Local Control Accountability Plan (LCAP)

Proposal

Staff will present information regarding the Local Control Accountability Plan (LCAP) and District data as gathered through the Hanover Research survey. The presentation will include a review and discussion of data, the importance of communication, and how the district visual and performing arts program (VAPA) has aligned to the LCAP. The Board of Education will be provided with an opportunity to review and discuss.

Background

On January 19, 2017, staff presented information to the Board on the Local Control Accountability Plan (LCAP) and provided a status at that time. The LCAP is a State requirement resulting from the Local Control Funding Formula (LCFF). Each school district is required to obtain input from various parents, educators, employees, and the community to establish these plans. The plans describe the school district's overall vision for students, annual goals, and specific actions the district will take to achieve the vision and goals. LBUSD is planning for the 2017-2020 LCAP.

The LCAP must focus on eight areas identified as State priorities. The plan must also demonstrate how the District's budget will help achieve the goals, and then annually assess how well the strategies detailed in the LCAP improved outcomes.

There are eight areas for which school districts, with parent and community input, must establish goals and actions. This must be done both district-wide and for each school. The areas are:

- 1. Providing all students with access to fully credentialed teachers, instructional materials that align with state standards, and safe facilities.
- 2. Implementation of California's academic standards, including the Common Core State Standards in English language arts and math, Next Generation Science Standards, English language development, history social science, visual and performing arts, health education and physical education standards.
- 3. Parent involvement and participation, so the local community is engaged in the decision-making process and the educational programs of students.
- 4. Improving student achievement and outcomes along multiple measures, including test scores, English proficiency and college and career preparedness.
- 5. Supporting student engagement, including whether students attend school or are chronically absent.
- 6. Highlighting school climate and connectedness through a variety of factors, such as suspension and expulsion rates and other locally identified means.
- 7. Ensuring all students have access to classes that prepare them for college and careers, regardless of what school they attend or where they live.
- 8. Measuring other important student outcomes related to required areas of study, including physical education and the arts.

After gathering information regarding student achievement, school climate, stakeholder involvement, and effectiveness of district programs, site leaders met with stakeholder groups. These groups, including School Site Councils (SSC), District English Learner Advisory Committee (DELAC), Parent Teacher Association (PTA), school staff group, reviewed LCAP survey. This feedback will provide input into the LBUSD Local Control Accountability Plan.

The District budget is built around the needs identified in the LCAP. Funding is planned for various District initiatives in accordance with the eight priorities established by the State. The draft LCAP, with its goals and budget allocations, will be presented at a Public Hearing to the Board on June 13, 2017 with a request for final Board approval at the June 27, 2017 Board meeting to meet the statutory July 1 deadline.

Report on Student Survey Results Regarding Athletic Participation and Requested Sports Programs From Middle and High School Students

Dr. Viloria introduced Lance Neal, Athletic Director. Mr. Neal stated students in grades 6 - 12 were surveyed regarding which sports they would like to participate in at the high school, and if there was any interest for any other sports to be added. Of those who responded to the survey, there was an interest from 179 boys and 178 girls to add Lacrosse and 98 boys and 22 girls noted interest to add wrestling.

Implications

Proposal

Staff proposes the Board of Education approve a contract with All City Management Services, Inc., to provide a school crossing guard at Thurston Middle School for the 2017-2018 school year, with a not-to-exceed amount of \$12,500.

Background

The District has been advised by its liability carrier that District employees should not attempt to control traffic on city streets because they are not on District property and traffic control is generally a municipal responsibility. District employees are not trained to control vehicular traffic and any effort to do so could endanger employees as well as students. School districts are not required to provide assistance crossing streets adjacent to schools. However, given the heavy traffic and large number of students who cross the street in front of Thurston Middle School, it is prudent to provide crossing guard services to reduce possible safety risks to students. The City of Laguna Beach has agreed to share the costs of these services.

Budget Impact

This contract will be paid from the General Fund, with 50% reimbursed by the City of Laguna Beach.

Recommended Action

Staff recommends the Board of Education approve a contract with All City Management Services, Inc., to provide a school crossing guard at Thurston Middle School for the 2017-2018 school year, with a not-to-exceed amount of \$12,500.

Authorization to Renew License to Use Agreement with Orin Neufeld to Operate a Youth Recreation Facility at 2003 Laguna Canyon Road

Proposal

Staff proposes the Board of Education authorize the renewal of the License to Use Agreement with Orin Neufeld to operate a youth recreation facility at 2003 Laguna Canyon Road.

Background

The terms of this License to Use Agreement allow for annual renewal if both parties are in mutual agreement.

Budget Impact

Approval of the proposed use agreement would result in a gross income to the District of \$16,000 for one full year.

Agreement Components

Premises: LICENSOR agrees to allow LICENSEE to use the premises situated in the City of Laguna Beach, County of Orange, State of California, hereinafter referred to as Premises, and more particularly described as 2003 Laguna Canyon Road. LICENSOR agrees that LICENSEE shall have exclusive use of the rear portion of the PREMISES and joint use of office, restrooms, sidewalks and parking lots.

Term: The term of this Agreement shall commence on July 1, 2017, and terminate on June 30, 2018, subject to earlier termination as set forth herein. This AGREEMENT may be renewed for subsequent one (1) year terms upon mutual written agreement of the PARTIES. Neither Mr. Neufeld nor his supporters will contest termination of this USE AGREEMENT if the Board of Education deems it has determined a better use for the property.

License Fees: LICENSEE shall pay LICENSOR a license to use fee in the sum of sixteen hundred dollars (\$1600) per month (\$16,000 total) plus utilities as set forth in Section 5.0 of the AGREEMENT. LICENSEE shall pay LICENSOR this fee amount on the 1st of every month throughout the duration of the term. All of said fees shall be paid to: Laguna Beach Unified School District, 550 Blumont Street, Laguna Beach, California 92651, or at such other place as LICENSOR may designate in writing. In the event of any renewal of this AGREEMENT, the amount of the annual fees may be adjusted to reflect a cost of living adjustment each subsequent January 1st. The adjustment shall be calculated upon the basis of the United States Department of Labor, Bureau of Labor Statistics, Consumer Price Index Sub-Group – "All Items" for the Los Angeles, Anaheim, Riverside Western area published for the month of May of each year. LICENSEE shall not pay any license fees for the months of July and August 2017 due to decreased activity for youth sports.

Recommended Action

Proposal

Staff proposes the Board of Education approve the second year of a three-year annually renewable contract with Vavrinek, Trine, Day & Co., LLP (VTD) to perform district auditing services for fiscal years 2016-2017 with a not-to-exceed amount of \$36,000; 2017-2018 with a not-to-exceed amount of \$37,000; and 2018-2019 with a not-to-exceed amount of \$38,000.

Background

Education Code 41020 requires that each school district shall provide for an annual audit of the books and accounts of the school district.

Pursuant to Government Code Section 53060 the audit firm selection process does not require a district to go to bid. Per Education Code 41020, we are required to select and sign an agreement for our fiscal year 2017-2018 annual audit and submit it to the Orange County Office of Education (OCDE) by April 1, 2018. If we do not meet this deadline, OCDE is required to provide an audit selection for us no later than May 1, 2018.

With the passage of AB2834 and in accordance with Education Code 41020 (f) (2), "it is unlawful for a public accounting firm to provide audit services to a local educational agency if the lead audit partner, or coordinating audit partner responsible for reviewing the audit, has performed audit services for that local educational agency in each of the six previous fiscal years." It is the policy of VTD to change the lead audit partner at a maximum of six years and to change members of the field audit staff on an annual basis.

OCDE strongly recommends selection of an audit firm familiar with the audit requirements of California K-12 school districts. VTD has provided auditing services to school districts, community college districts and county offices since 1948. They have performed thousands of audits and are currently providing audit services to more than 200 districts in California, including 16 districts in Orange County.

VTD has provided information regarding their firm's review by Yanari Watson McGaughey P.C., of their system of quality control for the accounting and auditing practice. Their reputation for quality of performance and integrity is excellent throughout the state and VTD is deemed qualified by the State Controller to conduct audits of local education agencies.

Budget Impact

The maximum annual fee for auditing services for fiscal year 2017-2018 shall not exceed \$37,000. This amount will be paid from the General Fund.

Recommended Action

Staff recommends the Board of Education approve the second year of a three-year annually renewable contract with Vavrinek, Trine, Day & Co., LLP (VTD) to perform district auditing services for fiscal years 2016-2017 with a not-to-exceed amount of \$36,000; 2017-2018 with a not-to-exceed amount of \$37,000; and 2018-2019 with a not-to-exceed amount of \$38,000.

Proposal

Staff proposes the Board of Education approve a consulting services agreement with Total Compensation Systems, Inc. to perform actuarial valuation of the Laguna Beach Unified School District Other Post-Employment Benefits (OPEB) for the 2017-2018 school year, with a not-to-exceed amount of \$14,000.

Background

On June 2, 2015, the Governmental Accounting Standards Board (GASB) approved two new accounting and financial reporting Statements related to other postemployment benefits (OPED) for state and local governments. Statement No. 74, Financial Reporting for Postemployment Benefit Plans Other Than Pension Plans, proposes new accounting and reporting standards for state and local OPEB plans. It replaces Statement No. 43, and requires more extensive note disclosures and required supplementary information (RSI) for defined benefit OPEB plans. Statement No. 74 is effective for plan fiscal years beginning after June 15, 2016.

Statement No. 75, Accounting and Financial Reporting for Postemployment Benefits Other Than Pensions, applies to state and local government employers that sponsor OPEB. It replaces Statement No. 45, and requires governments to report a liability on the face of their financial statements for the OPED provided. Statement No. 75 is effective for fiscal years beginning after June 15, 2017.

While valuations are required no less frequently than every two years under GASB 74/75, a "roll forward" or "roll back" calculation is required for every valuation cycle to determine the second year (or first year in the case of a "roll-back") accounting entries. Total Compensation Systems, Inc. will prepare this actuarial estimate of plan costs and liabilities to comply with GASB 74/75.

Budget Impact

This contract will be paid from the General Fund.

Recommended Action

Staff recommends the Board of Education approve a consulting services agreement with Total Compensation Systems, Inc. to perform an actuarial valuation of the Laguna Beach Unified School District Other Post-Employment Benefits (OPEB) for the 2017-2018 school year, with a not-to-exceed amount of \$14,000.

CONSULTING SERVICES AGREEMENT

This Agreement is entered into effective the 1st day of July, 2017 by and between Total Compensation Systems, Inc. ("Consultant"), a California corporation with principal offices located at 5655 Lindero Canyon Road, Suite 223, Westlake Village, California, 91362 and Laguna Beach Unified School District ("Customer").

The following shall govern the provision of consulting services by Consultant to Customer.

- 1. <u>Consulting Services</u>. Consultant shall provide the consulting services described on Schedule 1 attached hereto.
- Compensation to Consultant. Customer shall pay Consultant for the consulting services described on Schedule 1 attached hereto the compensation set forth on Schedule 2 attached hereto.
- 3. Term and Termination. (a) Term. This Agreement shall commence on the date first written above and shall continue in effect until June 30, 2018, or until all consulting services described on Schedule 1 have been performed, whichever occurs first, unless sooner terminated in accordance with the provisions of this Agreement. (b) Termination Without Cause. This agreement may be terminated at any time by either party upon sixty (60) days prior written notice to the other party. (c) Termination With Cause. Either party shall have the right to terminate this Agreement upon the failure of either party to observe any of the covenants and agreements required to be observed by it under this Agreement, and such failure continues for a period of thirty (30) days after written notice thereof. (d) Rights and Obligations after Termination. Termination of this agreement shall not relieve either party of any rights or obligations arising out of the Agreement prior to termination, with the exception that the amount of the final payment that shall be made by Customer shall be based solely upon the percentage of work that was completed by Consultant.
- 4. <u>Customer Will Provide Information</u>. Customer shall provide Consultant with the information necessary for Consultant to provide the consulting services described on Schedule 1 attached hereto.
- 5. <u>Authorization to Acquire Information</u>. Customer hereby authorizes Consultant to acquire the necessary information reasonably required by Consultant to provide the consulting services described on Schedule 1 attached hereto from any agency, agencies, source or sources.
- 6. <u>Customer's Right to Provide Information</u>. Customer represents and warrants to Consultant that it has the right to provide the information that will be given by Customer to Consultant, or which will be acquired by Consultant pursuant to paragraphs 4 and 5 above.
- 7. <u>Limitation on Services</u>. Customer understands that Customer retains sole authority and responsibility for the operation and design of all Customer's employee benefit plans.
- 8. <u>Ownership of Systems and Materials.</u> All systems, programs, operating instructions, forms and other documentation prepared by or for Consultant shall be and remain the property of Consultant. All data source documents provided by Customer shall remain the property of Customer.
- 9. <u>Indemnification</u>. (a) By Customer. Customer hereby agrees to defend and indemnify Consultant and hold Consultant harmless against any claims, injury, costs or damages (including actual attorneys' fees incurred) resulting from Customer's gross negligence or willful misconduct. (b) By Consultant. Consultant hereby agrees to defend and indemnify Customer and hold Customer

harmless against any claims, injury, costs or damages (including actual attorneys' fees incurred) resulting from Consultant's gross negligence or willful misconduct.

10. General.

- a. <u>Relationship of the Parties</u>. The relationship between Consultant and Customer established by this Agreement is that of independent contractors. Consultant and Customer shall each conduct its respective business at its own initiative, responsibility, and expense, and shall have no authority to incur any obligations on behalf of the other.
- b. <u>Force Majeure</u>. No party shall have liability for damages or non-performance under this Agreement due to fire, explosion, strikes or labor disputes, water, acts of God, war, civil disturbances, acts of civil or military authorities or the public enemy, transportation, facilities, labor, fuel or energy shortages, or other causes beyond that party's control.
- c. <u>Entire Agreement</u>. This Agreement and the Schedules attached hereto contain the entire agreement between the parties and supersedes all previous agreements and proposals, oral or written, and all negotiations, conversations, or discussions between the parties related to the subject matter of this Agreement. This Agreement shall not be deemed or construed to be modified, amended, rescinded, canceled or waived in whole or in part, except by written amendment signed by both of the parties hereto.
- 11. <u>Confidentiality</u>. Consultant recognizes that its work will bring it into close contact with confidential information of Customer, including personal information about employees of Customer. Consultant agrees not to disclose anything that is the confidential information of Customer, or that is proprietary to Customer, including its software, its legacy applications, and its databases, to any third party.

SCHEDULE 1

For the purposes of this Agreement, "consulting services" shall include the following services provided by Consultant to Customer:

Consulting reports including all actuarial information necessary for Customer to comply with the requirements of current GASB accounting standards 74/75 related to retiree health benefits for two years, including one full valuation and one "roll-forward" or "roll-back" valuation. Study results will be separated between three employee classifications. Consultant will provide as many copies of the final reports as Customer shall reasonably request.

Services do <u>not</u> include Consultant's attendance at any meetings, unless requested by Customer at the fee shown in Schedule 2. Services also do not include a funding valuation unless requested by Customer at the fee shown in Schedule 2

SCHEDULE 2

Customer shall pay Consultant for the retiree health valuation report based on the full valuation a total of \$6,000. One-half, or \$3,000 shall be due within 30 days of the commencement of work by Consultant. One-half, or \$3,000 shall be due within 30 days of the delivery by Consultant to Customer of the draft consulting report for the full valuation (or within 30 days of contract termination, if earlier). Customer shall also pay Consultant for the retiree valuation report based on the "roll-forward" or "roll-back" valuation a total of \$3,000 within 30 days of the delivery by Consultant to Customer of the draft consulting report for the "roll-forward" or "roll-back" valuation (or within 30 days of contract termination, if earlier)

If Consultant receives a non-refundable deposit from Customer of \$2,700 by July 1, 2017, all amounts shown above shall be reduced by 10%.

In addition to the above fees, Customer agrees to pay Consultant an all-inclusive fee of \$1,900 per meeting to attend meetings related to the consulting services. Customer shall pay such meeting fees within 30 days of the meeting. Also in addition, to all of the above fees, Customer will pay Consultant \$1,800 for each "funding valuation" requested by Customer. Neither the meeting fee nor the fee for a "funding valuation" shall be subject to the above discount or to any other discounts.

This letter is our proposal for GASB 74/75 actuarial valuation services. GASB 74/75 dramatically change the way services are provided, resulting in changes to our contracting practices. This letter includes a lot of information, but is crucial to understand compliance implications of GASB 74/75 for Laguna Beach Unified School District.

Additional Required Work

First, while valuations are required no less frequently than every two years under GASB 74/75, a "roll-forward" or "roll-back" calculation will also be required for every valuation cycle to determine second year (or first year in the case of a "roll-back") accounting entries. The roll-forward or roll-back calculation will depend on the full valuation, so the calculation is an integral part of the actuarial services for each valuation cycle. Under GASB 74/75, we will not only need to make a roll-forward or roll-back calculation, but generate all the information needed to create the Note Disclosures and Required Supplementary Information (RSI) schedules (see below) for the "off-year". The roll-forward/roll-back calculation will be billed separately, but will be included in the same contract.

Second, greatly expanded Note Disclosure requirements will require rerunning the valuation 4 additional times to quantify the net OPEB liability if interest rates are one percent higher or lower than assumed; as well as if health care trend is one percent higher or lower. The need for 4 additional complete valuation runs will increase our work significantly.

Third, there will be deferred inflows and outflows that will need to be calculated and tracked – some for longer than ten years. Calculating, tracking and reporting these deferred items require additional work, in and of itself. Also, up to two additional valuation runs may be required to determine the amount of liability changes subject to immediate or deferred recognition.

Fourth, there will no longer be an Annual Required Contribution (ARC) or Annual OPEB Cost (AOC). The OPEB expense that replaces the ARC and AOC will be far more volatile. Recognition of some liability changes can no longer be spread at all; and those that *can* be spread will be spread over much shorter time periods. In addition, for unfunded plans, the interest assumption is likely to be subject to greater *and* more frequent change. In addition to the volatility of OPEB expense, GASB 74/75 mandates certain assumptions that may not be appropriate for funding purposes (e.g. inclusion of the Cadillac Tax). As a result of OPEB expense volatility and mandatory assumptions, the accounting valuation is not likely to be directly usable for funding purposes. Therefore employers that are systematically funding OPEB obligations may choose to have a separate "funding valuation." We are including a funding valuation in the contract as a separate, optional service.

Separate Billing for Roll-Forward/Roll-back Valuation

For the above reasons, the amount of work associated with performing OPEB valuations will dramatically increase. In the past, we would have had to increase fees by anywhere from \$6,000 to \$14,000 to accommodate the additional work. However, we have been working for several years to modify our systems and procedures in order to streamline the valuation process under GASB 74/75 to the greatest extent possible. We have been able to reduce the additional required fees to a fraction of what they would have been, but our fees will still unavoidably include more than an inflation increase. For Laguna Beach Unified School District, our total fee for the full accounting valuation will be \$6,000 and, for the roll-forward or roll-back the fee will be \$3,000 (i.e. excluding any meetings and excluding a funding valuation). Partially offsetting the

fee increase is the fact that we are offering a 10% discount as will be explained below.

Since GASB 74/75 now require actuarial calculations for the "off year" of the two year valuation cycle, and to make costs more manageable for our clients, we will bill the roll-forward/roll-back valuation separately. As before, the first and second installments for the full valuation will be at the beginning and end of the full valuation. A third installment will be due within 30 days of completion of the roll-forward or roll-back valuation. For roll-back valuations, this will be immediately after the full valuation is completed. Roll-forward valuations would typically be done about a year after the full valuation. This arrangement will keep the fee for the full valuation only modestly higher than under GASB 43/45, with most of the cost increase resulting from the "off-year" valuation for biennial clients. (Triennial clients will also have cost increases related to moving from a three-year to a two-year cycle.)

While this fee does NOT include any on-site meetings, it *does* include unlimited phone support. The additional fee for a meeting would be \$1,900. Our fee also does not include a valuation explicitly for funding purposes. If Laguna Beach Unified School District would like a funding valuation, the additional fee would be \$1,800.

Reserving Valuation Slot and Ten Percent Discount

The increased work associated with GASB 74/75 will stretch actuarial resources system wide, so we expect there to be increased demand for services. Again, we have been preparing for GASB 74/75 for a long time and we have been enhancing our resources to meet the greatly expanded requirements. We are aware, however, that several OPEB actuaries have recently retired, which will squeeze OPEB actuarial resources even further. As if this wasn't enough, GASB 74/75 will require all public agencies to have valuations every two years rather than allowing those agencies with fewer than 200 participants to have triennial valuations. There are a very large number of public agencies in California (perhaps 2,000) qualifying for triennial valuations under GASB 43/45 that will now be compressed into a two year cycle. On top of everything else, odd-numbered years (like 2017) have a lot more valuations because virtually all 500 agencies participating in the CalPERS CERBT program will need to have their valuations done as of June 30, 2017. They will be joined by all other agencies funding through a trust because the GASB 74/75 implementation date is June 30, 2017 for trust plans.

The extreme increase in the amount of work plus the scarcity of actuarial resources will require us to schedule valuations more tightly than ever before. We will give first priority to existing clients. We will accept new clients only if we have room in our schedule after accommodating our existing clients.

In order to confidently schedule existing clients, we will be asking for commitments in advance of the valuation date. To reserve a place in our schedule, we will require a signed contract and a non-refundable deposit of one-half of the full valuation fee by July 1, 2017. The deposit is non-refundable because of the preliminary work we will do to streamline valuations, as well as to compensate for downtime of resources that could result from cancelled contracts that could have been used to handle additional clients. By reserving a spot, Laguna Beach Unified School District will not only guarantee a valuation slot, but will be given priority over every client that didn't reserve one. As an additional incentive to reserving early, we are giving a 10% discount of the full valuation fee (i.e. excluding the meeting fee and funding valuation fee) – as well as of the roll-forward/roll-back valuation fee – to those who reserve a spot by July 1, 2017. That means that, to reserve a spot, we must receive the signed contract and a check for \$2,700 – i.e. one-half of 90% of \$6,000 – by July 1, 2017. The following table shows the new fees under GASB 74/75 compared with what the fees would have been under GASB 43/45

Review of Approved Supplementary Materials for 2017/2018

Proposal

Staff will present an overview of approvals of supplementary materials for the 2017/2018 school year.

Background

Teachers submitted supplementary materials requests for approval for the 2017/2018 school year. Per Board Policy 6161.11, supplementary materials may be selected by the Superintendent or designee, school administrators, or teachers, as applicable. Supplementary materials shall be directly related to the course of study in which they are being used and shall be appropriate for the age and maturity level of the students.

Lexia Core

Lexia Core is an online K-5 reading intervention program. It allows teachers to individualize reading instruction to meet their students' specific needs. It will be used in all reading intervention classrooms as well as summer school. It is computer adaptive and provides scripted lessons for teachers to remediate and instruct students in prescriptive ways. The cost of this program is \$12,750 for two sites.

DBQ Supplemental Curriculum

The DBQ project is an online curriculum that emphasizes inquiry based content sources and aims to develop students' critical thinking skills. This curriculum was brought forward to supplement the history/social studies curriculum and better align instruction to the new framework. The cost of this program is \$1,125 for Thurston Middle School.

Budget Impact

The cost of these materials, approximately \$13,875, will come from the instructional materials account.

LAGUNA BEACH UNIFIED SCHOOL DISTRICT FUND DESCRIPTIONS

- FUND 01 The General Fund is the chief operating fund for Laguna Beach USD. It is used to account for the ordinary operations of the district. All transactions except those required or permitted by law to be in another fund are accounted for in this fund. Restricted projects or activities within the general fund must be identified and reported separately from unrestricted projects or activities.
- FUND 11 The Adult Education Fund is a separate fund used to account for state appropriations and to finance specific programs for the education of adults. Funds can be expended on salaries, benefits, supplies, books, services, and equipment related to adult education programs (Education Code Section 52616.4).
- FUND 13 The Cafeteria Fund (Nutrition Services) is used to account separately for federal, state, and local resources to operate the food service program (Education Code sections 38090-38093). The purpose of the food service program is to provide nutritious meals to the students. The District participates in the National School Lunch Program and the School Breakfast Program. The District serves approximately 500-550 lunches and 200-230 breakfasts to the students from kindergarten through twelfth grade on a daily basis.
- FUND 17 The Special Reserve Fund for Other Than Capital Outlay Projects is used primarily to provide for the accumulation of moneys for general operating purposes other than for capital outlay (Education Code Section 42840). On May 11, 2004 the Board of Education approved the target of reserving two-thirds of the basic aid differential (the difference between Revenue Limit funding and Basic Aid funding) to be achieved by June 30, 2009. Funds reserved for the Basic Aid differential are deposited into this fund.
- FUND 25 The Capital Facilities Fund (Developer Fees) exists to account for monies received as mitigation fees levied on developers, property owners or other agencies as a condition of approving new development or additions to existing real property. The authority for these levies may be local government ordinances (GC 65970-65981) or private agreements between a school district and the developer. Expenditures from this fund are to be used for the purpose of funding the construction or reconstruction of school facilities (Education Code sections 17620-17626).
- FUND 40 The Special Reserve Fund for Capital Outlay Projects exists to account for the accumulation of moneys for capital outlay purposes (Education Code Section 42840). This fund is separated into three sub-funds in accordance to with resolutions #01-02, #14-02 and #14-03.
 - Sub-fund 4040 exists to account for the Facility Repair and Replacement Program (FRRP).

Sub-fund 4041 exists to account for the Vista Aliso property reserve. The District holds a repurchase agreement on the property.

Sub-fund 4042 exists to account for the Capital Improvement Plan (CIP) that goes above and beyond prior commitments for repair and replacement needs, but extends to improvements of facilities for program and enrollment growth. A ten-year plan will be developed and revised, at least annually, to prioritize major projects.

19. ACTION May 23, 2017

Approval: Add the Sports of Lacrosse and Wrestling to LBHS Athletic Offerings

Proposal

Staff recommends the Board of Education approve the addition of boys and girls lacrosse and co-ed wrestling to the LBHS athletic offerings for the 2017-2018 school year.

Background

Laguna Beach High School Athletic Director, Lance Neal, presented information to the Board of Education at the May 9, 2017 Board meeting regarding the results of a student survey done for students in grades 6-11 regarding athletic participation, both current and future. The results of the survey indicated an interest by 179 boys and 178 girls to add lacrosse teams and 98 boys and 22 girls to add coed wrestling. Mr. Neal identified several areas that will need to be considered before adding any new sports:

Considerations:

- o Title IX
- o Budget / Cost
- o Facilities availability within LBUSD
- Impact on current sports

Staff has researched the potential costs of adding the wrestling and lacrosse programs and has found the following:

Based on the costs outlined above, it is estimated there is \$19,750 in one-time costs to initiate the programs and \$50,500 in ongoing costs. The ongoing costs assume a replacement is needed of the major equipment, i.e. wrestling mats, goals, and player equipment every five years. So while the funds may not be spent each year they will need to be saved to insure all the equipment is replaced at end of useful life.

Mr. Neal will provide the Board of Education specific responses to the identified areas to be addressed as well as present a timetable and cost estimate to add two new sports to the high school programming. Due to Title IX requirements, in order to add a Boys Lacrosse program at the high school there must be a Girls Lacrosse program. Due to the fact that wrestling is a co-ed program, its addition is not dependent on a complimentary girls sport being added.

Budget Impact

The budget impact would be approximately \$70,250 for the 2017-2018 school year, with ongoing costs of \$50,500 for each year thereafter and would be paid for from the General Fund.

Recommended Action

Staff recommends the Board of Education approve the addition of boys and girls lacrosse and co-ed wrestling to the LBHS athletic offerings for the 2017-2018 school year under the agreement that in order for boys lacrosse to be added as a sport there must be the addition of a girls lacrosse team.

20. ACTION May 23, 2017

Approval:

Apply for a Waiver Pursuant to Education Code Section 37202(a), Equity Length of Time for TK Students to Attend School Fewer Minutes than Kindergarten Students

Proposal:

A public hearing was held on May 9, 2017 to gather public comment on the District's desire to request a waiver for the *Equity Length of Time* in accordance with Education Code Section 37202(a), which will allow TK students to attend school fewer minutes than kindergarten students.

Staff shared information to the School Board at the February 14, 2017, Board Meeting about the benefits of full-day kindergarten at Laguna Beach Unified School District. This Public Hearing is being held to explain the waiving of Education Code Section 37202(a), which allows TK students to attend school for fewer minutes than kindergarten students.

Laguna Beach Unified School District's Transitional Kindergarten program for the 2017-18 school year is proposed to remain a half-day program, allowing students to attend school for fewer minutes than the 2017-2018 full-day kindergarten program. This difference is acknowledged for the *Equity Length of Time Waiver* for California Department of Education, allowing the TK program to remain a half-day program and not mirror the full-day kindergarten program.

Background

Laguna Beach Unified School District is requesting to waive the equity length of time requirement for kindergarten programs. Pursuant to EC Section 37202(a), any TK program operated by a district must be of equal length to any kindergarten program operated by the same district. LBUSD will offer full-day kindergarten program for the 2017-18 school year and request flexibility in determining the length of the TK program in order to provide a modified instructional day, curricula, and developmentally appropriate instructional practices.

- Consultation and support by a representative of the Laguna Beach Unified Faculty Association (LaBUFA) January 11, 2017
- Review and input by an advisory committee January 25, February 6, March 1, and April 12, 2017
- Review and Discussion by the Board of Trustees February 14, 2017
- Public Hearing May 9, 2017
- Approval by the Board of Trustees May 23, 2017
- Approval by the California Board of Education

In addition to the above steps, the District reviewed academic data for students in Transitional Kindergarten and sought input from current Transitional Kindergarten parents and teachers to help inform the decision to apply for a waiver.

Consultation and support by a representative of the Laguna Beach Unified Faculty Association (LaBUFA).

Budget Impact

There is no budget impact at this time.

WHEREAS, the School District desires to provide the Easement to City for installation, maintenance, repair, replacement and restoration of landscaping, hardscaping, and related irrigation improvements consistent with use as a public park;

WHEREAS, the School District's governing board must, prior to dedicating an easement, adopt a resolution declaring its intention to dedicate such easement in a regular open meeting by two-thirds (2/3) vote of all of its members;

WHEREAS, the School District's governing board must fix a time at its regular place of meeting for a public hearing upon the question of making the dedication of the Easement; and

WHEREAS, the School District is required to post copies of this Resolution, signed by the board, in three (3) public places within the School District's boundaries not less than ten (10) days before the public hearing, and publish notice once, not less than five (5) days before the public hearing in a newspaper of general circulation published in the School District, if there is one, or, if there is no such newspaper published in the School District, then in a newspaper published in the county which has a general circulation in the School District.

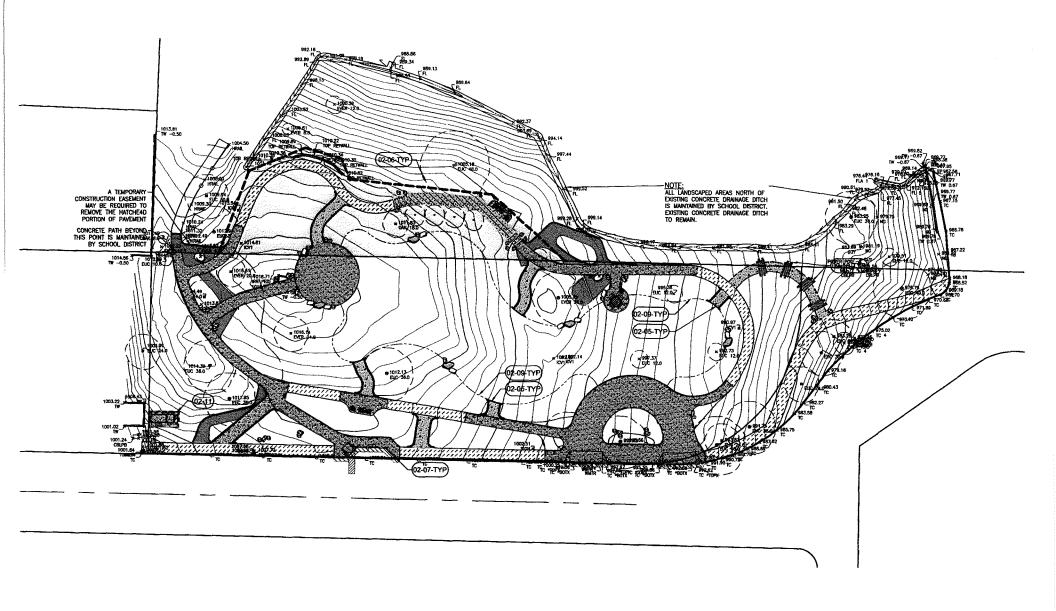

Approval: Award of Contract for Roofing Replacements at Various Sites to Best Contracting

Services, Inc. in the Amount of \$317,713.00, Which Results in a Total Project Cost

of \$434,565.13

Proposal

Staff proposes the Board of Education award the contract for roofing replacements at various sites to Best Contracting Services, Inc., in the amount of \$317,713.00, at a total project cost of \$434,565.13.

Background

The Board approved a California Multiple Award Contract (CMAS) on June 9, 2015, for the purchase of roofing materials related to restoration and replacements from The Garland Company. The CMAS contract with Garland allows the District to purchase the roofing materials and bid the labor separately. The material cost for the roofing projects proposed at Thurston Middle School and El Morro Elementary School will cost \$116,852.13. If Best Contracting Services is awarded the bid for labor associated with the roofing projects, the total project cost will be \$434,565.13.

The bid documents were completed and first advertised on April 27, 2017. Nine (9) firms attended the mandatory pre-bid job walk and three (3) firms submitted bids on the due date of May 12, 2017:

- Letner Roofing Co.- UNOPENED AND NON RESPONSIVE DUE TO BID SUBMITTED AFTER NOON DEADLINE
- Best Contracting Services- \$317,713.00
- C. I. Services, Inc.- \$409,804.00

After careful review of the bid documents received, it was determined that Best Contracting Services, Inc., was the lowest responsive and responsible bidder for the roof replacements at various sites throughout the District.

Budget Impact

The fiscal impact to the District is \$434,565.13 to be expended from the Special Reserve for Capital Outlay Fund (4040) for the Facilities Repair and Replacement Program (FRRP).

Recommended Action

Staff recommends the Board of Education award the contract for roofing replacements at various sites to Best Contracting Services, Inc., in the amount of \$317,713, at a total project cost of \$434,565.13.

AGREEMENT FORM

THIS AGREEMENT, entered into this 24th day of May, 2017 in the County of Orange of the State of California, by and between the Laguna Beach Unified School District, hereinafter called the "Owner" or the "District", and Best Contracting Services, Inc., hereinafter called the "Contractor".

WITNESSETH that the Owner and the Contractor for the consideration stated herein agree as follows:

ARTICLE I - SCOPE OF WORK: The Contractor shall furnish all labor, materials, equipment, tools, and utility and transportation services, and perform and complete all work required in connection with Laguna Beach Unified School in strict accordance with the Contract Documents enumerated in Article 7 below. The Contractor shall be liable to the District for any damages arising as a result of a failure to comply with that obligation, and the Contractor shall not be excused with respect to any failure to so comply by an act or omission of the Architect, Engineer, Inspector, Division of the State Architect (DSA), or representative of any of them, unless such act or omission actually prevents the Contractor from fully complying with the Contract Documents and the Contractor protests, in accordance with the Contract Documents, that the act or omission is preventing the Contractor from fully complying with the Contract Documents. Such protest shall not be effective unless reduced to writing and filed with the District office within seven (7) days of the date of occurrence of such act or omission preventing the Contractor from fully complying with the Contract Documents.

ARTICLE 2 - TIME OF COMPLETION: The Owner may give notice to proceed within ninety (90) days of the award of the bid by the Owner. Once the Contractor has received a notice to proceed, the Contractor shall reach Substantial Completion (See Article 1.1.46) of the Work as specified in Addendum No. 1 from receipt of the Notice to Proceed. This shall be called Contract Time. (See Article 8.1.1). It is expressly understood that time is of the essence.

Contractor has thoroughly studied the Project and has satisfied itself that the time period for this Project is adequate for the timely and proper completion of the Project within the Contract time.

In the event that the Owner desires to postpone giving the notice to proceed beyond this ninety (90) day period, it is expressly understood that with reasonable notice to the Contractor, giving the notice to proceed may be postponed by the Owner. It is further expressly understood by the Contractor, that the Contractor shall not be entitled to any claim of additional compensation as a result of the Owner's postponement of giving the notice to proceed.

If the Contractor believes that a postponement will cause hardship to it, the Contractor may terminate the Contract with written notice to the Owner within ten (10) days after receipt by the Contractor of the Owner's notice of postponement. It is further understood by the Contractor that in the event that the Contractor terminates the Contract as a result of postponement by the Owner, the Owner shall only be obligated to pay the Contractor for the work performed by the Contractor at the time of notification of postponement. Should the Contractor terminate the Contract as a result of a notice of postponement, the District shall have the authority to award the Contract to the next lowest responsible bidder.

ARTICLE 3 - LIQUIDATED DAMAGES: It being impracticable and infeasible to determine the amount of actual damage, it is agreed that the Contractor will pay the Owner the sum of Five-Hundred Dollars (\$500.00) per calendar day for each and every day of delay beyond the Contract Time set forth in Article 2 of this Agreement as liquidated damages and not as a penalty or forfeiture. In the event Liquidated Damages are not paid, the Contractor further agrees that the Owner may deduct such amount thereof from any money due or that may become due the Contractor under the Contract (See Article 9.6 and 2.2 of the General Conditions). This Article shall not be construed as preventing the Owner from the recovery of damages (actual or other) under the Contract Documents.

ARTICLE 4 - CONTRACT PRICE: The Owner shall pay to the Contractor as full consideration for the faithful performance of the Contract, subject to any additions or deductions as provided in the Contract Documents, the sum of THREE-HUNDRED SEVENTEEN THOUSAND SEVEN-HUNDRED THIRTEEN DOLLARS (\$317,713), said sum being the total amount stipulated in the Bid Contractor submitted. Payment shall be made as set forth in the General Conditions.

Should any Change Order result in an increase in the Contract Price, the cost of such Change Order shall be agreed to in advance by the Contractor and the Owner, subject to the monetary limitations set forth in Public Contract Code Section 20118.4. In the event that the Contractor proceeds with a Change in work without an agreement between the Owner and Contractor regarding the cost of a Change Order, the Contractor waives any Claim of additional compensation for such additional work.

ARTICLE 5 - HOLD HARMLESS AGREEMENT: Contractor shall defend, indemnify and hold harmless Owner, Architect, Inspector, the State of California and their officers, employees, agents and independent contractors from all liabilities, claims, actions, liens, judgments, demands, damages, losses, costs or expenses of any kind arising from death, personal injury, property damage or other cause based or asserted upon any act, omission, or breach connected with or arising from the progress of Work or performance of service under this Agreement or the Contract Documents. As part of this indemnity, Contractor shall protect and defend, at its own expense, Owner, Architect, Construction Manager, Inspector, the State of California and their officers, employees, agents and independent contractors from any legal action including attorney's fees or other proceeding based upon such act, omission, breach or as otherwise required by this Article.

Furthermore, Contractor agrees to and does hereby defend, indemnify and hold harmless Owner, Architect, Construction Manager, Inspector, the State of California and their officers, employees, agents and independent contractors from every claim or

demand made, and every liability, loss, damage, expense or attorney's fees of any nature whatsoever, which may be incurred by reason of:

- (a) Liability for (1) death or bodily injury to persons; (2) damage or injury to, loss (including theft), or loss of use of, any property; (3) any failure or alleged failure to comply with any provision of law or the Contract Documents; or (4) any other loss, damage or expense, sustained by any person, firm or corporation or in connection with the Work called for in this Agreement or the Contract Documents, except for liability resulting from the sole or active negligence, or the willful misconduct of the Owner.
- (b) Any bodily injury to or death of persons or damage to property caused by any act, omission or breach of Contractor or any person, firm or corporation employed by Contractor, either directly or by independent contract, including all damages or injury to or death of persons, loss (including theft) or loss of use of any property, sustained by any person, firm or corporation, including the Owner, arising out of or in any way connected with Work covered by this Agreement or the Contract Documents, whether said injury or damage occurs either on or off Owner property, but not for any loss, injury, death or damages caused by the sole or active negligence or willful misconduct of the Owner.
- (c) Any dispute between Contractor and Contractor's subcontractors/supplies/ Sureties, including, but not limited to, any failure or alleged failure of the Contractor (or any person hired or employed directly or indirectly by the Contractor) to pay any Subcontractor or Materialman of any tier or any other person employed in connection with the Work and/or filing of any stop notice or mechanic's lien claims.

Contractor, at its own expense, cost, and risk, shall defend any and all claims, actions, suits, or other proceedings that may be brought or instituted against the Owner, its officers, agents or employees, on account of or founded upon any cause, damage, or injury identified herein Article 5 and shall pay or satisfy any judgment that may be rendered against the Owner, its officers, agents or employees in any action, suit or other proceedings as a result thereof.

The Contractor's and Subcontractors' obligation to defend, indemnify and hold harmless the Owner, Architect, Inspector, the State of California and their officers, employees, agents and independent contractors hereunder shall include, without limitation, any and all claims, damages, and costs for the following: (1) any damages or injury to or death of any person, and damage or injury to, loss (including theft), or loss of use of, any property; (2) breach of any warranty, express or implied; (3) failure of the Contractor or Subcontractors to comply with any applicable governmental law, rule, regulation, or other requirement; (4) products installed in or used in connection with the Work; and (5) any claims of violation of the Americans with Disabilities Act ("ADA").

ARTICLE 6 - PROVISIONS REQUIRED BY LAW: Each and every provision of law and clause required to be inserted in this Contract shall be deemed to be inserted herein, and this Contract shall be read and enforced as though it were included herein, and if through mistake or otherwise any such provision is not inserted or is not inserted correctly, then upon application of either party the Contract shall forthwith be physically amended to make such insertion or correction.

ARTICLE 7 - COMPONENT PARTS OF THE CONTRACT: The Contract entered into by this Agreement consists of the following Contract Documents, all of which are component parts of the Contract as if herein set out in full or attached hereto:

ARTICLE 8 - PREVAILING WAGES: Wage rates for this Project shall be in accordance with the general prevailing rate of holiday and overtime work in the locality in which the work is to be performed for each craft, classification, or type of work needed to execute the Contract as determined by the Director of the Department of Industrial Relations. Copies of schedules of rates

Approval: Award of Contract for Site work for Three Modular Buildings and Music Building

Addition at Top of The World Elementary School to R. Jensen Co. Inc., in the

Amount of \$980,000.00

Proposal

Staff proposes the Board of Education award the contract for site work for three modular buildings and music building addition at Top of the World Elementary School to R. Jensen Co. Inc., in the amount of \$980,000.00.

Background

The Board of Education awarded a contract to American Modular Systems to Purchase Gen7 Sustainable Buildings based on Biggs Unified School District's piggyback purchasing bid, known as the High Performance Facilities Contract, in the amount of \$1,174,348.28 at the regular April 26, 2016 board meeting. The purchase of the Gen 7 buildings did not include the site work or utility relocations required for the project.

In addition, the Board approved an architectural services agreement with Ruhnau Ruhnau Clarke Architects to provide Architectural/Engineering Services related to the site work associated replacing existing portables with three (3) modular buildings and adding a music building at Top of the World Elementary School at the October 24, 2016 regular meeting. The District is now ready to proceed with the site work.

Accordingly, the bid documents were completed and advertised on April 27, 2017. Three (3) firms attended the non-mandatory pre-bid job walk and three (3) firms submitted bids on the due date of May 12, 2017:

- JRH Construction Co.- \$1,211,507.00
- R. Jensen Co. Inc.- \$980,000.00
- Oceanstate Development, Inc. \$1,253,238.00

After careful review of the bid documents received, it was determined that R. Jensen Co. Inc., was the lowest responsive and responsible bidder for site work for three modular buildings and music building addition at Top Of The World Elementary School.

Budget Impact

The budget impact for the site work associated replacing existing portables with three (3) modular buildings and adding a music building at Top of the World Elementary School is \$980,000.00 and will be paid from the Special Reserve for Capital Improvement Plan (Fund 4042).

Recommended Action

Staff recommends the Board of Education award the contract for award the contract for site work for three modular buildings and music building addition at Top Of The World Elementary School to R. Jensen Co. Inc., in the amount of \$980,000.00.

AGREEMENT FORM

THIS AGREEMENT, entered into this 24th day of May, 2017 in the County of Orange of the State of California, by and between the Laguna Beach Unified School District, hereinafter called the "Owner" or the "District", and R. Jensen Co. Inc., hereinafter called the "Contractor".

WITNESSETH that the Owner and the Contractor for the consideration stated herein agree as follows:

ARTICLE I - SCOPE OF WORK: The Contractor shall furnish all labor, materials, equipment, tools, and utility and transportation services, and perform and complete all work required in connection with Laguna Beach Unified School in strict accordance with the Contract Documents enumerated in Article 7 below. The Contractor shall be liable to the District for any damages arising as a result of a failure to comply with that obligation, and the Contractor shall not be excused with respect to any failure to so comply by an act or omission of the Architect, Engineer, Inspector, Division of the State Architect (DSA), or representative of any of them, unless such act or omission actually prevents the Contractor from fully complying with the Contract Documents and the Contractor protests, in accordance with the Contract Documents, that the act or omission is preventing the Contractor from fully complying with the Contract Documents. Such protest shall not be effective unless reduced to writing and filed with the District office within seven (7) days of the date of occurrence of such act or omission preventing the Contractor from fully complying with the Contract Documents.

ARTICLE 2 - TIME OF COMPLETION: The Owner may give notice to proceed within ninety (90) days of the award of the bid by the Owner. Once the Contractor has received a notice to proceed, the Contractor shall reach Substantial Completion (See Article 1.1.46) of the Work (90) ninety days from receipt of the Notice to Proceed. This shall be called Contract Time. (See Article 8.1.1). It is expressly understood that time is of the essence.

Contractor has thoroughly studied the Project and has satisfied itself that the time period for this Project is adequate for the timely and proper completion of the Project within the Contract time.

In the event that the Owner desires to postpone giving the notice to proceed beyond this ninety (90) day period, it is expressly understood that with reasonable notice to the Contractor, giving the notice to proceed may be postponed by the Owner. It is further expressly understood by the Contractor, that the Contractor shall not be entitled to any claim of additional compensation as a result of the Owner's postponement of giving the notice to proceed.

If the Contractor believes that a postponement will cause hardship to it, the Contractor may terminate the Contract with written notice to the Owner within ten (10) days after receipt by the Contractor of the Owner's notice of postponement. It is further understood by the Contractor that in the event that the Contractor terminates the Contract as a result of postponement by the Owner, the Owner shall only be obligated to pay the Contractor for the work performed by the Contractor at the time of notification of postponement. Should the Contractor terminate the Contract as a result of a notice of postponement, the District shall have the authority to award the Contract to the next lowest responsible bidder.

ARTICLE 3 - LIQUIDATED DAMAGES: It being impracticable and infeasible to determine the amount of actual damage, it is agreed that the Contractor will pay the Owner the sum of Five-Hundred Dollars (\$500.00) per calendar day for each and every day of delay beyond the Contract Time set forth in Article 2 of this Agreement as liquidated damages and not as a penalty or forfeiture. In the event Liquidated Damages are not paid, the Contractor further agrees that the Owner may deduct such amount thereof from any money due or that may become due the Contractor under the Contract (See Article 9.6 and 2.2 of the General Conditions). This Article shall not be construed as preventing the Owner from the recovery of damages (actual or other) under the Contract Documents.

ARTICLE 4 - CONTRACT PRICE: The Owner shall pay to the Contractor as full consideration for the faithful performance of the Contract, subject to any additions or deductions as provided in the Contract Documents, the sum of NINE HUNDRED EIGHTY THOUSAND DOLLARS (\$980,000), said sum being the total amount stipulated in the Bid Contractor submitted. Payment shall be made as set forth in the General Conditions.

Should any Change Order result in an increase in the Contract Price, the cost of such Change Order shall be agreed to in advance by the Contractor and the Owner, subject to the monetary limitations set forth in Public Contract Code Section 20118.4. In the event that the Contractor proceeds with a Change in work without an agreement between the Owner and Contractor regarding the cost of a Change Order, the Contractor waives any Claim of additional compensation for such additional work.

ARTICLE 5 - HOLD HARMLESS AGREEMENT: Contractor shall defend, indemnify and hold harmless Owner, Architect, Inspector, the State of California and their officers, employees, agents and independent contractors from all liabilities, claims, actions, liens, judgments, demands, damages, losses, costs or expenses of any kind arising from death, personal injury, property damage or other cause based or asserted upon any act, omission, or breach connected with or arising from the progress of Work or performance of service under this Agreement or the Contract Documents. As part of this indemnity, Contractor shall protect and defend, at its own expense, Owner, Architect, Construction Manager, Inspector, the State of California and their officers, employees, agents and independent contractors from any legal action including attorney's fees or other proceeding based upon such act, omission, breach or as otherwise required by this Article.

Furthermore, Contractor agrees to and does hereby defend, indemnify and hold harmless Owner, Architect, Construction Manager, Inspector, the State of California and their officers, employees, agents and independent contractors from every claim or

demand made, and every liability, loss, damage, expense or attorney's fees of any nature whatsoever, which may be incurred by reason of:

- (a) Liability for (1) death or bodily injury to persons; (2) damage or injury to, loss (including theft), or loss of use of, any property; (3) any failure or alleged failure to comply with any provision of law or the Contract Documents; or (4) any other loss, damage or expense, sustained by any person, firm or corporation or in connection with the Work called for in this Agreement or the Contract Documents, except for liability resulting from the sole or active negligence, or the willful misconduct of the Owner.
- (b) Any bodily injury to or death of persons or damage to property caused by any act, omission or breach of Contractor or any person, firm or corporation employed by Contractor, either directly or by independent contract, including all damages or injury to or death of persons, loss (including theft) or loss of use of any property, sustained by any person, firm or corporation, including the Owner, arising out of or in any way connected with Work covered by this Agreement or the Contract Documents, whether said injury or damage occurs either on or off Owner property, but not for any loss, injury, death or damages caused by the sole or active negligence or willful misconduct of the Owner.
- (c) Any dispute between Contractor and Contractor's subcontractors/supplies/ Sureties, including, but not limited to, any failure or alleged failure of the Contractor (or any person hired or employed directly or indirectly by the Contractor) to pay any Subcontractor or Materialman of any tier or any other person employed in connection with the Work and/or filing of any stop notice or mechanic's lien claims.

Contractor, at its own expense, cost, and risk, shall defend any and all claims, actions, suits, or other proceedings that may be brought or instituted against the Owner, its officers, agents or employees, on account of or founded upon any cause, damage, or injury identified herein Article 5 and shall pay or satisfy any judgment that may be rendered against the Owner, its officers, agents or employees in any action, suit or other proceedings as a result thereof.

The Contractor's and Subcontractors' obligation to defend, indemnify and hold harmless the Owner, Architect, Inspector, the State of California and their officers, employees, agents and independent contractors hereunder shall include, without limitation, any and all claims, damages, and costs for the following: (1) any damages or injury to or death of any person, and damage or injury to, loss (including theft), or loss of use of, any property; (2) breach of any warranty, express or implied; (3) failure of the Contractor or Subcontractors to comply with any applicable governmental law, rule, regulation, or other requirement; (4) products installed in or used in connection with the Work; and (5) any claims of violation of the Americans with Disabilities Act ("ADA").

ARTICLE 6 - PROVISIONS REQUIRED BY LAW: Each and every provision of law and clause required to be inserted in this Contract shall be deemed to be inserted herein, and this Contract shall be read and enforced as though it were included herein, and if through mistake or otherwise any such provision is not inserted or is not inserted correctly, then upon application of either party the Contract shall forthwith be physically amended to make such insertion or correction.
