by written notice given in accordance with the notice provisions of this section. - C. The PARTIES agree that this AGREEMENT shall be construed and enforced in accordance with the laws of the State of California, through California State Courts with venue in Orange County, California where the site of Used Premises is located.
- D. The failure of the LICENSOR or LICENSEE to seek redress for violation of, or to insist upon, the strict performance of any covenant or condition of this AGREEMENT, shall not be deemed a waiver by the PARTY of such covenant or condition or prevent a subsequent similar act, from again constituting a violation of such covenant or condition.
- E. This AGREEMENT contains the entire agreement between LICENSOR and LICENSEE regarding the PREMISES and any agreement hereafter made shall be ineffective to modify this AGREEMENT in whole or in part unless such agreement is embodied in a written amendment to this AGREEMENT which has been signed by both PARTIES. This AGREEMENT supersedes all prior negotiations, understandings, representations and agreements.

F. The conditions and agreements herein contained shall apply to and bind the heirs, executors, administrators, and successors in interest to the parties hereto.

FUND DESCRIPTIONS

- **FUND 01** The General Fund is the chief operating fund for Laguna Beach USD. It is used to account for the ordinary operations of the district. All transactions except those required or permitted by law to be in another fund are accounted for in this fund. Restricted projects or activities within the general fund must be identified and reported separately from unrestricted projects or activities.
- FUND 11 The Adult Education Fund is a separate fund used to account for state appropriations and to finance specific programs for the education of adults. Funds can be expended on salaries, benefits, supplies, books, services, and equipment related to adult education programs (Education Code Section 52616.4).
- FUND 13 The Cafeteria Fund (Food Service) is used to account separately for federal, state, and local resources to operate the food service program (Education Code sections 38090-38093). The purpose of the food service program is to provide nutritious meals to the students. The District participates in the National School Lunch Program and the School Breakfast Program. The District serves approximately 500-550 lunches and 200-230 breakfasts to the students from kindergarten through twelfth grade on a daily basis.
- FUND 17 The <u>Special Reserve</u> Fund for Other Than Capital Outlay Projects is used primarily to provide for the accumulation of moneys for general operating purposes other than for capital outlay (Education Code Section 42840). On May 11, 2004 the Board of Education approved the target of reserving two-thirds of the basic aid differential (the difference between Revenue Limit funding and Basic Aid funding) to be achieved by June 30, 2009. Funds reserved for the Basic Aid differential are deposited into this fund.
- FUND 25 The Capital Facilities Fund (Developer Fees) exists to account for monies received as mitigation fees levied on developers, property owners or other agencies as a condition of approving new development or additions to existing real property. The authority for these levies may be local government ordinances (GC 65970-65981) or private agreements between a school district and the developer. Expenditures from this fund are to be used for the purpose of funding the construction or reconstruction of school facilities (Education Code sections 17620-
- FUND 40 The <u>Special Reserve</u> Fund for Capital Outlay Projects exists to account for the accumulation of moneys for capital outlay purposes (Education Code Section 42840). This fund is separated into three sub-funds in accordance to with resolutions #01-02, #14-02 and #14-03.

Sub-fund 4040 exists to account for the Facility Repair and Replacement Program (FRRP).

Sub-fund 4041 exists to account for the **Vista Aliso property reserve**. The District holds a repurchase agreement on the property.

Sub-fund 4042 exists to account for the **Capital Improvement Plan (CIP)** that goes above and beyond prior commitments for repair and replacement needs, but extends to improvements of facilities for program and enrollment growth. A ten-year plan will be developed and revised, at least annually, to prioritize major projects.

Approve Resolution 18-04 Use of Proposition 30 Education Protection Act Funds for 2018-2019 for Direct Instruction Salaries and Benefits

Proposal

Staff proposes the Board of Education approve Resolution 18-04: Use of Proposition 30 Education Protection Act funds for 2018-2019 direct instruction salaries and benefits.

Background

Proposition 30, approved by voters in November 2012, requires the State to pass through a minimum of \$200 per average daily attendance to each local educational agency. The school district is required to hold a public hearing and approve a resolution indicating how the funds are spent. Before the passage of Proposition 30, school districts were facing further significant reductions in school funding. The passage of Proposition 30 created the Education Protection Act, using the new State funds to substitute for the State shortfall in revenue. Proposition 30 funding was set to expire in 2018, however, on voters approved Proposition 55 in April 2016, which extended the funding through 2030.

The attached resolution and schedule records the amount of projected funding for 2018-2019. The expenditure budgets include Grades 6-12 extra period assignments to provide necessary classes for students and one full-time teacher.

Recommended Action

Staff recommends the Board of Education approve Resolution 18-04: Use of Proposition 30 Education Protection Act funds for 2018-2019 direct instruction salaries and benefits.

RESOLUTION NO. 18-04 REGARDING THE EDUCATION PROTECTION ACCOUNT

WHEREAS, the voters approved Proposition 30 on November 6, 2012;

WHEREAS, Proposition 30 added Article XIII, Section 36 to the California Constitution effective November 7, 2012;

WHEREAS, the provisions of Article XIII, Section 36(e) create in the state General Fund an Education Protection Account to receive and disburse the revenues derived from the incremental increases in taxes imposed by Article XIII, Section 36(f);

WHEREAS, before June 30th of each year, the Director of Finance shall estimate the total amount of additional revenues, less refunds that will be derived from the incremental increases in tax rates made pursuant to Article XIII, Section 36(f) that will be available for transfer into the Education Protection Account during the next fiscal year;

WHEREAS, if the sum determined by the State Controller is positive, the State Controller shall transfer the amount calculated into the Education Protection Account within ten days preceding the end of the fiscal year;

WHEREAS, all monies in the Education Protection Account are hereby continuously appropriated for the support of school districts, county offices of education, charter schools and community college districts;

WHEREAS, monies deposited in the Education Protection Account shall not be used to pay any costs incurred by the Legislature, the Governor or any agency of state government;

WHEREAS, a community college district, county office of education, school district, or charter school shall have the sole authority to determine how the monies received from the Education Protection Account are spent in the school or schools within its jurisdiction;

WHEREAS, the governing board of the district shall make the spending determinations with respect to monies received from the Education Protection Account in open session of a public meeting of the governing board;

WHEREAS, the monies received from the Education Protection Account shall not be used for salaries or benefits for administrators or any other administrative cost;

WHEREAS, each community college district, county office of education, school district and charter school shall annually publish on its Internet website an accounting of how much money was received from the Education Protection Account and how that money was spent;

WHEREAS, the annual independent financial and compliance audit required of community college districts, county offices of education, school districts and charter schools shall ascertain and verify whether the funds provided from the Education Protection Account have been properly disbursed and expended as required by Article XIII, Section 36 of the California Constitution;

WHEREAS, expenses incurred by community college districts, county offices of education, school districts and charter schools to comply with the additional audit requirements of Article XIII, Section 36 may be paid with funding from the Education Protection Act and shall not be considered administrative costs for purposes of Article XIII, Section 36.

NOW, THEREFORE, IT IS HEREBY RESOLVED:

- 1. The monies received from the Education Protection Account shall be spent as required by Article XIII, Section 36 and the spending determinations on how the money will be spent shall be made in open session of a public meeting of the governing board of Laguna Beach Unified School District;

Ratification of Collective Bargaining Agreement in Accordance with AB 1200 (Chapter 1213/1991), Government Code 3547.5 and CCR, Title V, Section 15449; and 2018-19 Negotiated Agreement with Laguna Beach Unified Faculty Association (LaBUFA)

Proposal

Staff proposes the Board of Education ratify the 2018-19 revisions to the 2017-2020 Agreement negotiated by the designated representatives of the Laguna Beach Unified Faculty Association (LaBUFA) and the Laguna Beach Unified School District.

Background

The Association and the District reached a Tentative Agreement for 2018-19 reopeners to the 2017-2020 Agreement. The agreement allows for up to two reopeners for each party each year in addition to health and welfare and salary.

The Tentative Agreement attached includes changes in total compensation. The agreement includes a 2% salary increase and a 0.5% one time, off-schedule payment. In addition, if the 2018-19 adopted State Budget results in an increase in one-time unrestricted funds, the District shall allocate LaBUFA's proportional share of the additional funds up to 1% as a one-time, off schedule salary payment.

Budget Impact

Public Disclosure of Collective Bargaining Agreements in Accordance with AB 1200 (Chapter 1213/1991), Government Code 3547.5 and CCR, Title V, Section 15449 require that the costs associated with the agreement be publicly disclosed and approved by the Board of Education.

The cost of this agreement for 2018-19 is \$786,645.

Proposal

Staff proposes the Board of Education ratify the 2018-2021 Collective Bargaining Agreement negotiated by the designated representatives of the California School Employees Association (CSEA) and its Laguna Beach Chapter #131 and the Laguna Beach Unified School District.

Background

The Association and the District reached a Tentative Agreement for the 2018-2021 agreement. Major provisions remain in place. The District and Association utilized Interest-Based Bargaining (IBB) as the process.

The Tentative Agreement attached includes changes in total compensation. The agreement includes a 2% salary increase and a 0.5% one time, off-schedule payment. In addition, if the 2018-19 adopted State Budget results in an increase in one-time unrestricted funds, the District shall allocate CSEA's proportional share of the additional funds up to 1% as a one-time, off schedule salary payment.

Budget Impact

Public Disclosure of Collective Bargaining Agreements in Accordance with AB 1200 (Chapter 1213/1991), Government Code 3547.5 and CCR, Title V, Section 15449 require that the costs associated with the agreement be publicly disclosed and approved by the Board of Education.

The revised cost for 2018-19 is \$271,489.

Recommended Action

Staff proposes the Board of Education ratify the 2018-2021 Collective Bargaining Agreement negotiated by the designated representatives of the California School Employees Association (CSEA) and its Laguna Beach Chapter #131 and the Laguna Beach Unified School District and its impact on the budget as presented.

18. ACTION June 12, 2018

Approval: Mosaic Network, Inc. (CoVitalityApp), California Student Privacy Agreement for the 2018-19 School Year at a Cost Not-to-Exceed \$8,505.00

Proposal

Staff proposes the Board of Education approve the contract to initiate work with Mosaic Network, Inc., for the 2018-19 school year. Staff will utilize Mozaic Networks CoVitalityApp's sequential research services, which include unlimited access to the CoVitality Online Education Research Library.

Background

LBUSD is committed to supporting students K-12 in the development of positive personal and interpersonal skills to enhance academic achievement, positive decision-making, and long-term social-emotional health outcomes. In order to more effectively measure social-emotional functioning for students in K-12 grades, a team of mental health professionals within the district evaluated multiple universal screening options. The team recommended the utilization of Mosaic Network Inc.'s online software, CoVitalityApp, as a method of collecting self-report information from students within a two-factor model of mental health: 1) Social-emotional distress, and 2) Co-Vitality, the combination of 12 validated human capital constructs that relate to a student's sense of social and emotional well-being. The team selected the Student Risk Screening Scale (SRSS) as a brief universal screener that measures internalizing and externalizing risk on a 12-item scale for implementation in K-3. We use Illuminate to host the assessment and scoring for the SRSS and there is no cost or contract associated with implementation in K-3 as the content is public domain.

The proposed contract will enable LBUSD to deliver multiple co-vitality and social-emotional distress measures to students in 4th-12th grades in the fall and in the spring, via an online 48 item survey. The scope of the software agreement includes:

- Software and system configuration, and data frontloading
- Coaching, and technical assistance in the design, administration, and best-practice data utilization;
- Online application survey administration for unlimited use;
- Comprehensive report portfolio, including student reports and parent communication; classroom reports; schoolwide reports; pre/post results; and districtwide results;
- Data analysis to provide information briefs; student, schoolwide, and districtwide insights and results; and data validity and completeness statistics.

Budget Impact

The cost of the California Student Privacy Agreement is \$8,505.00.

Recommended Action

Staff recommends the Board of Education approve the Mosaic Network, Inc. California Student Privacy Agreement for the 2018-19 school year at a cost not-to-exceed \$8,505.00.

Laguna Beach Unified School Dist.	(hereinafter referred to as "LEA") and
Mosaic Network, Inc.	(hereinafter referred to as "Provider") on
The Parties agree to the terms as stated	herein.

RECITALS

WHEREAS, the Provider has agreed to provide the Local Education Agency ("LEA") with certain digital educational services ("Services") pursuant to a contract dated ("Service Agreement"); and

WHEREAS, in order to provide the Services described in the Service Agreement, the Provider may receive and the LEA may provide documents or data that are covered by several federal and statutes, armong them, the Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act ("FERPA") at 20 U.S.C. 1232g, Children's Online Privacy Protection Act ("COPPA"), 15 U.S.C. 6501-6502; Protection of Pupil Rights Amendment ("PPRA") 20 U.S.C. 1232 h; and

WHEREAS, the documents and data transferred from California LEAs are also subject to several California student privacy laws, including AB 1584, found at California Education Code Section 49073.1 and the Student Online Personal Information Protection Act (sometimes referred to as either "SB 1177" or "SOPIPA") found at California Business and Professions Code section 22584; and

WHEREAS, the Parties wish to enter into this DPA to ensure that the Service Agreement conforms to the requirements of the privacy laws referred to above and to establish implementing procedures and duties; and

WHEREAS, the Provider may, by signing the "General Offer of Privacy Terms", agrees to allow other LEAs in California the opportunity to accept and enjoy the benefits of this DPA for the Services described herein, without the need to negotiate terms in a separate DPA.

NOW THEREFORE, for good and valuable consideration, the parties agree as follows:

ARTICLE I: PURPOSE AND SCOPE

- 1. Purpose of DPA. The purpose of this DPA is to describe the duties and responsibilities to protect student data transmitted to Provider from the LEA pursuant to the Service Agreement, including compliance with all applicable privacy statutes, including the FERPA, PPRA, COPPA, SB 1177 (SOPIPA), and AB 1584. In performing these services, the Provider shall be considered a School Official with a legitimate educational interest, and performing services otherwise provided by the LEA. Provider shall be under the direct control and supervision of the LEA. Control duties are set forth below.
- 2. <u>Nature of Services Provided</u>. The Provider has agreed to provide the following digital educational services described below and as may be further outlined in <u>Exhibit "A"</u> hereto:

3. <u>Student Data to Be Provided</u>. In order to perform the Services described in the Service Agreement, LEA shall provide the categories of data described below or as indicated in the Schedule of Data, attached hereto as <u>Exhibit</u> "B":

Use of online portal and application for the administration of student surveys.

4. <u>DPA Definitions</u>. The definition of terms used in this DPA is found in <u>Exhibit "C"</u>. In the event of a conflict, definitions used in this DPA shall prevail over term used in the Service Agreement.

ARTICLE II: DATA OWNERSHIP AND AUTHORIZED ACCESS

- 1. Student Data Property of LEA. All Student Data or any other Pupil Records transmitted to the Provider pursuant to the Service Agreement is and will continue to be the property of and under the control of the LEA. The Parties agree that as between them all rights, including all intellectual property rights in and to Student Data or any other Pupil Records contemplated per the Service Agreement shall remain the exclusive property of the LEA. For the purposes of FERPA, the Provider shall be considered a School Official, under the control and direction of the LEAs as it pertains to the use of student data notwithstanding the above. Provider may transfer pupil-generated content to a separate account, according to the procedures set forth below.
- 2. Parent Access. LEA shall establish reasonable procedures by which a parent, legal guardian, or eligible student may review personally identifiable information on the pupil's records, correct erroneous information, and procedures for the transfer of pupil-generated content to a personal account, consistent with the functionality of services. Provider shall respond in a reasonably timely manner to the LEA's request for personally identifiable information in a pupil's records held by the Provider to view or correct as necessary. In the event that a parent of a pupil or other individual contacts the Provider to review any of the Pupil Records of Student Data accessed pursuant to the Services, the Provider shall refer the parent or individual to the LEA, who will follow the necessary and proper procedures regarding the requested information.
- 3. <u>Separate Account</u>. Provider shall, at the request of the LEA, transfer Student generated content to a separate student account.
- 4. Third Party Request. Should a Third Party, including law enforcement and government entities, contact Provider with a request for data held by the Provider pursuant to the Services, the Provider shall redirect the Third Party to request the data directly from the LEA. Provider shall notify the LEA in advance of a compelled disclosure to a Third Party unless legally prohibited.

- 5. <u>No Unauthorized Use</u>. Provider shall not use Student Data or information in a Pupil Record for any purpose other than as explicitly specified in the Service Agreement.
- 6. <u>Subprocessors</u>. Provider shall enter into written agreements with all Subprocessors performing functions pursuant to the Service Agreement, whereby the Subprocessors agree protect Student Data in manner consistent with the terms of this DPA

ARTICLE III: DUTIES OF LEA

- 1. Provide Data In Compliance With FERPA. LEA shall provide data for the purposes of the Service Agreement in compliance with the Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act ("FERPA"), 20 U.S.C. section 1232 g, AB 1584 and the other privacy statutes quoted in this DPA.
- 2. <u>Reasonable Precautions</u>. LEA shall take reasonable precautions to secure usernames, passwords, and any other means of gaining access to the services and hosted data.
- 3. <u>Unauthorized Access Notification</u>. LEA shall notify Provider promptly of any known or suspected unauthorized access. LEA will assist Provider in any efforts by Provider to investigate and respond to any unauthorized access.
- 4. <u>District Representative</u>. At request of Provider, LEA shall designate an employee or agent of the District as the District representative for the coordination and fulfillment of the duties of this DPA.

ARTICLE IV: DUTIES OF PROVIDER

- 1. <u>Privacy Compliance</u>. The Provider shall comply with all California and Federal laws and regulations pertaining to data privacy and security, including FERPA, COPPA, PPRA, AB 1584, and SOPIPA.
- 2. <u>Authorized Use</u>. The data shared pursuant to the Service Agreement, including persistent unique identifiers, shall be used for no purpose other than the Services stated in the Service Agreement and/or otherwise authorized under the statutes referred to in subsection (1), above.
- 3. <u>Employee Obligation</u>. Provider shall require all employees and agents who have access to Student Data to comply with all applicable provisions of FERPA laws with respect to the data shared under the Service Agreement. Provider agrees to require and maintain an appropriate confidentiality agreement from each employee or agent with access to Student Data pursuant to the Service Agreement.

- 4. No Disclosure. Provider shall not disclose any data obtained under the Service Agreement in a manner that could identify an individual student to any other entity in published results of studies as authorized by the Service Agreement. Deidentified information may be used by the vendor for the purposes of development and improvement of educational sites, services, or applications.
- 5. Disposition of Data. Provider shall dispose of all personally identifiable data obtained under the Service Agreement when it is no longer needed for the purpose for which it was obtained and transfer said data to LEA or LEA's designee within 60 days of the date of termination and according to a schedule and procedure as the Parties may reasonably agree. Nothing in the Service Agreement authorizes Provider to maintain personally identifiable data obtained under the Service Agreement beyond the time period reasonably needed to complete the disposition. Disposition shall include (1) the shredding of any hard copies of any Pupil Records; (2) Erasing; or (3) Otherwise modifying the personal information in those records to make it unreadable or indecipherable. Provider shall provide written notification to LEA when the Data has been disposed. The duty to dispose of Student Data shall not extend to data that has been de-identified or placed in a separate Student account, pursuant to the other terms of the DPA. Nothing in the Service Agreement authorizes Provider to maintain personally identifiable data beyond the time period reasonably needed to complete the disposition.
- 6. Advertising Prohibition. Provider is prohibited from using Student Data to conduct or assist targeted advertising directed at students or their families/guardians. This prohibition includes the development of a profile of a student, or their families/guardians or group, for any commercial purpose other than providing the service to client. This shall not prohibit Providers from using data to make product or service recommendations to LEA.

ARTICLE V: DATA PROVISIONS

- 1. <u>Data Security</u>. The Provider agrees to abide by and maintain adequate data security measures to protect Student Data from unauthorized disclosure or acquisition by an unauthorized person. The general security duties of Provider are set forth below. Provider may further detail its security programs and measures in in <u>Exhibit "D"</u> hereto. These measures shall include, but are not limited to:
 - a. Passwords and Employee Access. Provider shall make best efforts practices to secure usernames, passwords, and any other means of gaining access to the Services or to Student Data, at a level suggested by Article 4.3 of NIST 800-63-3. Provider shall only provide access to Student Data to employees or contractors that are performing the Services. As stated elsewhere in this DPA, employees with access to Student Data shall have signed confidentiality agreements regarding said Student Data. All employees with access to Student Records shall pass criminal background checks.
 - b. Destruction of Data. Provider shall destroy all personally identifiable data obtained under the Service Agreement when it is no longer needed for the purpose for which it was

- obtained or transfer said data to LEA or LEA's designee, according to a schedule and procedure as the parties may reasonable agree. Nothing in the Service Agreement authorizes Provider to maintain personally identifiable data beyond the time period reasonably needed to complete the disposition.
- c. Security Protocols. Both parties agree to maintain security protocols that meet industry best practices in the transfer or transmission of any data, including ensuring that data may only be viewed or accessed by parties legally allowed to do so. Provider shall maintain all data obtained or generated pursuant to the Service Agreement in a secure computer environment and not copy, reproduce, or transmit data obtained pursuant to the Service Agreement, except as necessary to fulfill the purpose of data requests by LEA.
- d. Employee Training. The Provider shall provide periodic security training to those of its employees who operate or have access to the system. Further, Provider shall provide LEA with contact information of an employee who LEA may contact if there are any security concerns or questions.
- e. Security Technology. When the service is accessed using a supported web browser, Secure Socket Layer ("SSL"), or equivalent technology protects information, using both server authentication and data encryption to help ensure that data are safe secure only to authorized users. Provider shall host data pursuant to the Service Agreement in an environment using a firewall that is periodically updated according to industry standards.
- f. Security Coordinator. Provider shall provide the name and contact information of Provider's Security Coordinator for the Student Data received pursuant to the Service Agreement
- g. Subprocessors Bound. Provider shall enter into written agreements whereby Subprocessors agree to secure and protect Student Data in a manner consistent with the terms of this Article V. Provider shall periodically conduct or review compliance monitoring and assessments of Subprocessors to determine their compliance with this Article.
- 2. <u>Data Breach</u>. In the event that Student Data is accessed or obtained by an unauthorized individual, Provider shall provide notification to LEA within a reasonable amount of time of the incident. Provider shall follow the following process:
 - a. The security breach notification shall be written in plain language, shall be titled "Notice of Data Breach," and shall present the information described herein under the following headings: "What Happened," "What Information Was Involved," "What We Are Doing," "What You Can Do," and "For More Information." Additional information may be provided as a supplement to the notice.
 - b. The security breach notification described above in section 2(a) shall include, at a minimum, the following information:
 - i. The name and contact information of the reporting LEA subject to this section.
 - ii. A list of the types of personal information that were or are reasonably believed to have been the subject of a breach.

- iii. If the information is possible to determine at the time the notice is provided, then either (1) the date of the breach, (2) the estimated date of the breach, or (3) the date range within which the breach occurred. The notification shall also include the date of the notice.
- iv. Whether the notification was delayed as a result of a law enforcement investigation, if that information is possible to determine at the time the notice is provided.
- v. A general description of the breach incident, if that information is possible to determine at the time the notice is provided.
- c. At LEA's discretion, the security breach notification may also include any of the following:
 - i. Information about what the agency has done to protect individuals whose information has been breached.
 - ii. Advice on steps that the person whose information has been breached may take to protect himself or herself.
- d. Any agency that is required to issue a security breach notification pursuant to this section to more than 500 California residents as a result of a single breach of the security system shall electronically submit a single sample copy of that security breach notification, excluding any personally identifiable information, to the Attorney General. Provider shall assist LEA in these efforts.
- e. At the request and with the assistance of the District, Provider shall notify the affected parent, legal guardian or eligible pupil of the unauthorized access, which shall include the information listed in subsections (b) and (c), above.

ARTICLE VI: GENERAL OFFER OF PRIVACY TERMS

Provider may, by signing the attached Form of General Offer of Privacy Terms ("General Offer"), (attached hereto as Exhibit "E"), be bound by the terms of this DPA to any other LEA who signs the Acceptance on said Exhibit. The Form is limited by the terms and conditions described therein.

ARTICLE VII: MISCELLANEOUS

- 1. <u>Term.</u> The Provider shall be bound by this DPA for the duration of the Service Agreement or so long as the Provider maintains any Student Data. Notwithstanding the foregoing, Provider agrees to be bound by the terms and obligations of this DPA for no less than three (3) years.
- 2. <u>Termination</u>. In the event that either party seeks to terminate this DPA, they may do so by mutual written consent so long as the Service Agreement has lapsed or has been terminated.
- 3. Effect of Termination Survival. If the Service Agreement is terminated, the Provider shall

destroy all of LEA's data pursuant to Article V, section 1(b).

- 4. <u>Priority of Agreements</u>. This DPA shall govern the treatment of student records in order to comply with the privacy protections, including those found in FERPA and AB 1584. In the event there is conflict between the terms of the DPA and the Service Agreement, or with any other bid/RFP, license agreement, or writing, the terms of this DPA shall apply and take precedence. Except as described in this paragraph herein, all other provisions of the Service Agreement shall remain in effect.
- 5. <u>Notice</u>. All notices or other communication required or permitted to be given hereunder must be in writing and given by personal delivery, facsimile or e-mail transmission (if contact information is provided for the specific mode of delivery), or first class mail, postage prepaid, sent to the addresses set forth herein.
- 6. <u>Application of Agreement to Other Agencies</u>. Provider may agree by signing the General Offer of Privacy Terms be bound by the terms of this DPA for the services described therein for any Successor Agency who signs a Joinder to this DPA.
- 7. Entire Agreement. This DPA constitutes the entire agreement of the parties relating to the subject matter hereof and supersedes all prior communications, representations, or agreements, oral or written, by the parties relating thereto. This DPA may be amended and the observance of any provision of this DPA may be waived (either generally or in any particular instance and either retroactively or prospectively) only with the signed written consent of both parties. Neither failure nor delay on the part of any party in exercising any right, power, or privilege hereunder shall operate as a waiver of such right, nor shall any single or partial exercise of any such right, power, or privilege preclude any further exercise thereof or the exercise of any other right, power, or privilege.
- 8. Severability. Any provision of this DPA that is prohibited or unenforceable in any jurisdiction shall, as to such jurisdiction, be ineffective to the extent of such prohibition or unenforceability without invalidating the remaining provisions of this DPA, and any such prohibition or unenforceability in any jurisdiction shall not invalidate or render unenforceable such provision in any other jurisdiction. Notwithstanding the foregoing, if such provision could be more narrowly drawn so as not to be prohibited or unenforceable in such jurisdiction while, at the same time, maintaining the intent of the parties, it shall, as to such jurisdiction, be so narrowly drawn without invalidating the remaining provisions of this DPA or affecting the validity or enforceability of such provision in any other jurisdiction.
- 9. Governing Law; Venue and Jurisdiction. THIS DPA WILL BE GOVERNED BY AND CONSTRUED IN ACCORDANCE WITH THE LAWS OF THE STATE OF CALIFORNIA,

WITHOUT REGARD TO CONFLICTS OF LAW PRINCIPLES. EACH PARTY CONSENTS AND SUBMITS TO THE SOLE AND EXCLUSIVE JURISDICTION TO THE STATE AND FEDERAL COURTS LOCATED IN Orange COUNTY, CALIFORNIA FOR ANY DISPUTE ARISING OUT OF OR RELATING TO THIS SERVICE AGREEMENT OR THE TRANSACTIONS CONTEMPLATED HEREBY.

Contract with Mind Research to Provide the ST Math Supplementary Mathematics Intervention Program for the Purpose of Piloting during Summer School and the 2018-19 School Year in an Amount Not-to-Exceed \$33.002.00

Proposal

Staff proposes the Board of Education approve the purchase of the ST Math supplementary mathematics intervention program for piloting during the summer school program and continuing through the 2018-19 school year. The proposed cost includes onsite professional development, self-guided online courses and webinars for teachers. The pilot is a one-year online subscription.

Background

MIND Research Institute's supplementary math program, ST Math, is an online visual instructional program that builds a deep conceptual understanding of math through rigorous learning and creative problem solving to engage, motivate and challenge kindergarten through grade six students toward higher achievement. This program benefits every level of student from struggling students who grow to become proficient to proficient students who become advanced, and meets the needs of students at risk by supporting the diversity of learners in one classroom. The program begins by teaching foundational concepts visually and then connects the ideas to the symbols and language. The problems are accessible to all students, regardless of skill level or language background. ST Math is aligned to State Standards and is a web-based supplemental curriculum. The program includes embedded assessments and detailed reporting and tracking of progress for monitoring by teachers.

Under the direction of our Elementary Math Committee, the ST Math Software Program from Mind Research Institute was piloted by a group of teachers representing first through fifth grade at El Morro and Top of the World Elementary Schools from March through May 2018. The team was unanimous in their desire to continue the pilot in the fall of 2018-19. The committee also recommended including the entire K-5 staff so that all elementary students experience this research-based program. Pilot teachers believe the conceptual program develops important skills our students struggle with. The group reported that students were engaged and loved using the program. Observations included that all students had access to content and were able to work independently including EL students because ST Math starts conceptually and does not have a language component to begin with (no words or text). It then gradually introduces symbols and language.

Budget Impact

The budget impact is \$69,082 for a two-year investment of 1077 student licenses and professional development for 25 teachers, after which our annual costs will drop dramatically. (See chart below.) A portion of the investment cost will be deferred as follows:

Year One, we will pay \$26 per student (\$28,002) and \$5,000 for professional development for a total of \$33,002. The balance of \$36,080 is deferred to year two.

Should the program be successful and approved for adoption, the deferred balance of \$36,080 will be paid for Year Two, the 2019-20 school year.

Beginning with the 2020-21 school year, our costs will consist of the number of student licenses needed times the renewal fee of \$8.50 per student. Based on an estimated count of 1077 K-5 students, our total cost would be \$9,155 for future school years. The following chart shows the investment of doing a multi-year agreement versus annual renewal of the program. Additionally, if the district adopts ST Math for all students in K-5, this amount could also qualify for OC donor funds provided they are available as they have been for the last 5 years.

Recommended Action

INDEPENDENT CONTRACTOR AGREEMENT

This Agreement is hereby entered into between the Laguna Beach Unified School District, hereinafter referred to as "District," and Mind Research Institute, 111 Academy Drive, Suite 100, Irvine, CA 92617, 949-345-8700, hereinafter referred to as "Contractor."

WHEREAS, District is authorized by Section 53060 of the California Government Code to contract with and employ any persons for the furnishing of special services and advice in financial, economic, accounting, engineering, legal or administrative matters, if such persons are specially trained and experienced and competent to perform the special services required;

WHEREAS, District is in need of such special services and advice; and

WHEREAS, Contractor is specially trained and experienced and competent to perform the special services required by the District, and such services are needed on a limited basis;

NOW, THEREFORE, the parties agree as follows:

1. <u>Services to be provided by Contractor</u>. Contractor shall provide to District the following services hereinafter referred to as "Services" described in Quote #1432781:

A. 1,077 NEW ST MATH STUDENT LICENSE

- ST Math Gen5 Software License for Number of Students Indicated
- Ongoing Minor Software Updates
- Self-Guided Online Courses (Asynchronous via Web Browser)
- Just-in-Time Live Webinars (Instructor-Lead via WebEx)
- Technical Support during Standard Business Hours via Email, Chat or Phone
- Weekly School Progress Reports Delivered via Email

B. ONSITE PROFESSIONAL DEVELOPMENT

- 1 Day (up to 6 hours) of Instructor-Led Onsite Professional Development at School
- 2. <u>Term.</u> Contractor shall commence providing Services under this Agreement upon <u>Board Approval on June 12, 2018</u>, and will diligently perform as required and complete performance by <u>June 30, 2019</u>.
- 3. <u>Compensation</u>. District agrees to pay the Contractor for Services satisfactorily rendered pursuant to this Agreement a total fee not to exceed <u>Thirty-Three Thousand and Two Dollars (\$33,002)</u>. District shall pay Contractor according to the following terms and conditions: <u>Net 30 upon receipt of invoice</u>.

- 4. <u>Expenses</u>. District shall not be liable to Contractor for any costs or expenses paid or incurred by Contractor in performing Services for District, except as follows: N/A
- 5. <u>Independent Contractor</u>. Contractor, in the performance of the Services pursuant to this Agreement, shall be and act as an independent contractor. Contractor understands and agrees that it and all of its employees shall not be considered officers, employees or agents of the District, and are not entitled to benefits of any kind or nature normally provided employees of the District and/or to which District's employees are normally entitled, including, but not limited to, State Unemployment Compensation or Workers' Compensation. Contractor assumes the full responsibility for the acts and/or omissions of its employees or agents as they relate to the Services to be provided under this Agreement. Contractor shall assume full responsibility for payment of all federal, state and local taxes or contributions, including unemployment insurance, social security and income taxes with respect to Contractor's employees.
- 6. <u>Materials</u>. Contractor shall furnish, at its own expense, all labor, materials, equipment, supplies and other items necessary to complete the Services to be provided pursuant to this Agreement, except as follows: N/A

Contractor's Services will be performed in accordance with generally and currently accepted principles and practices of its profession.

- 7. Originality of Services/Intellectual Property. Contractor agrees that all ideas, technologies, formulae, procedures, processes and methods prepared for and submitted by Contractor to the District in connection with the Services set forth in this Agreement, shall be wholly original to Contractor and shall not be copied in whole or in part from any other source, except that submitted to Contractor by District as a basis for such Services. Contractor further agrees that all writings, materials, compositions, recordings, teleplays, and/or video productions prepared for, written for, or otherwise (hereinafter referred to as "Content") submitted by Contractor to the District and/or used in connection with the Services set forth in this Agreement, reflect the intellectual property of, and copyright interests held by District and shall not be copied or used in whole or in part by Contractor without District's express written permission. Contractor understands and agrees that all Content produced under this Agreement is the property of District and cannot be used without District's express written permission. Contractor acknowledges and agrees that District shall have all right, title and interest in said Content, including the right to secure and maintain the copyright, trademark and/or patent of said Content in the name of the District.
- 8. <u>Termination</u>. District may, at any time, with or without reason, terminate this Agreement and compensate Contractor only for Services satisfactorily rendered to the date of termination. Written notice by District shall be sufficient to stop further performance of Services by Contractor. Notice shall be deemed given when received by the Contractor or no later than three (3) days after the day of mailing, whichever is sooner.

District may terminate this Agreement upon giving of written notice of intention to terminate for cause. Cause shall include: (a) material violation of this Agreement by the

Contractor; or (b) any act by Contractor exposing the District to liability to others for personal injury or property damage; or (c) Contractor is adjudged a bankrupt, Contractor makes a general assignment for the benefit of creditors or a receiver is appointed on account of Contractor's insolvency. Written notice by District shall contain the reasons for such intention to terminate and unless within five (5) days after service of such notice the condition or violation shall cease, or satisfactory arrangements for the correction thereof be made, this Agreement shall upon the expiration of the five (5) days cease and terminate. In the event of such termination, the District may secure the required Services from another contractor. If the cost to the District to secure the required Services from another contractor exceeds the cost of providing the Services pursuant to this Agreement, the excess cost shall be charged to and collected from the Contractor. The foregoing provisions are in addition to and not a limitation of any other rights or remedies available to District. Written notice by District shall be deemed given when received by the Contractor, or no later than three (3) days after the day of mailing, whichever is sooner.

- 9. <u>Hold Harmless</u>. Contractor agrees to and does hereby indemnify, hold harmless and defend the District and its governing board, officers, employees and agents from every claim or demand made and every liability, loss, damage or expense, of any nature whatsoever, which may be incurred by reason of:
 - (a) Liability for damages for: (1) death or bodily injury to person; (2) injury to, loss or theft of property; or (3) any other loss, damage or expense arising out of (1) or (2) above, sustained by the Contractor or any person, firm or corporation employed by the Contractor, either directly or by independent contract, upon or in connection with the Services called for in this Agreement, however caused, except for liability for damages referred to above which result from the sole negligence or willful misconduct of the District or its officers, employees or agents.
 - (b) Any injury to or death of any person(s), including the District's officers, employees and agents, or damage to or loss of any property caused by any act, neglect, default, or omission of the Contractor, or any person, firm or corporation employed by the Contractor, either directly or by independent contract, arising out of, or in any way connected with, the Services covered by this Agreement, whether said injury or damage occurs either on or off District's property, except for liability for damages which result from the sole negligence or willful misconduct of the District or its officers, employees or agents.
 - (c) Any liability for damages which may arise from the furnishing or use of any copyrighted or uncopyrighted matter or patented or unpatented invention under this Agreement.
- 10. <u>Insurance</u>. Contractor shall insure Contractor's activities in connection with the Services under this Agreement and agrees to carry insurance to ensure Contractor's ability to adhere to the indemnification requirements under this Agreement.

- 10.1 Contractor shall, at Contractor's sole cost and expense, maintain in full force and effect the following insurance coverages from a California licensed insurer with an A, VIII, or better rating from A.M. Best or an approved self insurance program, sufficient to cover any claims, damages, liabilities, costs and expenses (including attorney fees) arising out of or in connection with Contractor's fulfillment of the obligations under this Agreement:
 - a. Comprehensive or Commercial Form General Liability Insurance, including bodily injury, property damage and contractual liability with minimum limits as follows:

The policy may not contain an exclusion for coverage of claims arising from claims for sexual molestation or abuse. This policy shall include or be endorsed to include abuse and molestation coverage of at least \$1,000,000 for each occurrence.

- b. Business Automobile Liability Insurance for owned, scheduled, non-owned, or hired automobiles with a combined single limit not less than \$1,000,000 per occurrence. (Required only if the Contractor drives on behalf of the District in the course of performing Services.)
- c. Professional Liability Insurance with a limit of \$1,000,000 per occurrence, if applicable; \$2,000,000 aggregate.
- d. Workers' Compensation and Employers Liability Insurance in a form and amount covering Contractor's full liability under the California Workers' Compensation Insurance and Safety Act and in accordance with applicable state and federal laws. The policy shall be endorsed with the insurer's waiver of rights of subrogation against the District.

Part A - Statutory Limits for Contractor
Part B - \$1,000,000/\$1,000,000/\$1,000,000 Employers' Liability

e. Employment Practices Liability (EPL) and Directors and Officers (D&O) coverage with the following limits: \$1,000,000 per occurrence

It should be expressly understood, however, that the coverage and limits referred to under a., b. and c. above shall not in any way limit the liability of the Contractor. If Contractor maintains broader coverage and/or higher

limits than the minimums required herein, the District shall be entitled to the broader coverage and/or higher limits maintained by the Contractor.

10.2 Upon execution of this Agreement by the District and Contractor, and prior to commencing the Services under this Agreement, Contractor shall provide District with certificates of insurance evidencing all coverages and endorsements required hereunder.

Contractor shall provide prior written notice to the District thirty (30) days in advance of any non-renewal, cancellation, or modification of the required insurance. The certificates of insurance providing the coverages referred to in clauses a and b above shall:

- name District, its Governing Board, officers, and employees, as additional insureds with appropriate endorsements.
- be endorsed with the insurer's waiver of rights of subrogation against the District.

In addition, the certificates of insurance shall include a provision stating "Such insurance as is afforded by this policy shall be primary, and any insurance carried by District shall be excess and noncontributory." Failure to maintain the above-mentioned insurance coverages shall be cause for termination of this Agreement.

- 11. <u>Assignment</u>. The obligations of the Contractor pursuant to this Agreement shall not be assigned by the Contractor.
- 12. <u>Compliance with Applicable Laws</u>. The Services completed herein must meet the approval of the District and shall be subject to the District's general right of inspection to secure the satisfactory completion thereof. Contractor agrees to comply with all federal, state and local laws, rules, regulations and ordinances that are now or may in the future become applicable to Contractor, Contractor's business, the Services, equipment and personnel engaged in Services covered by this Agreement or accruing out of the performance of such Services.
- 12.1. <u>Fingerprinting</u>. Education Code section 45125.1 requires that employees of a Contractor providing certain services to school districts must be fingerprinted by the California Department of Justice for a criminal records check, unless the District determines that the Contractor and/or Contractor's employees will have limited or no contact with District's students. In making this determination, the District will consider the totality of the circumstances. If the District has determined that fingerprinting is required, whether or not the Services are one of those listed in Section 45125.1, the Contractor expressly agrees that Contractor and all of Contractor's current and subsequent employees will submit or have

submitted fingerprints in a manner required by the California Department of Justice, as set forth in Education Code section 45125.1. Contractor and/or Contractor's current and subsequent employees shall not come in contact with students until the Department of Justice has ascertained that the Contractor and/or Contractor's employees have not been convicted of a serious or violent felony. Contractor shall certify in writing to the Governing Board of the District that none of its employees who may come in contact with students have been convicted of a serious or violent felony; and shall provide to the Governing Board of the District a list of names of its employees who may come in contact with students. Contractor shall fulfill these requirements at its own expense. The District may require the Contractor and its current and subsequent employees to submit to additional criminal records checks at the District's sole and absolute discretion.

If the District has determined that fingerprinting is not required, the Contractor and/or Contractor's current and subsequent employees shall check in with the District or school site office each day immediately upon arriving at the District or school site; employees shall inform District or school site office staff of their proposed activities and location at the District or school site; once at the District or school site, Contractor and/or Contractor's employees shall not change locations without contacting the District or school site office; Contractor and/or Contractor's employees shall not use student restroom facilities; and, if Contractor and/or Contractor's employees encounter any students, Contractor and/or Contractor's employees shall immediately leave the area and contact the District or school site office and receive further direction from District or school site office staff.

- 12.2. <u>Tuberculosis Testing</u>. Contractor and/or Contractor's current and subsequent employees providing Services to the District agree to undergo tuberculosis screening and to submit written verification of negative results for tuberculosis, if required by the District, prior to commencing Services pursuant to this Agreement.
- 13. <u>Permits/Licenses</u>. Contractor and all Contractor's employees or agents shall secure and maintain in force such permits and licenses as are required by law in connection with the furnishing of Services pursuant to this Agreement.
- 14. <u>Employment with Public Agency</u>. Contractor, if an employee of another public agency, agrees that Contractor will not receive salary or remuneration, other than vacation pay, as an employee of another public agency for the actual time in which Services are actually being performed pursuant to this Agreement.
- 15. Entire Agreement/Amendment. This Agreement and any exhibits attached hereto constitute the entire Agreement among the parties to it and supersedes any prior or contemporaneous understanding or Agreement with respect to the Services contemplated, and may be amended only by a written amendment executed by both parties to the Agreement. This Agreement incorporates by this reference, any exhibits, which are attached hereto and incorporated herein.
- 16. <u>Nondiscrimination</u>. Contractor agrees that it will not engage in unlawful discrimination in employment of persons because of race, ethnicity, religion, nationality,

disability, gender, sex, marital status, age, or other characteristics protected by federal or state laws of such persons.

- 17. Non Waiver. The failure of District or Contractor to seek redress for violation of, or to insist upon, the strict performance of any term or condition of this Agreement, shall not be deemed a waiver by that party of such term or condition, or prevent a subsequent similar act from again constituting a violation of such term or condition.
- 18. <u>Notice</u>. All notices or demands to be given under this Agreement by either party to the other shall be in writing and given either by: (a) personal service or (b) by U.S. Mail, mailed either by registered or certified mail, return receipt requested, with postage prepaid. Service shall be considered given when received if personally served or if mailed on the third day after deposit in any U.S. Post Office. The address to which notices or demands may be given by either party may be changed by written notice given in accordance with the notice provisions of this section. At the date of this Agreement, the addresses of the parties are as follows:
